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## DILLINGHAM HEADS RANGER'S NEW C.-C.

### PROGRAM MARKS START OF WORK ON HIGH SCHOOL

Teachers and Students Join in Commemoration of Event.

Ceremonies participated in by school children and city officials this morning, marked the breaking of ground for the new high school building at the corner of Pine and Austin streets. Approximately 300 persons were present.

The ceremonies were opened by the singing of "America." H. D. Woods, high school principal, acting as master of ceremonies, then presented Superintendent E. O. McNew, who made a short talk on the significance of the occasion, which he described as the most important happening in the history of Ranger for a long while. Commissioner R. H. Hodges, representing the city commission, made a short talk in which he pledged the support of the commission in school affairs.

Miss Myrtle Clemmer, president of the senior class, and Phil Simpson then took hold of the handles of the plow and with Tom Alworth, president of next year's football team, driving the team, the first furrow for the foundations of the school building was run.

Workmen then proceeded with the clearing of the ground.

### LAST TOUCH PUT ON HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS' PLAY

The promise of an unusually good show at the Majestic theatre tomorrow night was given this morning at the rehearsal of "Much Ado About Betty," by the cast of high school students. The senior play this year is a new one on the amateur stage and well fitted to the cast, it is stated. Miss Eppie Jean Grove, expression teacher, has been directing the rehearsals for several weeks and all members of the cast have been made familiar with their part.

The proceeds derived from the show will be used to enlarge the school library.

### MEDICS OPPOSE PLAN FOR STATE INSURANCE

EL PASO, May 10.—Opposition to the proposed state operation of industrial insurance fostered by the State Federation of Labor was voiced today in the opening session of the fifty-sixth annual convention of the Texas State Medical association here. A report was read on progress in raising the fund for the national memorial building and the annual memorial services for the forty-nine Texas doctors who died during the last year was held. Dr. John Murphy convened the house of delegates. Five hundred and fifty delegates were present from Texas, New Mexico and Arizona. Several more are expected today.

### PHILADELPHIA WOMAN TAKES LIFE OF SELF AND THREE YOUNG CHILDREN

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 10.—Mrs. Edith Miller Busby, wife of the vice president of the Keystone Lubricating company, of Philadelphia, and three children are dead at their home here from illuminating gas poisoning. Notes found by the police indicate that Mrs. Busby planned her death and that of her three daughters. She was separated from her husband.

### GERMANY MUST PAY U. S. FOR DESTROYED ZEPPELIN

PARIS, May 10.—The council of ambassadors today announced a decision that Germany must reimburse the United States for a Zeppelin destroyed and not delivered in compliance with the treaty of Versailles. The council set the payment at approximately 3,000,000 gold marks (about \$750,000).

The cable apparently indicates that the council of ambassadors has decided the United States has suffered the loss of one Zeppelin or small type airship of depreciated value. Cost of a new Zeppelin would be considerably more than \$750,000.

### President and Directors Chosen Last Night at Enthusiastic Meeting.

One of the largest and most enthusiastic meetings held in Ranger since boom days, last night perfected the organization of the New Chamber of Commerce with the election of O. D. Dillingham as president and a representative board of directors. More than 150 men, all but a few already members of the new chamber, crowded the ballroom of the Gholson, devised a set of election laws and elected president and directors from the floor.

Eleven directors elected from the twenty-two nominations, are: M. R. Newnam, O. D. Dillingham, John W. Thurman, J. M. White, J. M. Dodson, E. E. Crawford, Dr. A. N. Harkrider, J. C. Smith, J. S. Echols, M. K. Collis and R. B. Waggonman.

#### Goal in Sight

The new organization is now within a few dollars of its subscription goal of \$800 monthly, chairman Cole told the members, and is expected to be reached by Saturday at the latest. The meeting last night, he said, was one of the most important ever held in Ranger. Two years ago, he pointed out, a larger gathering organized the old Chamber of Commerce and members subscribed large amounts out of their plenty. "This meeting," he declared, "is now giving out of its penury, and is therefore of the greater importance."

While votes were being counted the chairman called for a discussion of the future work of the new organization, which brought several members to their feet with recommendations to have the electric, water and telephone lines extended into residence sections now without them. Following a discussion Chairman Cole outlined the offer of the water distribution system to the city as recently made by M. H. Hargaman and pointed out the advantages of the proposed 60 cent water rate under municipal ownership and the proposed plans of the city to extend the mains in case the purchase was found feasible and authorized by the taxpayers. A straw vote taken following a discussion of the purchase from numerous angles was in favor of municipal ownership, with several not voting.

The meeting opened at 8:30 and was preceded by a concert of the Ranger Merchants Association Band on the balcony of the hotel, and in the ball room. Chairman Cole called the meeting to order and after explaining the purposes and motives that actuated the twenty business men of the city in disbanding the old chamber of commerce and launching the organization of the new, turned the meeting over to the scribes. The new body, he explained, will be free from any of the liabilities of the old and will be the organization of the entire city, free from any slates or cliques.

Although the monthly subscriptions pledged by the members vary in size according to their ability, all have the same voting strength. Mr. Cole was unanimously chosen permanent chairman of the meeting and S. B. Tunnell as permanent secretary, and the meeting after deciding to elect all directors from the floor also decided to elect the president in a similar manner instead of leaving his selection to the directors.

#### Many Nominees

Twenty-two were placed in nomination for directors, with a rapidity that kept the chairman busy refereeing the right to the floor. Two of the nominees asked to be excused from service and others were nominated in their place. All the nominees thereupon stood and pledged that they would work for the success of the organization in the event they were selected.

In the election of president, the candidates reversed the usual procedure and worked for each other. M. R. Newnam made stump speeches for O. D. Dillingham and when ruled from the floor personally solicited the various "ward leaders" to turn their votes to Dillingham. The board of directors was instructed to work out a constitution and by-laws for the new chamber, to be submitted at the next meeting. Following a buffet lunch and a short talk on the baseball club the meeting adjourned.

#### THAT NAME BE WITHDRAWN.

WASHINGTON, May 10.—Nat Goldstein, whose nomination for the office of internal revenue collector at St. Louis aroused criticism in the senate, has asked that his name be withdrawn. His request was in the form of a letter to President Harding, read in the senate by Senator Spencer, who had urged his appointment to office.

Senator Spencer said that the letter ended the matter, which was taken to mean that the President would carry out Goldstein's request.

### VANDALS DO DAMAGE AT NITRO PARK

Vandals some time last night or early this morning broke into the concession stand of Bob Hansford at the ball park and literally wrecked it, according to the statement of the owner this morning. Seven cartons of cigarette and five boxes of cigars were opened and their contents broken up and scattered over the floor. Between twelve and fifteen cases of candy were turned over on the floor and most of the cushions and pillows, rented to spectators during the games, were cut open and scattered. So far as has been ascertained, nothing was stolen.

### CADDO ROAD'S PAVING WAITING ON EQUIPMENT

Will Be Finished First, Then Eastland-Carbon Road, Commissioners Say.

EASTLAND, May 10.—In response to inquiries from Ranger as to when the Caddo road would be completed, a member of the commissioners' court stated yesterday that the sub-contractor on the surfacing work was now awaiting on equipment from Arkansas and that on its arrival, work would be started immediately and completed within a week.

Two miles of the Caddo road yet remains to be surfaced and one mile, already paved, repaired in a few places, it is stated.

The surfacing of the Eastland-Carbon road is to be started as soon as the work on the Caddo road is completed and is expected to be finished in about three weeks time.

Construction of the model mile of Bankhead highway, running from Olden toward Ranger, has been delayed considerably by the rains. Another model mile is to be started near Eastland in the near future, it was said. All of the dirt work on the Bankhead highway between Eastland and Cisco is practically finished, it was reported.

### ROTARIANS ASK ONE-NIGHT LIMIT FOR CARNIVALS

In the absence of Mayor Gholson and Commissioner Terrell, no action was taken by the city commission yesterday afternoon on the Rotary Club resolution which would restrain the exhibition of carnival tent shows and itinerant entertainers in Ranger for more than one day in any six-month period.

It was set forth in the argument for city legislation along this line that these shows add nothing to the city, are objectional in other ways and take considerable money away.

## Union Bosses Held After Chicago Night of Terror

### PUBLICITY LOSES WAR VET LOVE OF GIRL

Miss Culberson's Affections Turn to Dislike of Alex Robertson, Friends Say

#### By United Press.

WASHINGTON, May 10.—The romance of Alex Robertson, British war hero, and Miss Mary Culberson, daughter of the senator from Texas, has been ended. Miss Culberson's affections for Robertson are said to have been cooled greatly by the publicity he gave charges that he had been kidnapped by detectives hired by Senator Culberson in an effort to "shanghai" him.

Complete denial will be made by Senator Culberson in a statement expected to be issued shortly, that he attempted to get Robertson out of the country.

#### Embassy Just Onlooker.

The British embassy today, after hearing the complaint of Robertson, decided that the action of the embassy in the case will be merely to watch the court proceedings which Robertson has instituted.

The British war veteran laid before the embassy officials information supporting his charges that he had been kidnapped by private detectives and an attempt made to railroad him out of the country, because of his affection for Miss Culberson.

### INSULT TO WIFE CAUSED DEATH OF COLLEGE MAN

STILLWATER, Okla., May 10.—Charges of murder were filed today against Earl Gordon, 25, ex-serviceman, in connection with the death of Beckman Cobb, 23, an overseas veteran, near Oklahoma A. & M. College yesterday. The charges were filed by the county attorney of Payne county. Arraignment will be held late today.

The shooting of Cobb resulted from an attempt by him to secure an apology for an alleged insult to his 18-year-old wife, according to county officials who investigated the killing.

It is said at the time, Cobb, armed with a revolver, was forcing Gordon to accompany him to his home with the demand that Gordon apologize to Mrs. Cobb for the alleged insult. The two were wrangling when Gordon opened fire, sending three bullets into Cobb's body. Witnesses said Cobb stepped in front of Gordon just before the shots were fired.

Mrs. Cobb said Gordon insulted her on the streets several nights ago and said she told her husband.

Cobb's body will be sent to his former home in Birmingham, Ala., for burial. Mrs. Cobb will accompany the body tomorrow.

According to a statement issued by Brown Moore, Gordon's attorney, Cobb forced the other man to shoot in self defense. Moore said that Gordon was only slightly acquainted with Mrs. Cobb and had offered her no insult as was claimed by the wife.

### Two Policemen Slain By Dynamiters After Several Buildings are Bombed; Believed Renewal of War Over Landis Award

CHICAGO, May 10.—Police this morning raided the hall of the building trade unions and arrested three of the Chicago labor leaders, Big Tim Murphy, Fred Mador and Cornelius Shea, in connection with bombing and shooting earlier in the day, which resulted in the death of two policemen and the serious injury of a third.

Murphy, who is known as Chicago's labor czar, is now out on bond under a seven-year sentence in connection with the \$300,000 mail robbery some time ago. Mador is president of the building trade unions and Shea is head of the teamster's union. All records in the hall were seized.

Chief of Police Fitzmorris announced at 1 o'clock that all of the officers of the building trades unions had been arrested. In discussing the arrest of Murphy, Mador and Shea, he said that "the slaughter of the two police officers while performing their duty is the inevitable result of the tactics pursued by Murphy, Mador and Shea and the other hoodlums and ex-convicts who are posing as labor leaders."

Terror was spread over the West

side as the dynamiters hurled bombs and fired volleys of shots in the new outbreak of the labor war. The bombing and murders resulted from resentment against the wage award of Judge Landis, who acted as arbiter in the dispute between the building trades employes and the contractors. Patrolman Thomas J. Clark was killed when he interrupted the vandals in an attempt to throw a bomb into the Shary & Patridge gas plant. The terrorists were in the act of hurling the bomb from an auto. The slayers a few minutes before had hurled dynamite into a garage nearby.

Terence Lyons, acting police lieutenant, in charge of a detachment of officers, took up the chase of the men. Lyons' car drew up behind a suspicious looking car and its occupants were commanded to halt. The command was answered with a hail of revolver shots. Lyons was killed and Joseph Moeller, a motorcycle policeman, was shot in the leg.

Chief Fitzmorris rushed to the scene of the bombing and murders and assumed personal charge of the manhunt.

### 'BURY HER AS PAUPER,' WIRES FATHER OF GIRL FOUND SLAIN

"Bury her as a pauper; I have no funds." This terse message received this morning by the police from Albert Davis of Bergman, Ark., father of Billie Shanks, marks the closing chapter in the life of the stranded vaudeville actress found shot through the heart early Tuesday morning in a room at the Oasis hotel, and whose death the coroner refuses to accept unqualifiedly as suicide. A previous message from the father stated that he was not financially able to come to Ranger or to have the body shipped to Bergman.

"I have nobody and nobody gives a —" reads the note found in the dead woman's room and purported to have been written by her in explanation of the tragedy. The father's address was obtained by the authorities through friends or acquaintances of the young woman in Missouri, located through a letter found in her room. Her associates here were unable to say where she lived or to furnish the

names of her people. According to the officers, the dead woman went under the name of Frances Davis as well as Billie Shanks and registered at another hotel last month under the former name. It is estimated that a thousand people viewed the body at the Milford Undertaking chapel yesterday afternoon. News of the tragic death spread rapidly over the city before a published account was on the streets. Later the crowds grew in number, the morbidly curious predominating.

The authorities are reluctant to have the young woman buried as a pauper if there is any way to avoid it and the body will be held a short while to allow sufficient funds to be raised among her associates or elsewhere.

In line with the verdict returned yesterday morning following the inquest held by Justice of the Peace McFatter, officers are continuing their investigation of the case.

### SENATORS CAN SPEND ANY SUM ON ELECTIONS

WASHINGTON, May 10.—Candidates for the United States senate may spend unlimited sums of money in the primaries or final elections next November without filing an expense account with the secretary of the senate, according to an opinion of Attorney General Daugherty, made public today. The attorney general's opinion declares the supreme court in the Newberry case has invalidated the corrupt practices act, so far as it concerns senatorial candidates.

### CONFAB SAVED AGAIN

GENOA, May 10.—Fireign Minister Schanzer of Italy today stepped in and saved the Genoa conference from a breakdown.

He prevented Russia from delivering an unsatisfactory reply to the allied memorandum. The Russian note was ready for delivery. Schanzer had been apprized that certain portions of the document would be unacceptable to the allies. He persuaded Tchitcherin to retain the note and certain certain changes before presenting it.

At the same time, it is reported, Nicolai Lenine, on appeals from certain of the allies, has wirelessed Tchitcherin to revise the document.

The delegates hailed Schanzer's move as saving the conference from a breakdown. The Russian note on examination was found stronger in parts than was expected. It would have been unsatisfactory to France and Belgium and in part to the rest of the conferees.

### LAWTON PASTOR ISN'T READY TO FACE CHARGES

LAWTON, Okla., May 10.—The arraignment of the Rev. T. J. Irwin, former pastor of the First Presbyterian church of this city, and H. C. Lewis, chairman of the resigned church board, on arson charges, was continued this morning in justice court until May 22. The postponement was granted on application of Irwin's attorneys.

### THREE KILLED WHEN GEORGIA SAWMILL BOILER EXPLODES

QUITMAN, Ga., May 10.—Three men were killed and four others seriously injured this morning in the explosion of the boiler at the Evans sawmill near here. The mill was wrecked.

### T. & P. TRACK REOPENED TO WEATHERFORD

Eastbound Sunshine Will Pass Through Here About 5 O'clock Today.

Efforts are being made by the Texas & Pacific to route the eastbound Sunshine Special into Weatherford over temporary tracks and thence over the Santa Fe and Frisco into Fort Worth, it was reported this morning. The special is reported five hours late and is not expected here until 5 o'clock this afternoon.

The trains running between Minus and Sweetwater and meeting here at 1 p. m. are still being maintained, while work gangs in the Weatherford vicinity are working overtime to repair the damage done by the latest high water and restore regular passenger service.

### TRINITY DROPS 5 FEET.

By Associated Press. FORT WORTH, May 10.—The Trinity river was five feet below flood stage this morning and was continuing to drop rapidly. Residents are moving back into their homes in the low sections and the interrupted car service and most of the railroad service has been resumed.

### FLOOD WATERS PASS.

DALLAS, May 10.—The swollen streams of North Texas today are beginning to fall. Both Fort Worth and Dallas report that unless heavy rains deluged the upper watershed last night, there will be no further overflow and the river will soon seek its normal channel.

The Brazos receded two feet between 3 a. m. and 8 a. m. at Waco, after reaching 36.4 feet and threatening to inundate portions of the city. Police with ropes this morning were strung out on the bridges, following reports that two women had been seen to pass Dripping Springs, a few miles above Waco, riding down the swollen waters on a log. These plans for rescue were made in case the two women were swept under the bridges.

The report that two women were floating down the river on logs proved unfounded when the officers waiting to rescue them at the Washington street bridge discovered they were cows.

Interurban service from Dallas to Waco, Corsicana and Denison was restored to normal this morning, but cars are not yet running on the Fort Worth line. Railroads are still badly handicapped. Only one train has reached Dallas from the south since Monday night.

### RAILROAD MEN MAY GIVE MINERS \$50,000 MONTH

HOUSTON, May 10.—A motion that the International Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers contribute \$50,000 a month to the United Mine Workers of America during the continuance of the strike was made on the floor of the convention an placed in the hands of a special committee for consideration and report before final action at the convention, it was learned today.

The motion followed an appeal signed by ten officials of the United Mine Workers. It is probable that the committee will not report for several days.

### RELIGIOUS FREEDOM DEMANDED OF MEXICO

#### By United Press.

WASHINGTON, May 10.—The American government in negotiating with Mexico over the question of American recognition has asked for guarantees of religious freedom from that country, it was learned on high authority today.

The American government is not dealing with personalities in the negotiations with the Oregon government, it was declared here today by a government official in reiterating that the recognition of the present Mexican government depended almost entirely on the guarantees offered against the confiscation of American property.

## SUICIDE ENDS WAR ROMANCE'S BITTER DREAMS

DETROIT, Mich., May 10.—To strains of a Chopin waltz played in a Detroit hotel in 1916, Mildred Lawson, 16 years old, and all that magic age implies, danced in the arms of a stalwart United States army lieutenant into the rose-hued land of romance.

Strains of another waltz melody played in the fashionable North Shore hotel, Evanston, Ill., this week, drowned the bark of a revolver shot that told Mildred Lawson Cornell had seen romance stripped of its beauties.

She died a suicide. Into the less than six years between the playing of those two waltzes were interwoven a courtship lasting four days and culminating in a military wedding, the bitter shock to parents socially prominent here that their daughter had been the heroine of a war romance, a brief taste of Utopian happiness, then disillusionment, divorce proceedings and death.

It was not until after the ceremony that the parents learned their daughter had married Lieut. Abe Cohen. They declared they disinherited their child, never wishing to see her again. The girl's extreme youth, differences in religion and thwarted social plans, were given as reasons for the parents' opposition.

The following years Mildred's husband had his name legally changed to Wright A. Cornell. There was a reconciliation and shortly afterwards Mr. and Mrs. Lawson removed to Easton, Md. About the same time Cornell was transferred to Harrisburg, Pa.

Romance's glamour became tarnished. Mildred charged cruelty. The couple separated, Mildred returning to her parents and Cornell later coming back to Detroit. About eighteen months ago he instituted divorce proceedings charging desertion, but there were many delays. Mildred then went to Evanston, where she killed herself.

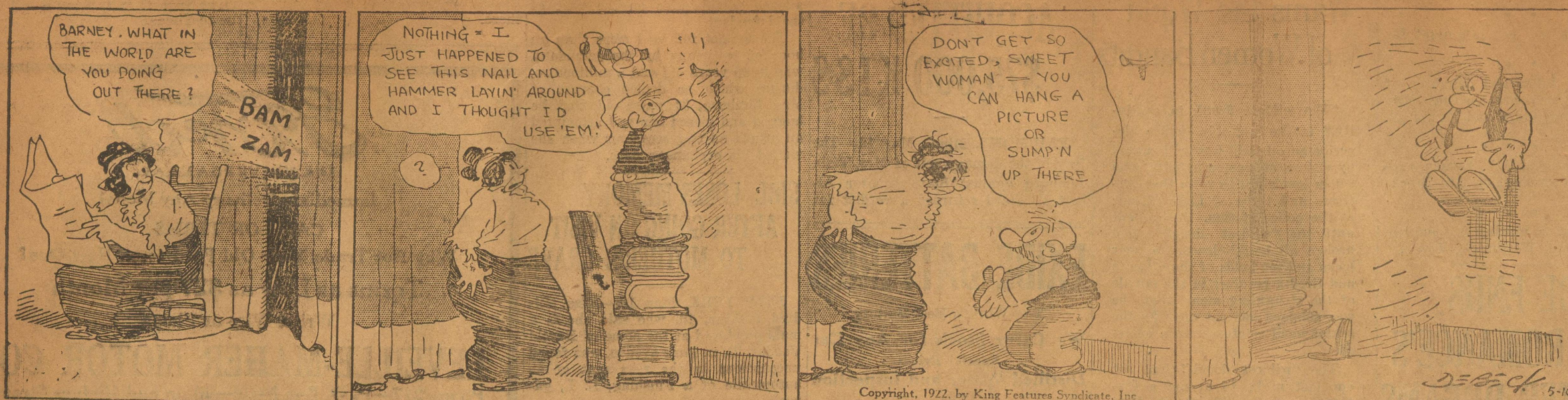
