J. C. SMITH TO RETURN TO GO INTO BUSINESS

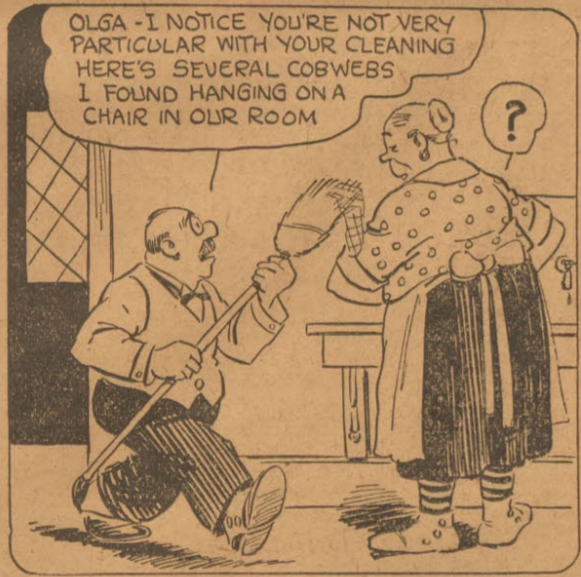
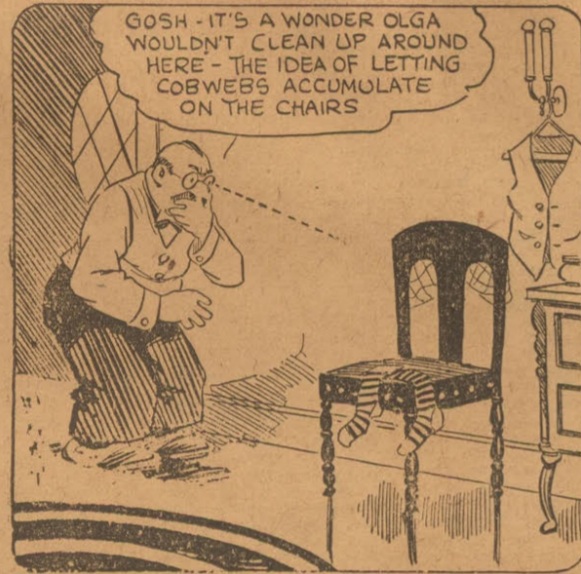
Leases Main Street Front of Wier Building for Big Department Store

Leading Educator Says Religion Need Not Alarm Church

CHICAGO, June 11.—President Walter Dill Scott of Northwestern University, largest Methodist educational institution in America, today publicly joined the fight in Tennessee law prohibiting the teaching of evolution in public schools.
 Scott said in a public statement that he was entirely in sympathy with the defense of John T. Scopes, young Dayton, Tenn. high school teacher who is to be tried for violating the law. Scott is a Presbyterian.
 "Any law prohibiting the teaching of evolution is dangerous, in that it is an attempt to halt the search for reality, and true religion can have its roots only in reality," he declared. The church has nothing to fear from science."
 Interviewed by the United Press, the university president said he counted himself an "orthodox Presbyterian."
 "I believe in evolution" he added, "and that belief has never dimmed my religion."

NEW SHALLOW POOL IS LOCATED NEAR ALBAN.

ALBANY, June 11.—The Diller No. 1 in northwest corner of northeast quarter of section 49 Lunatic asylum 12 1-2 miles south of Leslie Spoons, Choates and McCarter of Fort Worth from 560 feet with flush production of 328 barrels was followed Wednesday by sensational offsets. Offsets to south by Spoons, Choates and McCarter was drilled in today and is making 10 barrels per hour or 240 per day from the same sand. Offset to north by McCarter was drilled in Wednesday making 150 barrels per day. This is the most sensational of shallow depths known here. It is being followed closely by big companies and independents with Phillips, Texas company, Landreth, McCarter and others having acreage close in. Other wells on the ranch are being rushed to completion. The drilling time for each well is from five to eight days.

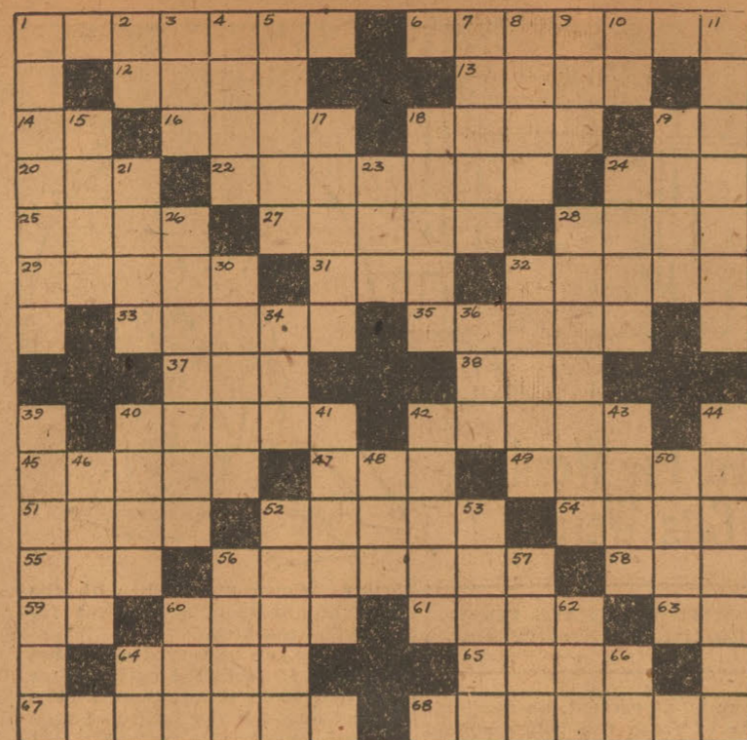

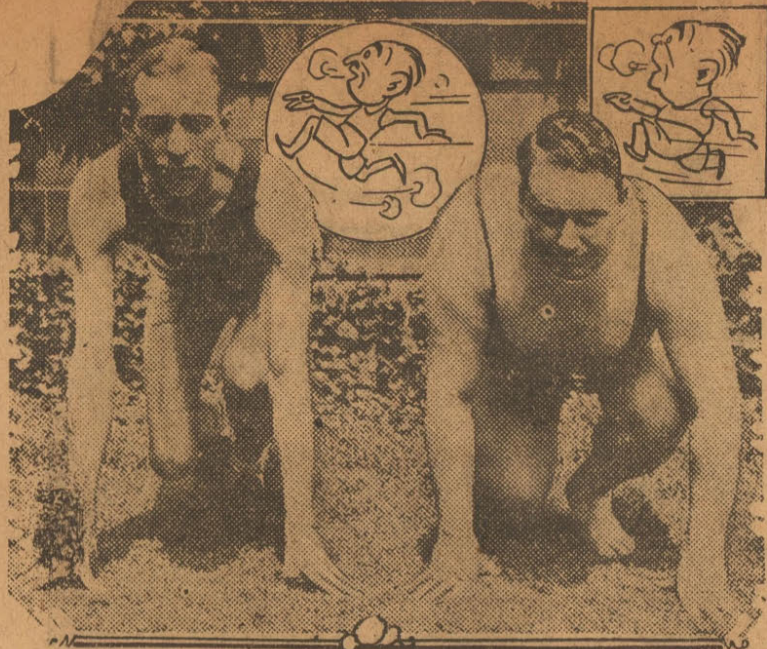

A PORTFOLIO FROCK IN A FERRONIERE PRINT

Hints From a House-Wife's Kitchen Diary



When The Weather Gets Warm

NUTRITIOUS MEALS FROM OUR LAKES AND RIVERS

There is, at present, an available variety of fresh fish which should be given a prominent place on the spring menus. Fish is not only an appetizing change from the heavier meat dishes of the cold months, but possesses splendid dietetic values as well.

Fish stuffed and baked makes a very hearty and palatable dinner.

Make the stuffing for the fish by soaking two cupfuls of stale white bread in cold water for ten minutes. Then squeeze dry and crumble to bits. To this add a tablespoonful of minced parsley, a tablespoonful of chopped onion, one quarter teaspoonful of pepper, half a teaspoonful of salt, two tablespoonfuls of melted butter and one beaten egg yolk. Clean the fish and fill the body—not too full as the filling will swell slightly during the cooking. Sew up the opening, place in a well buttered enameled ware baking pan and arrange strips of bacon on the fish, fastening them with toothpicks or skewers. Put in a hot oven and after ten minutes pour in a cupful of tomato juice, the acid of which will not affect the surface of the enameled ware dish. Bake the fish thirty minutes, basting it occasionally with the liquid in the pan. Just before removing from the oven sprinkle the surface with fine buttered crumbs and brown delicately. Serve it from the china-like dish in which it is baked so that the fish will be intact until the individual servings are made at the table. Garnish with sliced lemon.

STRAWBERRY-BANANA DEEP DISH PIE

Deep dish fruit pies which are of English origin and very delicious, are quite uncommon here. The housewife whose family is fond of strawberries and who wishes to present them in a variety of ways during the season, will try this delightful pie which is sure to be well received.

Place a small cup upside down in the center of a deep enameled ware baking dish and fill in around and on top of the cup, if necessary, with a quart of strawberries. Then add one banana sliced thin, which will not only enhance the flavor of the pie but will make the berry juice more syrupy. Add three quarters of a cupful of sugar and two tablespoonfuls of water.

Make any desired crust, roll to one inch thickness and cut several slits in it to allow the steam to escape. The cup will collect the juice so as to prevent the crust from getting soggy, but the slits are quite necessary, too. Moisten the edge of the baking dish with milk so that the crust will adhere

firmly. Cover the dish with the crust and bake in a hot oven for forty-five minutes.

This pie can be served either hot or cold. If preferred cold the pie can remain in the enameled ware baking dish for any length of time, because its vitreous surface is not affected by fruit acids.

After the first few servings of crust have been removed, take out the cup so that the juice will be served with the berries.

A thin custard sauce goes well with this dessert.

CARROTS AND PEAS PARISIEN STYLE

So essential are vegetables to a well balanced diet that new recipes that offer new ideas and suggestions to the menu planner are always welcome. The housewife who wishes to vary her method of preparing carrots and peas, will add this new way as a worthy addition to her list. It is a very easily prepared dish.

Scrape three large carrots or the equivalent in smaller ones and slice in small pieces or with a lattice knife. Place into an enameled ware saucepan, which will preserve their delicate color, and add enough water to cover. Cook until tender—about fifteen minutes. Then drain in an enameled ware colander or sieve and finish the cooking in a quarter of a cupful of butter and a tablespoonful each of sugar and chopped mint. Turn carefully occasionally. Then drain a pint of canned or fresh peas, heated, season them with one teaspoonful of sugar, one half teaspoonful salt and a tablespoonful of butter.

Make a border of the carrots on a platter and place the peas in the center.

HOW TO USE LEFTOVERS

Leftovers, which many housewives regard as a nuisance, often can be made as delectable as their "first appearances." A delicious supper or luncheon dish can be prepared in the following manner with leftover salmon, tuna fish or any roast meat.

Saute one-half of a small onion, minced, and one small green pepper, chopped fine, in two tablespoonfuls of butter. Put two cupfuls of strained, cooked tomatoes into an enameled ware saucepan, which is impervious to the action of vegetable acids, and mix in lightly two cupfuls of steamed rice. Then add the onion and pepper, two cupfuls of cooked and flaked fish or diced roast meat, one tablespoonful salt, and one eighth teaspoonful pepper. Mix thoroughly, let boil for two or three minutes. Then turn into a well-buttered enameled ware casserole or baking dish and bake in a hot oven for twelve minutes.

RESIDENT SUGGESTS WAY TO PREVENT BICKERING

WASHINGTON, June 11.—Because of the continual disagreements within the shipping board, President Coolidge has recommended to Chairman O'Connor that the board surrender all negotiations over ship orders to the emergency fleet corporation, retaining only power to finally approve or disapprove sales recommended by the corporation.

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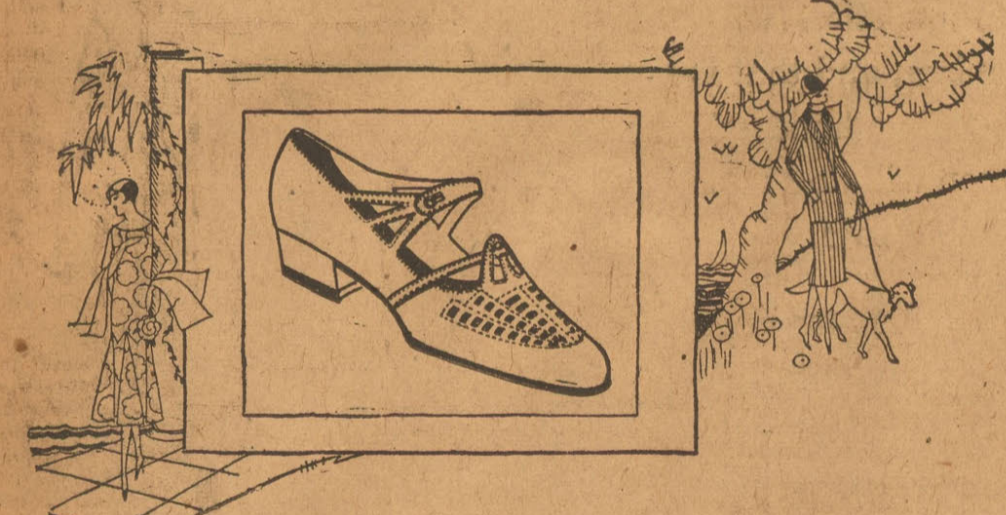
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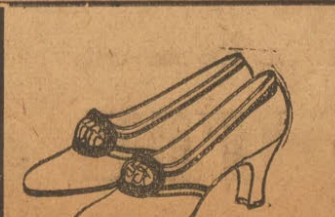
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Roosevelt Game Hunt Cannot Be Classed as Summer Picnic By Long Shot

LONDON, June 11.—Few know of the hardships that will confront the Roosevelt expedition when it enters the passes and trails of Turkistan. After entering Leh Pass, it may be three, six and even ten months, before the party is heard of again. It will have to endure extreme heat and extreme cold, but more of the latter than the former.

The party is in quest of the Ovis Poli, a rare mountain sheep, said to be the great-grand father of all mountain sheep; the long haired tiger of the Kien Shan mountains; the great ibex; the markor, a giant mountain goat; the Yarkan stak and the loitered gazelle.

To find some of these the Roosevelt party will be compelled to go into places in Central Asia where so far as known no white man has yet penetrated. Kipling said of the country, "Every mile stands on end." Explorers call it "the top of the world." Even the mountain passes are 15,000 feet above sea level and the country is almost devoid of timber. It is said to be the highest, wildest and most barren spot in the world.

Gathering the native bearers at Srinagar in the Vale of Kashmir, at the northwestern extreme of India, the party will attempt to go through the hazardous Leh Pass, the mail route to Tibet, between Afghanistan and Tibet, to reach the Pamir Plateau, where they expect to find the Ovis Poli.

From here the party will proceed across Chinese Turkistan to the Tian Shan range, the jungles at the foot of which they hope to find the long-haired tiger. Leh Pass is open only in the summer months and during the thaws the threat of avalanches and floods are always present.

Much of the travel, especially in the pass, will be done at night, as the piercing cold that comes with the sinking of the sun will check the thaw and there will be less danger from snow slides. It is unlikely that the party can travel more than one mile an hour. In many places they

will have to cut their steps with axes to make upward progress.

Reaching their destination and securing their game the movement of the party must be hurried, for Leh Pass will again be filled with snow in September. Unless the party returns through the pass before then they will have the choice of being marooned in a country of rock and ice, or working their way out to civilization by a torturous journey through Mongolia and Siberia.

The expedition was fitted out by James Simpson, general manager of Marshall Field company, in behalf of the Field museum and in consequence is known as the Simpson-Roosevelt Field museum expedition. Besides Theodore and Kermit Roosevelt, the other white man in the party is 61 years old, white-haired, mild-mannered George Chery, naturalist. Chery is a veteran campaigner. He was with President Roosevelt on his African and Brazilian expeditions and has also made 38 exploring trips into Central and South America and the West Indies. This is the same Chery who one evening some 20 odd years ago in the upper reaches of the Orinoco in Venezuela dropped his scientific tools and with 20 men of the anti-Castro faction drove a government general and 400 soldiers out of town so fast that the general fled in his pajamas.

It is just a coincidence that the names of this expedition are exactly the same as on the tours to Africa and South America only the Theodore Roosevelt in this instance is the son and not the father.

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
