SITE CHOSEN FOR COUNTY-CITY HOSPITAL

A site for the city-county hospital was purchased yesterday from W. K. Gordon for a consideration of \$1,500 and consists of four and one-half acres of ground. It is located just at the foot of Eastland hill near Hodges street. If Mesquite street continued up the hill it would cross the land, it is said. The locality is considered ideal by the physicians' committee, members of the city commission and County Judge Starnes, all of whom passed upon it. The building, it is said, will be on a bench that will place it high above other buildings but will not be too high to be easily accessible. When it is complete it will be an outstanding feature to the view of travelers coming from three directions, it is said.

With the site settled a conference will be held with the architect and bids will be asked. These bids will be asked for on a cash basis. With \$35,000 cash available, it is believed that the building can be erected on a cash basis since several months must pass before its final completion.

BANKERS PLANNING TRIP TO MEXICO WITH TRADE EXCURSION

STAMFORD, May 27.—The list of reservations made for the Mexican trade tour of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce discloses the fact that many bankers who had planned to make the trip to Mexico City with the bankers' special train following the convention of the State Bankers' association are going with the trade excursion June 18.

"I feel it is going to be of great value to our section," said one banker from the south plains who had made reservations and was discussing the trade possibilities that can be developed. He is also a prominent cattleman and it is his opinion that a valuable trade in livestock will develop between west Texas and Mexico if properly handled. Porter A. Whately, manager of the

West Texas Chamber of Commerce, spent yesterday in Wichita Falls arranging for a delegation from that point and from there will make stops at Amarillo, Plainview, Lubbock and other cities of the plains. Ed. P. Byars, traffic manager, reports that between sixty and seventy will make the trip from Fort Worth. Arrangements are being made to expediate formalities necessary in securing passports and every one who contemplates making the trip should bear in mind that a small photograph is necessary to be attached to the passport at Laredo.

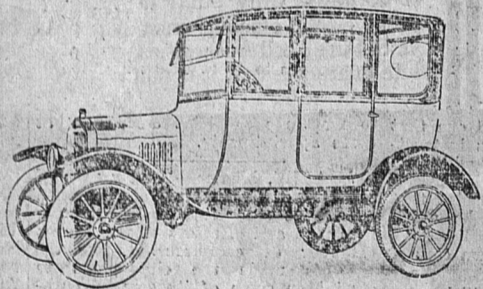

U. S. PAYS MILLION A DAY TO KEEP THE SHERIFF AWAY

By RALPH FORD COUCH, United Press Staff Correspondent. WASHINGTON, May 27.—Private American investors now are "grubstaking" foreign industry and foreign governments at the rate of \$1,000,000 a day through purchase of bonds, stocks and other securities, according to estimates made by New York bankers which have reached government officials here.

Dollars are flowing abroad in a steady stream in search of hope for large dividends. The stream began immediately after the outbreak of the great war and has continued ever since almost without break. During the last twelve months, approximately \$350,000,000 has been loaned to foreign borrowers, despite the nationwide economic depression in the United States.

American dollars now are building docks and packing houses in South America, municipal waterworks and tram lines in cities of Switzerland and other European countries, elevators in Canada, and factories in

France. And the dollars that are working abroad are not the dollars of only American capitalists. In large proportion they were invested only after having been saved from wage and salary envelopes. Through the Edge law the foreign trade and banking corporations now being organized in many parts of the country, every American who can save a dollar is being given the chance to get his opportunity at foreign investment, if he so chooses.

At the beginning of the great war, the United States owed European investors approximately \$2,000,000,000. This was money which Europeans loaned during the big expansion period that began in 1890. It was represented by stocks in mines, railroads and manufacturing plants. It paid more than \$80,000,000 a year to the foreign owners in interest charges and dividends. Soon after the war, Europe began to find herself badly in need of enormous credits in the United States. Gradually the \$2,000,000,000 came back to this country to help pay Europe's rapidly mounting debt here. Soon the credit was exhausted. The United States had earned enough to buy back all the foreign interests in domestic industry.

Then the United States began to loan. At first the loans were counted in millions. Now the total is approximately \$2,000,000,000, or almost precisely the amount which the United States formerly owed European investors.

This grand total of American investments abroad is in addition to about \$13,000,000,000 loaned to foreign governments by this government, in \$10,000,000,000 worth of direct war loans and about \$3,500,000,000 credit on surplus war and navy materials.

LEAGUE OF NATIONS HAS ONE HUNDRED TREATIES

GENEVA.—(United Press.)—That open diplomacy has made some progress since the war—despite all setbacks—was shown today when the League of Nations announced a total of 100 international treaties had now been duly registered with it since Versailles.

The last bundle to arrive included the Russo-British trade agreement, recently signed at London.

Of the 100 mentioned above, England has registered twenty-three. The ambassadors' council, acting for the allied powers, has sent in thirteen, while Germany and France have each recorded twelve.

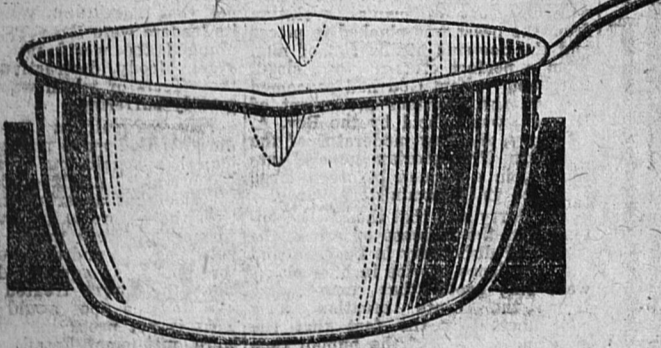

COLLECTING OF SCHOOL-CITY TAX COMBINED

The offices of the school and city tax collectors and assessors will be operated together by an arrangement perfected yesterday by the city commission and members of the school board. E. A. Ringold was appointed as assessor and collector for the city and Clarence Love will fill that position for the schools. Under the arrangement made the business of the two will be kept separate but the two men will devote their time to both. Ringold will be at the head of the combined office with Love as his assistant.

Through this arrangement it is believed by both the commission and the school board that both offices may be made more efficient and that neither will need to employ assistants.

While acting as secretary to John M. Gholson during the past two years Love has cared for nearly all the business of the schools and for this reason was thought to be the best man possible for the place for which he has been chosen.

Ringold has been in the city tax office since its organization and according to the commission, has an unusual ability for collecting taxes. The salary of the city collector was fixed at \$300 a month while it is believed Love will be paid \$225 a month for his services.

These figures were considered reasonable for the services of the men of the ability of those employed.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., May 27.—Working her way through college means many things to the young woman at Radcliffe. In her spare time she may be acting as a clerk, shopping for hire, rocking a baby, swatting tennis balls as a coach, playing for dancers or teaching steps herself, mending clothing, reading proofs, keeping house or coaching plays.

LESS GAMBLING IN FRANCE

Women of Late Have Been the Most Reckless in the World—Famous Riviera Palaces of Chance; Montmartre is Happy Once More.

PARIS, May 26.—All reports agree that the gaming this year has not been sensational. No big fortunes have been won or lost. In the baccarat rooms at Nice almost the only heavy plungers have been Robert Siever and the Aga Khan. On one occasion the daughter of a well-known punter was missing the morning after her father had brought off a big coup, and the hotel cashier denied all knowledge of a sum of \$10,000, which she had been asked to bank in the hotel safe.

The mystery was cleared up later in the day when a telegram from Marseilles announced that the prudent girl was safely on her way home with the swag. Such instances of feminine sagacity are unfortunately rare on the Riviera, where this year, especially, it is the women who have been the most reckless gamblers.

And, of course, there has been the usual crop of tragedies and scandals. At Monte Carlo an Englishman of good family committed suicide in the rooms the other day after a disastrous run of luck, leaving a young

daughter penniless and almost friendless to face a huge hotel bill. At Cannes another lady well-known in the London world, has been arrested on a charge of pocket-picking. Very few of those unpleasant stories, of course, ever get into the public press.

At Monte Carlo especially there is the most wonderful organization for hushing up such inevitable by-products of the great gambling machine. No more skillful diplomatists exist than the Casina officials who are well aware that if the outside world once really understands the mass of misery and madness for which half a dozen roulette wheels are responsible, public opinion might make it very difficult for a humane and cultured man like the Prince of Monaco to renew the Casina company's concession.

Paris—on the surface at any rate—is gradually getting back to pre-war condition. The prefect of police now graciously allows cafes and restaurants to remain open till 2 a. m., and theatres until 12:30. So Montmartre is happy once more and has

regained much of its old liveliness, but in central Paris people seem to have lost the taste for midnight supping and carousing.

If you want "on-with-the-dance-let-joy-be-unrestrained" sort of thing you must climb the "Butte," where you will find a number of new establishments ready to supply all the necessary ingredients of a night out. Paris is preparing for a bumper tourist season, but it is not doing it noticeably by reducing prices, very little of the fall in wholesale quotations having yet trickled down to the public.

At any rate, hotel, restaurant, and amusement prices have scarcely budged so far, and a disastrously dry season throughout France points rather to a fresh rise in the general cost of living.

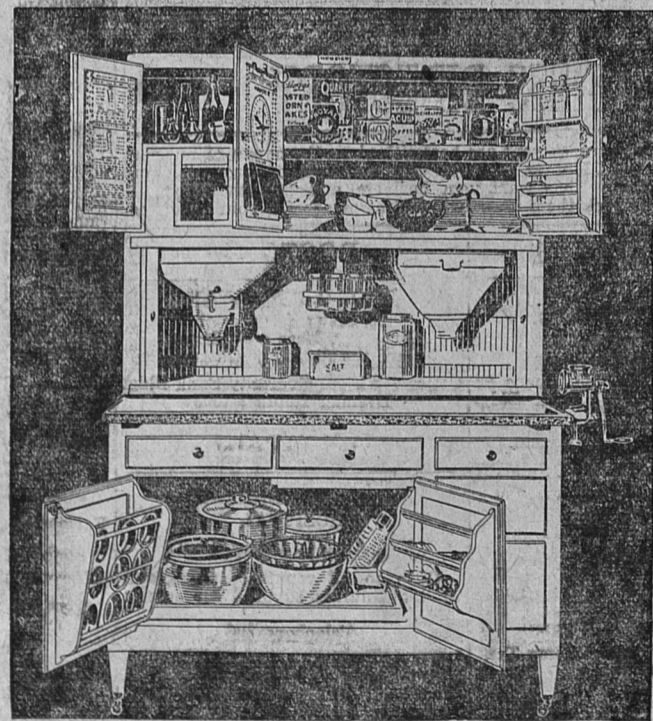
