Well Jumped to Steady Gait 100 an Hour; Tanks All Overflowed.

A flow of oil rivaling if not exceeding its initial production is coming from the Texas Pacific company's Stewart No. 2, north of Lacassa. This well, which came in as a gasser and gradually blew into oil, reaching a production of 2,400 a day, had 1,400 feet of open hole, which gradually bridged about 1,000 feet from the bottom and the flow dwindled to 700 barrels.

Drilled Saturday.

This bridge was drilled out Saturday and with its removal the well jumped to a steady gait of at least 100 barrels an hour and probably more. The production, however, can only be estimated, as all storage tanks are overflowed and the well is not on the gauge. The company is said to be providing earthen storage.

About half a dozen other wells are drilling in this pool, which scouts say is about two miles in diameter. diameter.

TEXAS FORESTS ARE NEARING

By BASCOM N. TIMMONS

WASHINGTON, May 16.—Texas
forests are rapidly nearing extinction,
if a statement given out by the Bureau of the Census Thursday can be
taken as a critician taken as a criterion.

While the statement did not contain the number of trees that have been hewn or the exact amount of lumber that has been milled, it did contain a list of the lumber mills that are in active operation and this is thought to be a more accurate barometer on the iumber industry than either of the others. Texas, and likewise every other lumber producing state in the nation, showed an alarming decrease in the number of mills.

From 663 mills that were in active

showed an alarming decrease in the number of mills.

From 663 mills that were in active operation in 1909 Texas dropped to 444 in 1919, according to the statement by the census. This is a decrease of 217 mills, or slightly less than a one-third reduction.

In yet another way does the census bureau show that the Texas forestry situation is rapidly becoming serious. That is in the amount of lumber that is manufactured by all mills that have a capacity of 50,000 feet, or more annually.

The 1909 production of lumber in the Lone Star state was 2,099,100 feet while in 1919 the production had dropped to 1,279,800 feet.

The total value, at the mill, of the lumber manufactured in the nation during 1919 was approximately \$1,043,932,000, or an average of \$30.21 per thousand feet for the cut of 1909. The total value of the lath cut in 1919 was \$2,229,000 and of the shingles, approximately \$41,118,000.
