OIL GUSHER NEAR RANGER MAKES RECORD

National Congress, Parent-Teachers Association Plans Child Development

NATION-WIDE INTEREST IN CONVENTION AT AUSTIN WHICH SEEKS CHILD LIFE BETTERMENT

The twenty-ninth annual convention of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, assembled last week at the Stephen F. Austin hotel in Austin, closed Saturday after a week of intensive work for the betterment of child development in both home and school.

The full force of a million American homes will be placed behind the progressive program of the legislative committee, whose recommendations for working plans were accepted unanimously as follows:

Peace—The congress will stand for reduction of armament by united agreement, recognition of the international laws, participation in permanent world court, home lasting organization of international relations.

Prohibition—No change in the Volstead act which would read out wine or beer or otherwise weaken enforcement.

Protection for Children—A national child labor law to be secured by a constitutional amendment.

Physical Education—Federal aid to states for the promotion of physical education following general lines of the Fess-Cooper physical education bill.

One Outside Fold. Only one state of the union is not now organized, Nevada, and plans are already on foot for her entrance into the national body.

Home, Service and Play. Dr. Willis Sutton, president of the Georgia Educational association, in an address to the convention, said the cure for laxity of morals and delinquency was a right home life.

Character Training. Thursday sessions entered into by American mothers from practically every state in the union, most of them attending the "character training table" presided over by Dr. Henry Neumann of Brooklyn.

RANGER BUSINESS MEN MUST ATTEND CONVENTION OF WEST TEXAS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

In view of the great activity in all lines of business that has sprung up at Ranger since the Pritchard No. 1 well of Barkley and associates was brought in 10 days ago with an initial production of about 2,000 barrels of oil daily that has now increased on the gauge to about 3,700 barrels daily, attracting a large number of oil men to Ranger and resulting in the immediate drilling of many new wells, many of the business men of Ranger may think they cannot spare the time to attend the annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to be held in Mineral Wells, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of this week.

PRITCHARD NO. 1 WELL DEVELOPS INTO LARGEST PRODUCER EVER DRILLED IN RANGER TERRITORY

Ranger's oil boom is assuming definite proportions with the increased production of Pritchard No. 1, located about seven miles northwest of Ranger, owned by G. C. Barkley and associates.

Blowing in for an estimated flow of 2,500 barrels with the tools in the hole, the Pritchard well steadied and dropped to 1,600 barrels, where the production remained steady with the oil flowing by heavy heads and spraying continually.

The tools were pulled Thursday and it was then discovered that the bit had been lost. Work of fishing for the bit started and it was pulled out Friday morning.

The well is said to be the largest ever brought in adjacent to Ranger and closely approaches the record well brought in at Desdemona.

Oil in the new pool is of the highest test gravity that draws the top price for crude today, testing 40.6 degrees Baumé gravity.

New locations are being made by several of the independent operators who have leases in that territory. Preparations are being rushed in order to start drilling as soon as possible.

As a result of the bringing in of the Barkley well, Ranger is filling up with oil men from everywhere and all are jubilant over the increasing production of the well.

Many farmers were in Ranger yesterday to negotiate leases with operators able and willing to drill. Several years ago many of the leases obtained for modest cash sums were used merely for trading.

Scenes in Ranger yesterday somewhat resembled those of oil boom days. The city is full of strangers, hotels and rooming houses are filling fast, houses are in demand and scarce, labor, too, being in demand.

CRUDE OIL REPORT.

AUSTIN, May 2.—Crude oil gathered by pipe lines in Texas in March totaled 12,682,103 barrels, an increase of 2,355,762 barrels over February gatherings, according to the railroad commission's monthly statement issued today.

BIG NARCOTICS RING ATTACKED, ARRESTS MADE

Alleged "Master Mind" Held In New York; Seven Jailed In Dallas.

DALLAS, May 2.—Breaking up of a gigantic "mail-order business" in narcotics was claimed by federal authorities here today. Seven persons are in jail at Dallas, Muskogee, Okla., and New York city and drugs worth \$50,000 at bootleg prices were seized here, according to Assistant United States District Attorney Randolph Caldwell. Four men and one woman were jailed in Dallas, one man at Muskogee, Okla., and the alleged "master mind" of the ring is said to be in custody at New York. Several other arrests at Newark, N. J., and New York are expected shortly, Caldwell said. Government agents declare the drugs were obtained by "agents" of the ring in New York, from smugglers in Germany and mailed from the east to Dallas. The "mail order business" has been in progress for three months, it was charged. Dallas was claimed as the "south-western office" of the ring, while

New York was the main office. Five formal complaints have been filed before United States Commissioner Clinton Bailey here.

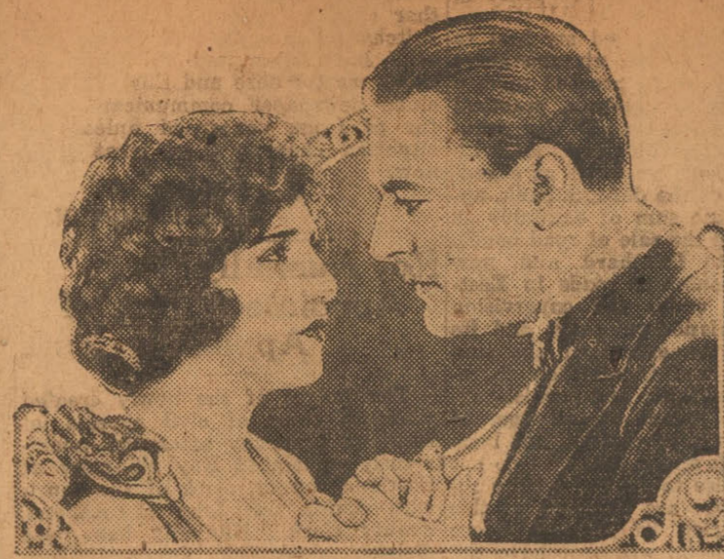
C. F. Jones, Aged Pioneer, Is Dead

COMMUNISTS EMPLOY SPIES TO HELP THEM IN SOFIA

ATHENS, Greece, May 2.—Numerous women, including Sultana Petrova, wife of former Premier Petrova of Bulgaria, are alleged to have been employed by spies of communists in the recent attempt to overthrow the Zankoff regime, according to advices from Sofia. It is understood investigation has disclosed the fact that an engineer made the bomb that wrecked the Sveti Krall cathedral. Heads of public service departments in Sofia have been ordered to submit to the authorities lists of communists employees, who will be summarily dismissed.

DENVER, May 2.—Cross-examination of four of the 19 Denver policemen on trial before city authorities had failed today to shake the general denial of guilt on charges of graft against them. **AMERICA'S DIET
MORE SENSIBLE
THAN FORMERLY**

America's diet has been improved and simplified due to prohibition, according to Martha Coman writing recently in the New York Sun.

Since the hotels have been obliged to discontinue strong alcoholic drinks, more attention is being paid to the dietary value of food. Mr. Adolph Meyer food expert of the Hotel Plaza, is quoted as saying: "People are eating far more intelligently than they used to. They have learned what the right combinations of food are and they are ordering lighter dishes instead of the heavy ones that used to figure prominently on every restaurant menu."

"American food is more adaptable to the wineless program than some of the foreign dishes, which seem to require a light wine to improve their palatability and digestibility."

The article calls attention to the fact that we have now become a "salad eating nation." Mention is made of the newer and higher dietetic education which calls for whole wheat and bran.

"Nowhere has prohibition had a greater effect on the menu than in the desert course. The trade in sweets has increased enormously since the exit of alcoholic beverages. The only ones who do not partake

of pastries at least once a day are those who practice self denial in order to keep thin. The quantity of pastries sold now in treble what it used to be, and the number of pastry shops that have sprung up since prohibition became a law has increased by thousands. This is directly due to the lack of wine and is converting America into a sweet eating nation, according to authorities, who are concentrating as much on varieties of pastry as on salads and fresh vegetables."
