HOUSTON, May 4-Carl Parker, convicted of the murder of Mortie Conroy, Houston rent car driver, was hanged at the county jail this morning by Sheriff Binford at 11:16, seven minutes before Judge Hutchinson of the district court was to begin the hearing on an application for a writ of habeas corpus, filed by Parker's attorneys. Attorneys for the doomed man sought to save his life after all other efforts had failed by seeking a writ of habeas corpus from the federal judge, on the ground that women had been purposely excluded from the jury that convicted him.

Parker went to his death bravely. "I am not going to show any white feather, and I am not afraid to go," he told reporters a few hours before he walked to the scaffold. The trap was sprung by Sheriff Binford, who a year ago hanged

INNOCENT MAN WHOM DAUGHTER ACCUSED, FREED

COLUMBUS, Ohio, May 4.—Carl Papenfuss, 62 years old, Lucas County, who served six years in the Ohio penitentiary for an offense which he did not commit, is on his way home.

Governor Harry L. Davis has granted to him a full pardon, and or-

dered his citizenship to be restored.

Papenfuss was convicted of an attack, on testimony of his daughter, then 15 years old. He was pardoned after the daughter had made an affidavit that her testimony had been given under coercion by her mother, who since has died, and upon recommendation of Toledo court officials, Papenfuss was serving a life sentence.

According to the daughter, the mother had threatened to have her put in an institution unless she accused her father, and afterward held her to seerecy with the threat that she would be sent to prison if she told the truth.

In a statement accompanying the parole Governor Davis expressed regret that "the grievous harm done in such a miscarriage of justice never can be undone wholly."

Supreme Court Throws John Doe Out on His Ear

WASHINGTON, May 4. — John Doe has been thrown out of the United States Supreme Court and as he disappeared Chief Justice Wiliam H. Taft suggested that he might be considered to be dead.

The action was taken when Massachusets sought to argue a case docketed as "John Doe, demise of commonwealth of Massachusetts," against Rochester, claimed by Massachusetts under the treaty of Hartford, concluded in 1786.

"Is John Doe in Court?"

A hasty conference resulted in Chief Justice Taft ordering John Doe out of court, with directions to counsel to substitute a modern equity proceeding.

A new case must be docketed asking leave of the court to file a bill in equity which will bring into the court all of the parties interested and give to them, if the motion is granted, an opportunity to have determined their respective rights.

KANSAS CITY, Kan., May 4.— Legislation prohibiting sale of drugs and poisons by any other than a registered druggist will be sought by the Kansas Pharmaceutical association which meets in convention here May 16, 17 and 18.

The "drug control" matter will be one of the most important to come before the convention, J. Will Kelley, secretary, announced.

Six hundred druggists are expected to attend the convention. The program as given out by Kelley includes among its speakers:

E. C. Brokmeyer, Washington, D. C.; F. W. Ekstrand, Salina, president of the state association; Leonard D. Warren, Topeka; F. A. Milne, Pratt; Dr. E. H. Ruddiman, St. Louis; J. F. Tilford, Wichita; Lee Vaughn, Kansas City, Kan., and Joseph Kewalski, Emporia.

The anti-drug legislation, Kelley said, will be aimed toward reducing the number of addicts and suicides in the state through the "outlaw" sale of dope and life destroyers.

Killits and said that four gallons of moonshine found in her home by federal prohibition agents was purchased for the christening of her baby, the judge said, "Poppycock!" and sentenced her to serve 60 days in the Warrenville

Judge Killits told the woman the fact that the baby since has died made it easier for him to sentence her.

LATEST IN HOOCH! IODINE WITH WATER IS SOLD IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, May 4.—A new poison "hooch" has appeared on the bootleg market in Brooklyn, Charles Wagner, chemist of the district attorney's office in Kings, said today. It is made of water colored with iodine

Five bottles of the stuff, bearing the labels of a well-known brand of liquor, have been brought to Wagner.

The bootlegger was charging \$5 a bottle for the concoction, which cost about 10 cents a quart to make.

She determines colors by her acute sense of smell.




