SLUMP IN COAL

"Buy Only as Needed" Policy Declared Dangerous by Investigators.

WASHINGTON, March 26 .- Consumers, and not the railroad, the operators or the miners are responsible for present depression in the bituminous coal industry, Dr. George Otis Smith, director, and F. G. Tryon, coal statistician of the geological survey, declared in a statement issued been tonight.

A policy of "buy only as needed," is being pursued dangerously by bituminous consumers, the statement said. Empty coal bins will be the result, it was said, should a sudden industrial upturn develop, as in such an event the mines would be unable to produce and the railroads unable to carry sufficient coal.

Reports of the bituminous production for the last six months, the statement said, show constant declines, 6,525,000 being the production for the first week in March, as contrasted with a weekly production of around 12,000,000 during the first week of the present month. Twenty-six thousand soft coal mines reported to the geological survey an average employment of only nineteen out of a possible forty-eight hours. Only a few hours were lost at a few mines, it was said, because of car shortage and but little because of local strikes in Missouri and Kansas.
