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### RANGER MUST BE SANITARY AFTER MAY 1

Sanitary service will be compulsory twice a month where such service is necessary after May 1. This statement was made yesterday by Dr. R. H. Hodges, sanitary commissioner, and is in accordance with an ordinance that is now in effect.

The ruling means that it is not in the province of the householder to say whether he wants the service, but it is compulsory upon him to take it twice each month.

Dr. Hodges said that he had no desire to be hard on anyone, but that the summer season was approaching and with it the danger of typhoid and other ills and that it was essential to the common weal that every preventive measure possible be taken to keep down illness.

In discussing the situation the commissioner said that much needed to be done in a sanitary way and that it would be done as quickly as his department could get to it. He also said that it was his intention to see that the sanitary laws are obeyed.

### DOWN-AND-OUTERS SELDOM LOSE HEART

**EL PASO, April 29**—Men down and out seldom give up hope. This was the declaration of J. D. Gwin, secretary of the Associated Charities of El Paso.

"Out of the score of 'down-and-outers' in the men's home of the organization," he said, "we have only two or three who are disheartened. The rest of them hope to be on their feet again some day."

"One man here has invented a signal for railroad freight cars which he believes will make him rich. Another man, gray-haired, has a spring arm to use as an automatic signal."

### SLACKERS FLEE COUNTRY AS ARMY LIST IS DELAYED

**WASHINGTON, April 29**—While the government is marking time in publication of the list of slackers, large numbers of guilty draft evaders are leaving the country, according to John Thomas Taylor, vice-chairman of the national legislative committee of the American Legion. He said:

"Just the other day an ex-soldier came from Tampa to Washington for the express purpose of informing the department of justice that dozens of these men were beating it to Cuba."

**CORK, April 29**—The American steamer, Honolulu, has arrived here with William Pedlar, a naturalized American of Irish birth, who is being deported on board. The ship is under the supervision of armed police.

Pedlar was deported from Dublin in 1919 as a political prisoner. He was released from Ellis island, in New York harbor, after he had proved his citizenship. There has been no previous report that Pedlar again was in Ireland.

### DOG FINDS FIRE AND DIES FIGHTING IT

**NEW YORK, April 29**—Spot, a watchdog, discovered a \$200,000 fire in the factory of Joseph Hollander, Inc., fur dressers and dyers, and his zeal during the fire cost him his life. The fire, starting from a cigarette butt thrown aside in the workmen's dressing room, spread to all five floors. The destruction of 50,000 skins, which were to have been shipped today, constituted most of the loss.

Spot startled a dozen workers in the shipping room by rushing in, barking furiously. He wheeled and darted towards the fire, the workmen following. They sounded an alarm. By the time the firemen arrived the flames had reached the upper floors. Spot

GO NORTH, RANGER.

Along the Clear Fork from Crystal Falls to South Bend and Banger, in the Stephens county oil field, towns are springing up as numerous as blackbirds!

Rivalry is keen.

Sometimes only a small tract of land intervenes between two separate towns. It is comical to see the ends to which they go to pull the trade and get the people. One town in particular whose main street is only about three hundred yards from the main street of a rival town has erected a huge signboard conspicuous from the highway, reading:

"—, the Town Where the Pay Roll Is."

It is just such keen competition as this in "city" building that fosters business. Every town affected is trying to outvie with the others. In this way some considerable towns with clean streets and attractive residences are springing up in the Ranger country.

All these towns are "going to get the railroad."

That is, if you believe all of them. The fact of the matter is the majority of them will get the line now being built from Graham to Jimkirk and Breckenridge. Development of oil resources will be the most pronounced ever known in the Southwest. The taut strings of the tightwad, Financial Depression, will soon loosen and these little villages will build into towns of reputable size.

It is time that Ranger and its business interests evince deeper interest in those communities. Joseph Daniels Tells  
Story of American Navy's  
Exploits in World War

it again, but the dip of the ship spoiled his try and once more it escaped him. Waiting for what seemed a better chance, he made a third attempt to grab it. This time, just as he appeared to have his hands upon it, the Remlik gave a roll that flung the huge charge back upon him, almost crushing him. He barely saved himself, but turning quickly fell upon the bomb and held it. Depending it in a momentarily steady interval, he sat upon it—sat calmly until lines could be run to him with which he lashed it down.

Saves Ship and Crew.  
In recommending that the medal of honor, the highest decoration America has to give, should be conferred upon Mackenzie, the commanding officer of the Remlik said:

"Mackenzie, in acting as he did, exposed his life and prevented the probable loss of the ship and entire crew. Had this depth-charge exploded on the quarter-deck with the sea and wind that existed at the time, there is no doubt that the ship would have been lost."

Among the destroyers of the United States navy you will find the John Paul Donat, Lawrence, Farragut, Porter, Dewey and Ingram.

"Where did you get that last name?" somebody asks. "The others are familiar, but who was Ingram?"

The Ingram is the first ship of the navy to be named after an enlisted man, and it was my pride and pleasure to break a long-established precedent by thus honoring the memory of an American hero, who, in this life, never rose above the rating of a gunner's mate.

Osmond K. Ingram served on the Cassin, and the Cassin was patrolling in Irish water—where submarines were thicker than almost anywhere else in the seas.

On Oct. 15, 1917, the Cassin sighted a U-boat, and put on all speed to reach the spot where the periscope had shown. But the quarry had submerged. The Cassin kept up the search. A half hour passed and there was no sign of the enemy.

Time for Quick Action.

Then, suddenly, a torpedo was sighted. It was running at high speed and headed for the Cassin. When discovered it was less than 400 yards away. In order to avoid it the Cassin must act in seconds—almost split seconds.

"Double-emergency-full-speed" was signaled to the engine room, and the rudder put hard left.

Just as in the case of the Remlik, the stern of the Cassin was stored with depth-charges.

Gunner's Mate Ingram, cleaning the muzzle of his gun, saw that the torpedo was headed straight for the stern of the Cassin. If it exploded there, detonating the depth-charges it might sink the ship.

Fully aware of the peril he was running, Ingram, without a minute's hesitation, ran aft and began to strip the depth-charges and throw them overboard.

The Cassin had made a quick turn, and for a moment it looked as if the torpedo might pass astern. But when it was only fifteen or twenty feet away, it leaped, porpoise-like from the water and struck the ship.

Hero Instantly Killed.  
There was a terrific explosion. Gunner's Mate Ingram was killed instantly. But the Cassin remained afloat!

With rudder gone and stern shattered, it kept going, even though it could go only in circles; and its crew, when the U-boat emerged to see what had happened, opened fire. Dismayed at this show of fight the U-boat ducked again and quit the combat.

Help came for the Cassin, and she was taken to port, repaired and returned to service.

But Gunner's Mate Ingram had given his life to save the ship and her crew.

That is why the long-established precedent was broken and an American naval ship was named after an enlisted man.

I rather think the American people will say I was justified in breaking the precedent.

There were so many deeds of daring, so many instances of personal bravery, that these seem to characterize the entire service and I feel so strongly that only opportunity was needed for anyone of the half million to distinguish themselves that I might write beside the whole service—"Heroes All!"

Two fortunately came in one inning, one being Tate's homer and the other York's single. And both followed a free pass issued to Clopp, with the long drive last. Otherwise, the tenacious which made the contest fairly good would have been lacking.

Keck also was wild, though he showed it in a different manner from Crowson. He walked only two men, but hit two and made two wild pitches. Worse still, his curves were not breaking where he wanted them to. 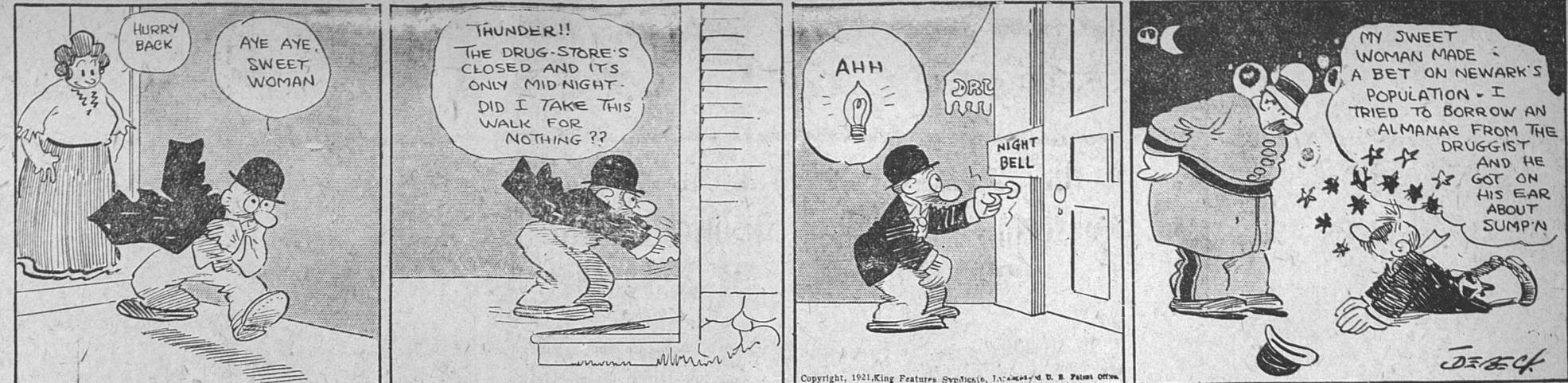
