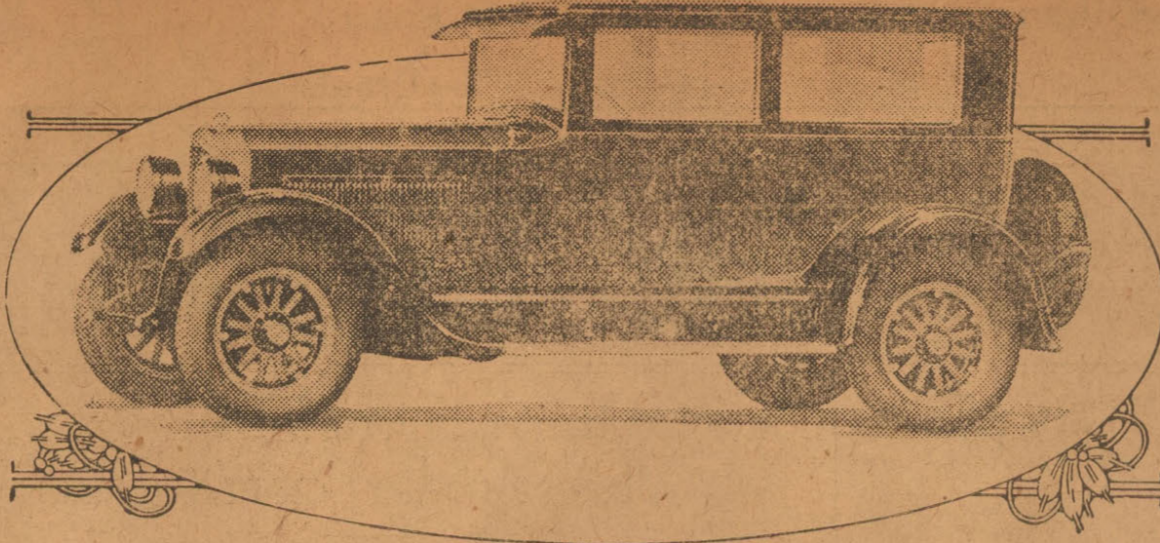

COURT SAYS CONVICTION INTOLERABLE

AUSTIN, May 13.—Will Barnes, young Arkansas farmer, convicted at Dallas of robbery and sentenced to 25 years, today was given another trial by the court of criminal appeals. The court said, "To allow the conviction to stand would be intolerable."

He got wise to a gang of robbers and notified police and, under instructions, he worked with the gang. After they pulled a robbery, Barnes made a report to the police. He along with others was arrested and convicted.

Madame Caillaux Regains Place In Society of France

PARIS, May 13.—Madame Joseph Caillaux has re-entered society, a return made possible by her husband's cabinet post a minister of finance. At the reception at the British embassy in honor of President Doumergue, attended by practically all the ministers of the Painleve government and their wives, Madame Caillaux was the center of interest. It is now nearly nine years since she shot and killed Gaston Calmette, editor of the Figaro, because of his remarks upon her husband who at the time was minister of finance in a cabinet of which President Doumergue was then premier. Madame Caillaux's banishment with her husband, who was deprived of his political rights and forbidden to enter the cities of France. Now with her husband returned to power, she is again in the foremost rank of society and making the most of it.

### How Steinmetz Came to America

The late Charles F. Steinmetz, the inventor of "artificial lightning," lived in Zurich, Austria, the better part of the year 1888. After many efforts he finally succeeded in entering Polytechnic, and studied there for nine months, earning a slender income writing and tutoring on the side. While there he made a bosom friend—a young Dane named Oscar Asmusen, whose rich uncle in California was paying his way at the Polytechnic.

Early in the spring of 1889, Asmusen aroused the displeasure of this uncle by making love to a Zurich maiden instead of devoting himself to his studies. He found his funds suddenly cut off; and, having no alternative, he was obliged forthwith to prepare to sail for America. Talking over this turn of events with Asmusen, Steinmetz expressed his desire to visit the great republic across the sea. This remark impelled Asmusen to urge Steinmetz to accompany him, and when Asmusen offered to supply Steinmetz's lack of funds for the trip the latter agreed.

Less than a week later Steinmetz severed all his old ties and yielded to

the lure of the New World. After a long but enjoyable passage he found himself, June 1, 1889, standing on the deck of the French immigrant liner La Champagne, gazing with wonder at the Statue of Liberty, which loomed before him in the waters of New York bay.

An odd little figure he presented, trudging down the gangplank beside the nonchalant Asmusen. In addition to his queer, dwarfish figure, his face was swollen with a cold caught during the ocean trip. He had no funds of his own, and, despite earnest efforts to learn English on the boat, he knew almost nothing of the language. When the immigration inspectors asked him if he could speak English, he replied: "A few." His traveling companion,

however, did not desert him in this crisis. Asmusen, in fluent English, offered to be responsible for Steinmetz's welfare, and displayed money which he declared belonged to them both. His representations won the day. Steinmetz, by this rather slender appeal, was admitted. America had gained another genius!—From The Mentor Magazine.

Mr. Gullahorn has been engaged in the automobile business for nine years, beginning as assistant to Mr. Newham at the Beaumont Ford company in Beaumont.

Recently purchasing the 100-foot lot directly across the street from his present location, formerly occupied by the Ranger Garage, Mr. Gullahorn plans to have a one-story, fire-proof garage and salesroom erected by fall, according to plans now under consideration.

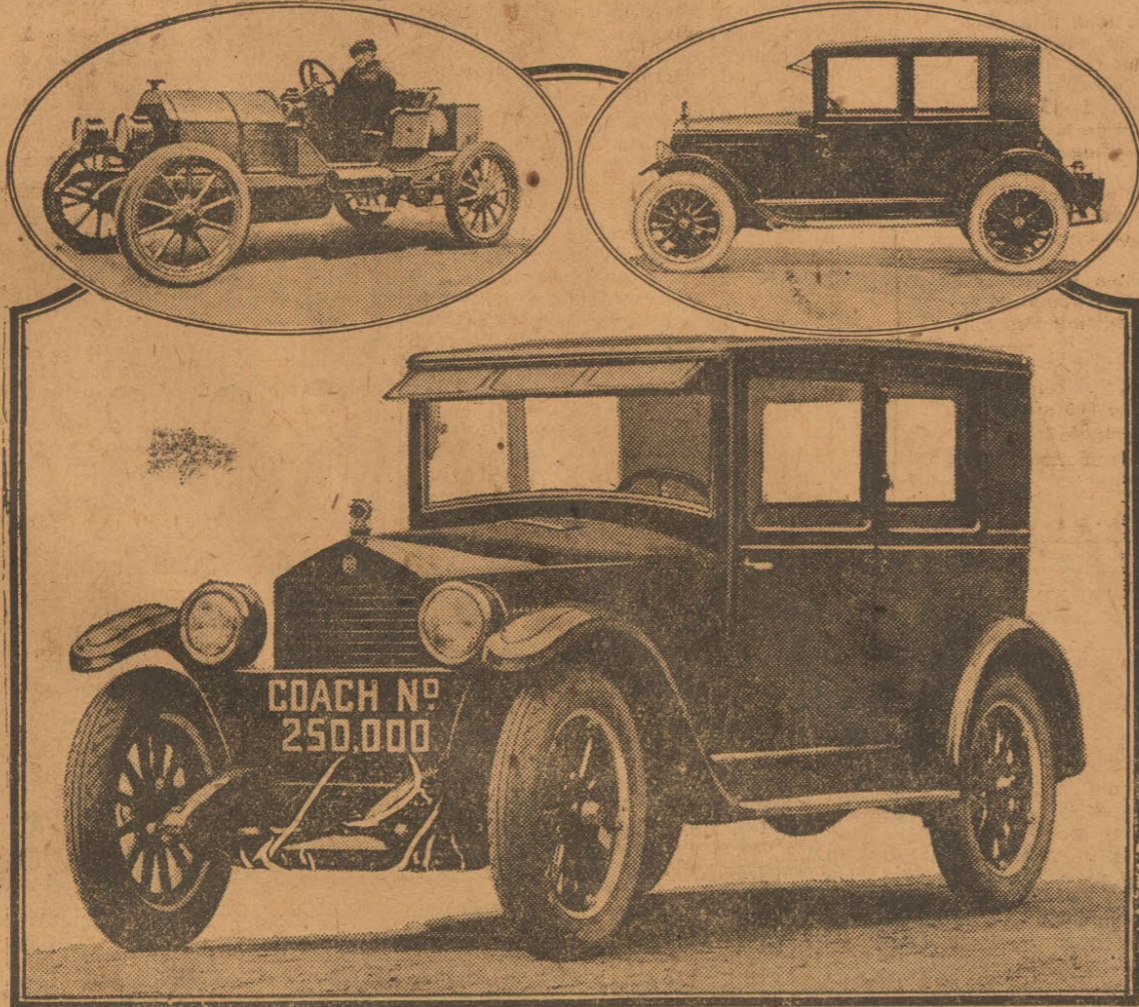

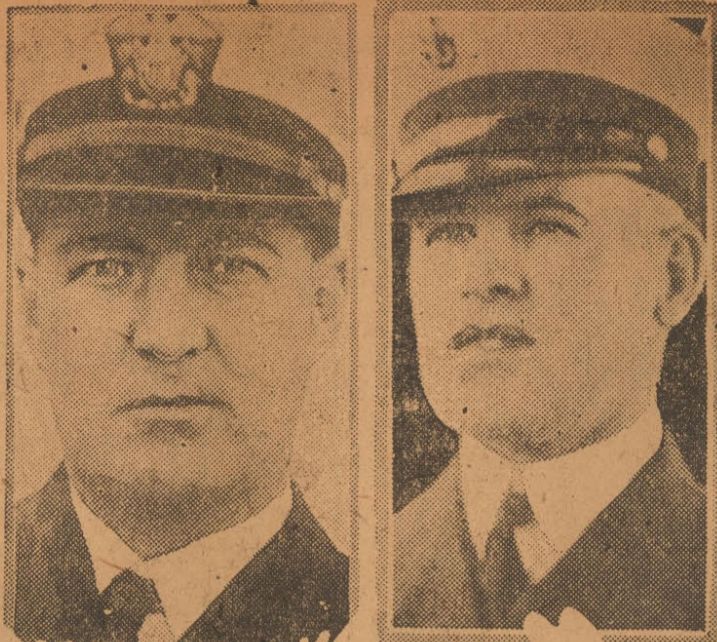

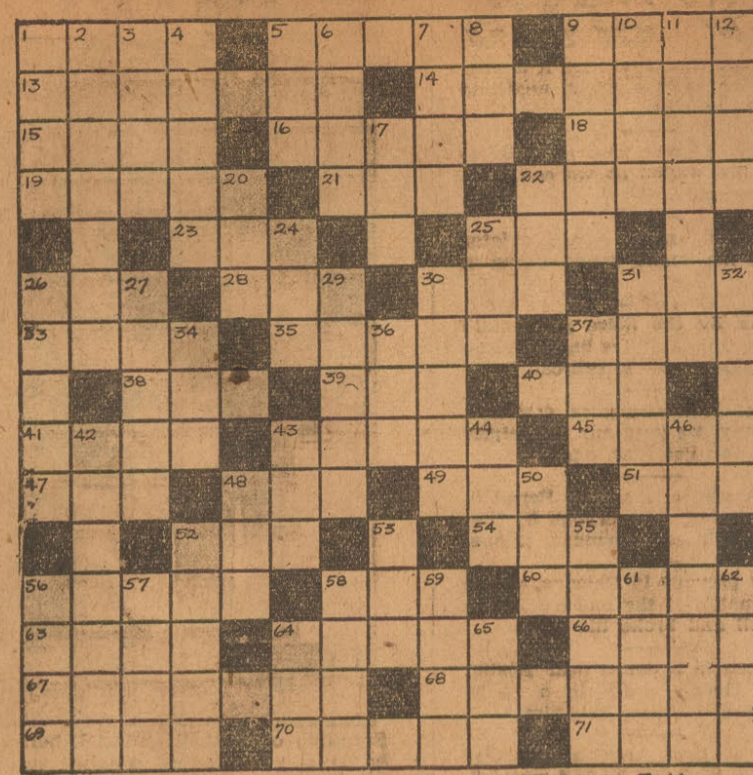
