# PROSECUTION

EASTLAND, April 6.-A widespread conspiracy to permit open gambling in Eastland county and improper selection of talesmen for the Cleve Barnes trial were alleged by County Attorney Dunnam when the case came up in the Eighty-eighth district court here today.

Dunnam asked the court to quash a special venire which he alleged was not drawn in open court and was drawn without the state having its representatives present or being informed of the

drawing.

The defense's contention was that he had not given the check to the company but to L. L. Reavis in person, and furthermore that instead of receiving \$11 change, he actually received \$11.15.

It was claimed that the in-dictment was faulty in these particulars, and the acquittal followed.

He asked that this venire be quashed and the jury be selected from the regular panel drawn by the jury commissioners, and said that in any event this panel should be exhausted before a special talesmen were called.

The motion was overruled and Dunnam then asked for a continuance, on account of the absence of material witnesses. This was granted and the trial of Cleve Barnes on the charge of running a gambling house went over until the

HEART BEATS HEARD HUNDREDS OF MILES THROUGH NEW SERVICE



An amplifying apparatus so delicate as to permit a physician to make stethoscopic study of heart action of a patient hundreds of miles away has been successfully demonstrated in the U. S. army signal corps laboratories. In the experiments the patient was in an adjoining room to the ampitheater where the audience was assembled, but the patient may have been on a ship in the middle of the Atlantic, and the radio transmitter made to send the delicate sound vibrations by wireless. The special heart transmitter, as seen in the upper photo, rests by its own weight over the patient's heart. The passage of the blood through the different valves causes vibrations in the air chamber which faithfully reproduces all the various actions. These are transmitted over the wire to the amplifying apparatus shown in the lower photo, which projects the sound throughout the building.

# ALLIES GET SHARP NOTES

WASHINGTON, April 6. — New washington, April 6.— New hotes on the subject of mandates have been sent by the American government to Japan, Great Britain, France and Italy. The documents are understood to be similar, but the occasion of preparing them was said to be the receipt of Japan's reply to the original American note protesting against the Japanese mandate over the former German islands north of the equator.

The latest American communications prepared by secretary Hughes and dated April 4, by this time have reached the four governments to which they were addressed.

# **CRAFTS CAN BOTH HANDS**

Blue Law Leader Admits He is a Two-Fisted Terror.

WASHINGTON, April 6.—Dr. Wilbur F. Crefts, pilots of the blue law movement in the United States, declared today he is a "two-fisted fighter" and could use the right hand in one cause and the left in another at the same time. In a letter to Benjamin B. Hampton, moving picture producer of Los Angeles, he said:

"The Clara Hamon case shows a need \(\alpha\)' something more than resolutions. Only laws can compel all to behave. It must be either laws in all states or one law such as I submitted in outline for consideration by producers, reformers and the public—a federal commission to license producers and also a contract to observe thirteen exclusion standards and require the same of all exhibitors supplied with their films. The Hamon case suggested one new standard, forbidding filming of real bandits and notorious adulteresses.

"I have not changed my stand taken at the New York conference," Dr. Crafts added. "I said censorship and Sunday fights must be separated. We oppose running business seven days a week. Absurd falschoods in motion picture bulletins about blue laws should be cut out. When thirty companies confess that films are bad every day, no effort should be made to butt into Sunday. If exclusion standards adopted by producers under your great leadership are really enforced, many people will doubtless favor Sunday movies. That is the stand of the United Catholic societies.
