

SOCIALISTS IN SOUTH AMERICA ARE DIVIDED

Split Due to Protest Against Lenine's World Revolt Program.

BUENOS AIRES, March 25.—The Socialist party of Argentina, like those of many European countries, has been split into two factions by the adoption at a recent party convention of a resolution not to give adherence to the third international congress of Socialists at Moscow—the Lenin-Trotsky organization which advocates a world revolution by the proletariat.

Soon after the convention, the executive council of the party began discussing the expulsion of a large number of the extremists element, among them the entire staff of the radical publication, Claridad. Some of those expelled were members of various district committees which thereupon resigned from the party in a body. Led by Claridad, they are taking steps to organize as a separate body to continue their campaign for revolutionary action.

Demands were voiced for the expulsion also from the party of Senator del Valle Iberlucea and Deputy Bunge, who led the fight in the convention for adherence to the Lenin-Trotsky doctrine. The executive council replied that, since these men were national legislators elected on the Socialist ticket, it was not in the power of the council to take any disciplinary measures, such action lying with the party, but that the matter would be taken up at the next party convention the latter part of this year.

A demand also was made in the senate for the expulsion of Iberlucea from that body on the ground of alleged seditious utterances at the convention. This was followed by an attempt to have him tried in the federal courts for sedition. In the senate the matter was referred to a committee with instructions to report on the question of the jurisdiction of the senate in the case.

The accusation against him in the federal court, brought in Buenos Aires by a private citizen, was dismissed on the ground that the alleged crime was committed in Bahia Blanca where the convention was held, and that the Buenos Aires court had no jurisdiction.

to married folks or others who need rooms and cannot find them.

The officials say some profitable business has been done, but that the practice is being stopped by keeping a watch on those to whom marriage licenses are granted and withdrawing permission to occupy rooms unless the marriage is performed.

Marriages, however, eclipsed all previous records in the last year. The number has increased two-fold over pre-war years, and many fold over

the marriages during the war, which fell to less than half the normal number.

"Many young folks today are getting married here simply to get a room cheaply," said a Berlin official. "The cost of the dwelling is cut in half by the marriage of a man and a woman both of whom are working. They also feel they can cooperate to some advantage in the matter of food, which is a serious problem."

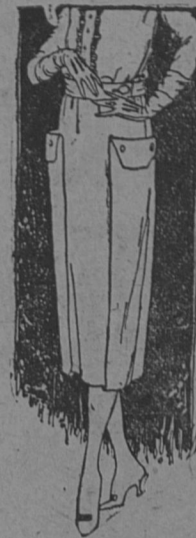

**JAPANESE GOVERNMENT
 BLAMED BY STATESMAN
 FOR TRAFFIC IN OPIUM**

 TOKIO, March 25.—Opposition charges of government irregularities in the opium traffic in the Kwantung leased territory were the basis of remarks by Representative M. Koba of the Nationalist group in the Diet.
 The speaker alleged that a private organization called the Kossi Zendo, which has the opium monopoly in Kwantung, though nominally Chinese, is really a Japanese concern and all the irregularities in the opium traffic in Manchuria are traceable to it.
 He read extracts from contracts said to exist between the Chinese under whose name this so-called "charity organization" is conducted and the Japanese who, he said, are behind the scenes. He also presented extracts from the books of the firm according to which the Japanese interested derived a profit of 286,500 yen between August 3, 1919, and March 21, 1920.

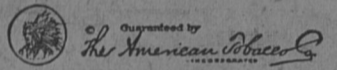

 Mr. Koba alleged that close relations exist between these Japanese and certain high officials in the Kwantung government general and it is on account of this that the Japanese have been able to make such large profits out of the opium trade. The speaker declared that the irregular transactions in opium have assumed such proportions that the drug has to be smuggled out of Kwantung into parts of China where its use is prohibited.
 Governor-General Yamagata of Kwantung replied that the government has in no way contravened international morality and that such smuggling as has occurred has been done by evading the government's control. He unqualifiedly denied any official connection with irregular transactions and said he was inclined to doubt the authenticity of the extracts of documents, books, etc., that had been read.

GERMAN BURGLARS UP AGAINST CLEVER DEVICE

BERLIN, March 25.—German burglars face a new obstacle in a strongbox which a Berlin inventor has just placed on the market. The portable steel box is equipped with an alarm which can be set before the lid is closed.
 When the box is lifted or moved ever so slightly the alarm sounds and can be stopped only by unlocking the box and adjusting the mechanism which controls the buzzer.
 Hotel guests are buying the strong-box and placing it against their doors at night, or setting it on luggage which they wish to protect. The boxes are produced in various sizes and with alarms varying in strength from an ordinary buzzer to a fire alarm gong.

DRUG TRAFFIC INN. Y. BROKEN, DEPUTY SAYS

Attention Now Turned to International Phase of Illegal Trade.

NEW YORK, March 25.—Claiming virtually to have broken the back of the illicit drug trade in New York City, in a four months' drive, Special Deputy Police Commissioner Carleton Simon today declared war on an international ring which he charges is responsible for illegal distribution of dope throughout the United States.

In the anti-narcotic drive here more than 1,000 arrests have been made and millions of dollars worth of drugs seized.

Although the illegal drug trade has been broken Dr. Simon asserted the work of his bureau is not only to continue here but is to be enlarged to meet the problems in other big cities in America and abroad.

By means of an international bureau of criminal records now being established, all data concerning drug crooks is to be ready for cities where "leads" pointing to New York might be uncovered, the commissioner said. Recently, he added, Antwerp police had requested information concerning an alleged leader of the international ring. It was shown by means of information furnished by New York that the man had police records in London, Paris, Brussels and New Orleans and had served prison sentences at various places aggregating twenty years.

"We made more arrests these past four months than in any twenty-four months heretofore," said Dr. Simon, who was selected to direct the drive because of his medical training. Every wing of the metropolitan police department was co-ordinated, working in conjunction with the federal agents. In consequence, "the fear" has been spread through the army of vendors.

Before he assumed his job, Dr. Simon said traffic in drugs in New York had reached an amazing state. His first move was to seek to clean up New York then aid in solving the drug vending problem in other cities—a resultant evil of the situation here.

Squads of special men were spread to all parts of the greater city, expert men picked to patrol the lower East Side where vendors were even using school children as "go-betweens" to supply addicts.

Constant watch was kept on incoming ships where alleged smugglers were resorting to all manner of tricks to "smuggle" the narcotics into this country. Arrests of persons on the docks revealed drugs hidden in artificial arms and limbs; in sausages and clothing. Once the anti-narcotic forces were working systematically and arrests became frequent, the situation soon gave evidence of being cleared up.

The almost daily raids in the city reached a climax recently in Brooklyn when agents entered an apartment, arrested several persons and seized drugs worth thousands of dollars. The great majority arrested were "curbstone" vendors.

EASTLAND MAN SUING TO RECOVER LARGE SUM

EASTLAND, March 25.—Suit has been filed in the Ninety-first district court wherein A. A. Hutton of Cisco is plaintiff and Higginbotham-Bartlett Co., of that city is defendant, Hut-

ton asking for damages in the sum of \$45,000.

Plaintiff alleges that he built a house in Cisco of a reasonable value of \$10,000, giving the contract to one J. L. Wrenn who built it; that he paid Wrenn for his services, a fact well known to J. E. McCord, the agent of the Higginbotham-Bartlett Lumber company; that later McCord or the company attempted to file a mechanic's lien against the house thereby clouding the title, and that as a result of same he lost a sale for \$10,000; that since then the house had depreciated in value to the extent of \$5,000, and by reason of the filing of said mechanic's lien, which was a matter of record, that his credit had been injured; that the filing of said lien was for the purpose of harassing him, wherefore he asks for damages in the sum of \$45,000.

The fire department last night made two runs one of which was a false alarm and the other being a small blaze at Cherry and Austin streets.

The false call carried the department into the far reaches of Young addition, and after searching around for the fire, they decided someone's idea of a joke was slightly stale. The blaze extinguished did a damage of about \$10.

BRECKENRIDGE, March 25.—Members of the Cincinnati "Reds," who have been training at Cisco, and newspaper men with the squad, were guests here Wednesday of the Cooper-Henderson Oil Company, Consolidated. A game, which was scheduled to have been played with a local team, was called off because of wet ground by Manager Pat Moran, who declared he did not wish to risk possible injuries to his players by having them appear upon a slippery diamond.

The day was spent in making a tour of the Breckenridge oil fields and the Cooper-Henderson properties. Two slush pits heavily laden with crude oil were ignited for the entertainment of the visitors in the morning.

After a bountiful dinner was served the players, they were taken to the Cooper-Henderson-Sloan lease to witness the shooting of one of the company's wells. Several feet of movie film were exposed, showing the boys around the well and laughingly grouped upon the nitro-glycerine truck intently watching the preparation of the "soup" by Shooter Roy Richards.

FRANCE'S HONORED DEAD, UNIDENTIFIED SOLDIER, IS HEAPED WITH FLOWERS

PARIS, March 25.—Flowers are brought by an unceasing pilgrimage of mourners and placed on the slab that marks the grave of the unidentified French soldier under the great Arch of Triumph that dominates the western part of the city.

The pile of flowers and wreaths is fed with fresh contributions from early morning until late at night. There seems no end to the little ceremonies by organizations held at the

grave to honor the war dead. Little shop girls bring small bunches of violets that cost 50 centimes; statesmen, passing through Paris place there great wreaths as tributes from their countries.

Since Nov. 11, 1920, when the unknown soldier was placed under the arch, there has always been a group or crowd of mourners at the shrine of the dead. There has always been a huge pile of flowers. On Sundays, thousands stream there from the twelve avenues that converge at the Etoile, as the circular open space surrounding the arch is called and there is a procession of people with bared heads passing by the mound of flowers.

Many teachers bring their classes and there is a movement afoot to ar-

range that in each of the public schools of Paris a small contribution shall be collected on a separate day in each school to buy flowers to be placed on the slab by a delegation of honor pupils, so that there may be such a tribute of the children of France to the war dead every day of the year.

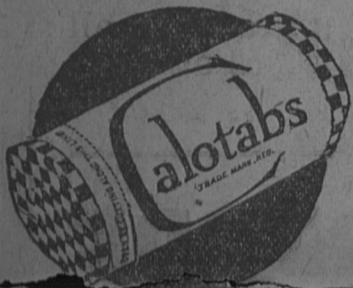
