MUSKOGEE, May 22.—The engineer and fireman cf Katy passenger train No. 3, southbound, due to arrive in Muskogee at 11 o'clock last night, were killed when a cloudburst swept the engine from the track four miles south of Vinita, about 10:30 o'clock. The dead are: Will Harthfield, engineer, and Gilbert Daugherty, fireman, both of Parsons, Kan.

The train was running late, due to conditions of the track, made soft by heavy rains, and was feeling its way south of Vinita when the cloudburst sent water whirling down a hill, tearing the track away from the embankment and giving the engineer no time to stop before the engine drove into the wreckage of rails

and plunged into the ditch. According to statements this morning by railroad officials, the two members of the train crew were the only persons killed. Several passenger coaches were derailed but none of the passengers were killed, it is reported.
