NEW YORK, May 27—Mexico will accept recognition by the United States only on a basis which will not affect her sovereignty, President Alvaro Obregon declared today in an exclusive statement cabled to the United Press.

The Mexican leader added that "a treaty is not necessary for his coun-

treaty is not necessary for his country to recognize her international obligations which are hers as an independent nation."

Public Event Will Include Procession of Inspecting Citizens and Officials.

EASTLAND, May 26.—On Thurs. day, June 16, the people of Eastland county will have their first opportunity to ride over a completed road in

ty to ride over a completed road in this county, according to announcement of County Judge C. R. Starnes, county judge of Eastland county.

The commissioers' court of Eastland county has decided to make the opening of this road a county event. All the people of the county will be invited to make a minute inspection of all the roads in the county on that date. This inspection will include every phase of road construction from the clearing and fence work, through the grubbing and grading, culvert work, laying of crushed rock, on up to the steel bridges and finished asphalt work. Plans of the engineers are now being worked out so that the itinerary of the procession will cover every part of the work on the roads in Eastland county.

WASHINGTON, May 27.—Private American investors now are "grubstaking" foreign industry and foreign governments at the rate of \$1,000,000 a day through purchase of bonds, stocks and other securities, according to estimates made by New York bankers which have reached government officials here.

Dollars are flowing abroad in a steady stream in search of hope for large dividends. The stream began immediately after the outbreak of the great war and has continued ever since almost without break. During the last twelve months, approximately \$350,000,000 has been loaned to foreign borrowers, despite the nation-wide economic depression in the United States.




