DIVORCE WAS TO HAVE BEEN WITHDRAWN

Warren Wagner did not refuse to see or talk to his wife, Mrs. Norma Wagner, as he lay on his death bed in a Fort Worth hospital Monday evening, but on the contrary, Mr. Wagner sent for his wife and was only prevented from imparting a last message to her when the weakness of approaching death intervened, according to Dr. R. Robertson, manager of the Wagner Supply Company in Ranger.

OPERATORS ASK FOR TARIFF TO PROTECT OIL

WICHITA FALLS, May 12.—A protective tariff on crude oil and efforts to prevail upon operators in the Texas fields to terminate at once the most imperative operations for oil production were embodied in resolutions adopted by the oil and gas division of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and the board of directors of the organization were asked to take steps to bring these things about, at a meeting held here this morning.

Recommendations to the board of directors of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce that all but necessary operations in the oil fields be suspended was adopted over the protest of the El Paso and South Bend Chambers of Commerce. El Paso and South Bend are both new oil towns, having been developed during the past several months due to the great oil development in North Stephens and Southern Young counties. They are dependent altogether on oil operations.

RANGER REF'G & P. L. CO. OFFERS LEGAL TANGLE

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MORE THAN SCORE OF ARMED CONVICTS ARE REPORTED ESCAPED

One Guard Said to Be Dying After Men Seize Guns and Ammunition From Armory and Take to Railroad; Citizens on Search.

HOUSTON, May 12.—A mutiny in the state penitentiary in Huntsville in which twenty-five to thirty-three white convicts escaped after shooting several guards was reported by telephone to local police shortly before noon today. Sheriff T. A. Binford assembled deputies to go to Huntsville. Many of the convicts obtained guns, it was said. They fled from Huntsville toward Phelps, a railroad junction a few miles distant from the prison.

SLAYING OF BLOND-HAIRED BOY IN RANGER MAY DEVELOP FINE LEGAL ENTANGLEMENTS

EASTLAND, May 12.—A rather peculiar, not to say remarkable incident came up in connection with the killing of a boy in Ranger some time ago, for whose death one E. H. Kelly is charged with murder. The facts in the case are substantially as follows: The youth who was slain was detected in robbing the house of a neighbor of Kelly's in Ranger, this neighbor appeals to Kelly, who grabbed a high powered rifle and started in pursuit. The boy ran and Kelly fired, the bullet finding lodgment in the body of the youth, and resulting in his death.

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It occurs now, therefore, that Kelly will have to be re-indicted by an Eastland county grand jury, or complaint filed against him alleging that he killed a boy, to complainant unknown, before he can be properly tried.

Mr. Holmes lately. I can imagine no reason for him killing my husband."

Wife Hoped for Happiness.
"We had just now reached the place where we could have been reasonably comfortable. And happiness was just beginning to dawn. I was ready to withdraw my divorce suit Tuesday. We talked it all over Sunday night," the prostrate woman related.

Wagner had occupied the house on the adjoining lot since the divorce proceedings had been in progress.

"After we had a long talk Sunday night, Warren came over at 5 o'clock Monday morning and we talked until 7, when he went to his office. We were in the best humor with each other. I sat on his lap all the time he was here and he promised to do the right thing by me. I maintained that he should protect me on certain matters. And he had promised me faithfully that he would."

Wagner Seemed Happy.
"At noon Monday I was in his office. He seemed so happy. At that time he repeated to me that he had found himself and that he was glad. A mutual friend of ours from Dallas came over and talked to Warren. At

that time Warren cried and said he knew he had been the cause of our trouble and he wanted to make restitution. I pledged him then that I would not push the divorce suit and that as soon as he arranged these business matters to my satisfaction that I would withdraw my suit.

Wagner Asked for Wife.
"Do you think in the face of relations like that that my husband could have refused to see me on his death bed? Oh, no. He did not refuse to see me. He asked for me and I took our two boys and rushed to him. But he did not regain consciousness. If he had recognized us I know he would have shown some sign when our boy put his arms around his neck and called 'Daddy, daddy.' It is not true that he refused to see me."

"All that I heard Warren say was, 'Daughter, daughter,' as he paused between cries for relief. I have never heard him say that word before, so far as I know. I can place no interpretation upon it. That he made his peace with God I feel sure, because of the infinite peace that came into his face and lingered there after death. For this I am grateful. And that I had a frail part in bringing about the reconciliation gives me relief," she said, as tears coursed down her face and dropped on the pillow. Mrs. Wagner is a slight woman, frail and delicate. Her hair is slightly gray and her features are marked.

Mother and Brother Arrive.
Fritz Swift, a brother of Mrs. Wagner, and her mother were with her Wednesday. Relatives are arriving from all points today. The mother and father of the dead man will arrive from W. Virginia for the funeral. Other relatives of Wagner are expected.

Swift said that he could ascribe no cause for Holmes shooting his brother-in-law. He stated that he had known Holmes in a business way, and denied that any family trouble could have been responsible for the

killing. Guy Fisher of Oklahoma, close personal friend of Wagner's arrived Wednesday morning. "The boys tell me that I know Holmes, but I can't place him. It is all a mystery to me. If I ever knew him, I don't remember him. Warren Wagner and I have been close friends for years. I am certainly on a shoreless sea in the matter."

Funeral services for Mr. Wagner will be held Friday afternoon in Fort Worth, when it is expected that his father and mother from West Virginia will have arrived.

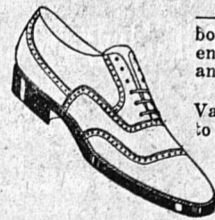

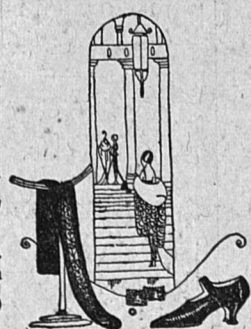
