OLDEN GIRL IS KILLED IN CRASH OF AUTO

WIND AND RAIN BRING MERCURY TUMBLING DOWN

Storms Breaks Over Eastland County Early Today, Morning Cool and Cloudy.

Following a warm day Sunday, when the mercury climbed close to 100 degrees, a wind and rain storm broke over Eastland county about 4:30 o'clock this morning and the mercury tumbled between 30 and 40 degrees.

The wind blew first from the north west, then veered to the other side of the compass and blew almost as hard from the southeast.

The morning today was cool and delightful, the sun hidden for the most part behind the clouds.

The rain came at an opportune time for the farmers, who are in the midst of their planting.

It was the hottest May 23 in history in the middle west states, and was followed by a May 24 that broke most cold records for that date.

Chicago, which sweltered Saturday with the mercury around 94, yesterday experienced the coldest May 24 on record, the temperature falling to 37 degrees with snow flurries.

Falling Mercury Reported In Many Sections of Texas

DALLAS, May 25.—Rainfall, accompanied by falling temperature, was reported in many sections of Texas today after the mercury had climbed to new records over the week-end.

San Antonio reported a 30-degree drop from a height of 102 degrees Sunday, a record for that section.

STORM HITS AUSTIN WITH TERRIFIC FORCE

AUSTIN, May 25.—A terrific wind storm hit Austin at 7 o'clock this morning, knocking part of the electric light system out of commission, whipping shade trees and blowing down signposts.

The storm broke the intense heat of Sunday when a maximum of 104 degrees was reported, the hottest day in May on record in this section.

FORT WORTH, May 25.—Moslah Temple deluxe special train enroute to Los Angeles to attend the Imperial Council session will make a sort stop at Ranger, Friday noon, May 29, arriving there about 12:25 p. m., when the uniformed bodies will stage a short program.

At Abilene the Mesa drum corps will be picked up for the trip, they being members of Moslah Temple and will further augment the drum and bugle corps from Fort Worth.

Over 250 Nobles and members of their families will be aboard the train, which consists of fifteen cars, among them being a Santa Fe motor observation car, ten Pullmans, two diners and two baggage cars.

Potentate John F. Lyons is in charge of the train and, with Nobles W. S. Cooke, Frank Taylor and Jake F. Zurn, compose the representative of Moslah Temple to the Imperial council session.

Several features will be staged in Los Angeles to advertise Texas, Fort Worth and Moslah Temple before the largest convention of its kind in North America, it being estimated there will be over 200,000 members of the uniformed bodies, members of their families and Shriners attending.

Captain F. B. Walker will have charge of Moslah patrol, while the band will be under the direction of R. Wright Armstrong, famous as the leader of the Old Grey Mare band.

Accident Due to Loose Radius Rod; Brother and Sister Also Hurt.

Miss Cecil Hunt of Olden was instantly killed Sunday afternoon when the car in which she was riding overturned on the highway near Dothan, breaking her neck.

Miss Hunt was riding with her brother and sister, Lomar and Julia Hunt, when the radius rod broke or came loose, turning the car over.

Mr. Hunt, employed by the Oilbelt Motor company, was bringing an old car back from Lamesa to Ranger for a repair or paint job when the accident occurred.

Miss Hunt was about 16 years of age and one of the brightest students in the Olden High school.

Funeral services for Miss Hunt were to be held this afternoon at 3 o'clock at the home of her parents, near Olden, followed by interment in Eastland cemetery.

EARTHQUAKE CLAIMS HEAVY TOLL IN JAPAN

OSAKA, Japan, May 25.—Official although still incomplete figures on Saturday's earthquake and fire in western Japan, place the dead at 318.

Total Dead Placed at 318 and Severely Injured at 532; Many Homes Destroyed.

In addition, 532 were severely injured and many more slightly hurt.

From Toyo-Oka it was indicated that 2,896 houses had been destroyed and the damage would have mounted higher had the population been urban rather than rural.

In Toyo-Oka the firemen were in despair as the water mains broke, thus leaving most of the town to the mercy of the fire.

WALL STREET FEARS FORD.

It's not long since Wall street attempted to squeeze Henry Ford in a little financial transaction, but he escaped the strangle hold. Since then he bought a bankrupt railroad for less than a dollar a share and, withstanding the poo-hoos and predictions of Wall street, has increased the value of the stock more than 100 times. Wall street doesn't like this kind of efficiency.

More recently Mr. Ford entered the shipping business and is now successfully operating freight lines to Europe, Australia and South America. That's another bad example of efficiency.

Now Mr. Ford offers to buy almost half the fleet of 900 United States shipping board vessels that are rolling at anchor and only fit for junk. But again Wall street protests, notwithstanding the fact that he promises to junk all but 24 or 30 of them. He is interfering with some of the favored ones that congress protects.

Within the week it is announced that Mr. Ford has involved Wall street by acquiring a banking house—and the old-timers of the gold-brick district express the same alarm as do the rum runners along the coast. There is nothing surprising in the fact that Mr. Ford should enter the banking business, except the fact that he has expressed some sound and sane ideas regarding the business that Wall street does not fancy, and he is looked upon as an interloper—a poacher on private preserves.

Back of it all, however, is the possibility that he may be a contender for the Muscle Shoals power franchise. If he should acquire this property he might revolutionize some of the ancient governmental graft games by giving the people a square deal. Wall street will oppose such a horrible example, but, under the law, it is up to President Coolidge to make the final decision. As a matter of fact, if the government would turn the management of the plant over to him without the payment of a dollar, it would probably be the best investment the government has made in a generation.

A celebrated surgeon wants to put his stamp on operations—presumably as an advertisement. It won't do. It's unethical to advertise—especially by having the doctor's name engraved somewhere on your tummy or leg, or arm, or perhaps on your face. It wouldn't be long before the cross-roads bill boards would be considered things of beauty.

A home cannot be made too beautiful. Neither can an office. Neither can a city. The more beauty there is in this world, the more happiness there will be. If we love beauty in all its forms and manifestations, we are bound to think beautiful thoughts and live beautiful lives, no matter how much we have to contend with.

According to the findings of a great many grand juries the only evidence they recognize seems to be the "juice" itself. If it's good the prisoner is not guilty. If it's white male he may be subject to a fine or a reprimand. It's got to be wood alcohol to convict of illegal rumming.

More gold bricks are prepared and sold in Wall street than in all the balance of the nation combined. That seems to be headquarters for suckers, rural as well as hard-boiled.

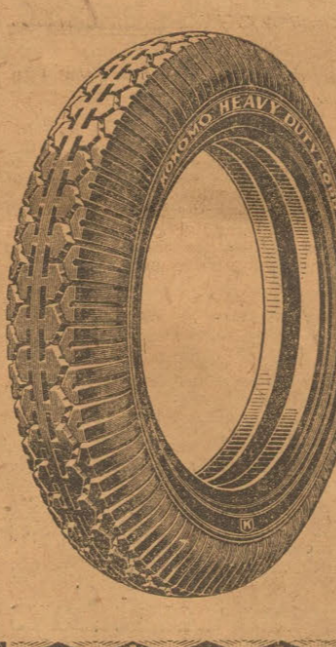

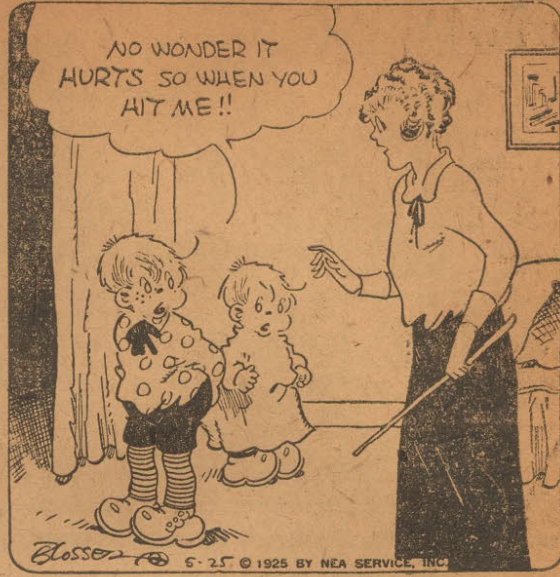

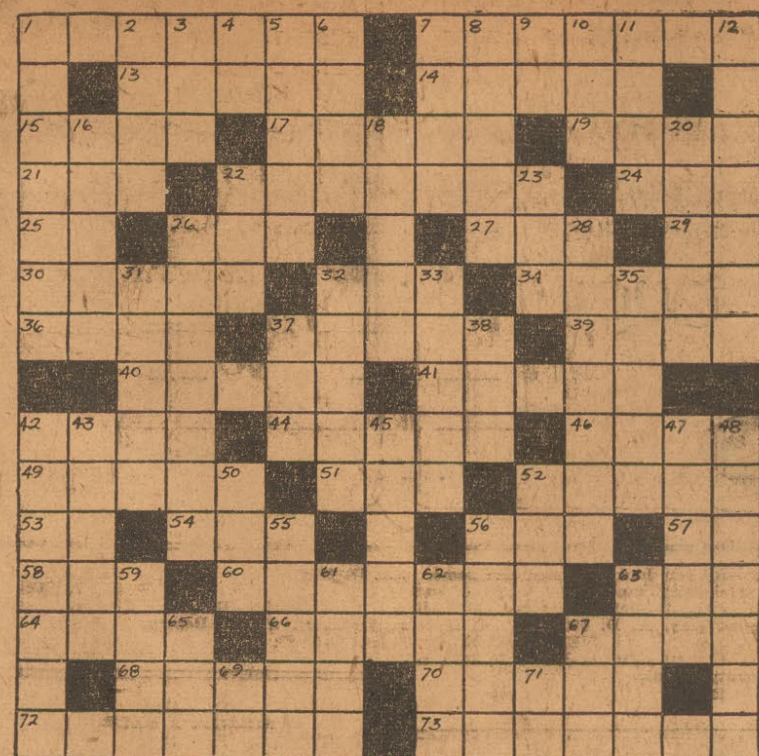
GELATINE AIDS CANDY MAKING

Among these may be mentioned fruit jelly chocolates, plum chocolates, apricot centers, pineapple jelly chocolates, gum drops, coconut nougat, frozen cream chocolates, and rose jelly gum

(Cook to 244 or to soft ball when tried in cold water.)
Put sugar, cream, syrup and salt together, stirring constantly while cooking. When batch is boiling add butter. Continue to cook until required degree is reached. Then remove from fire, and add vanilla, and gelatine that has been softened in 1 tablespoon cold water. Pour into oiled pan about 1/2 inch thick. When cool, cut into pieces 1 inch wide by 1 1/2 inches long. Wrap in wax paper.

Cocoanut Fudge.
1 tablespoon gelatine, 2 cups sugar, 3-4 cup milk, 1 tablespoon vanilla, 3-4 cup shredded cocoanut.
(Cook to 238 or until soft ball when tried in cold water.)
Soak gelatine in 2 tablespoons cold water five minutes. Put sugar and milk together and cook until required degree is obtained. Then add soaked gelatine, butter and vanilla. Beat in kettle until creamy, add cocoanut and turn into buttered pan.
