"The grain sorghums are to the plains country of Texas what corn is to the corn belt of the state. Much of the 160 acres of the station is given over to the grain sorghum plats. Experimenting over a period of 10 years with variety, environmental and breeding tests, the yield of grain sor-ghums has been raised six bushels per acre by the station. Since the acreage devoted to grain sorghums in that section is almost equal to that of all other crops combined, the selection of the proper strains is of the utmost importance. The best insurance for the West Texas farmer is to follow the example of the superintendent of the experiment station and reserve enough feed for a two year's supply." Mr. Downs also reported that the business and professional men, as well as the farmers, are co-operating with the experiment station work in West Texas.


