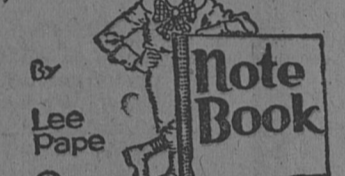

Pike County (Ark.) Has the Only Diamond Mine on Western Hemisphere

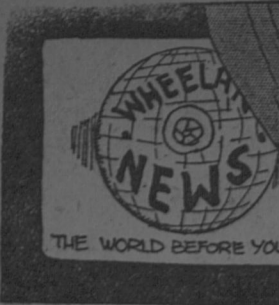
MURPHREESBORO, Ark., March 17.—The only diamond mine thus far discovered on the Western Hemisphere is located in Pike county, Arkansas, in which this hamlet is situated. The mine is two and one-half miles south of here.

CRATER, to be pressed into diamonds by the contraction of the rock. The peridotite forms the original matrix of the diamond, and thus far the only diamonds found in the Western Hemisphere in their matrices are those of Pike county. Diamonds have been found in some twenty-five states, in Canada and South America, but always in river beds, where geologists surmise they have been washed by the waters, or in places where it is presumed they have been deposited by glacial action.

The first Arkansas diamond was found in 1906 by John Huddleston, then owner of the farm on which the six-acre "pipe" is located, by accident. Huddleston observed outcroppings of the gray-green rock, since classed as peridotite and came to the conclusion that his hillside contained

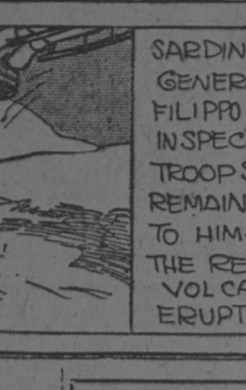

PIPE LINES NOW BEING LAID AT CRYSTAL FALLS

Sloan Number 1 Goes Over the Top as the District's First Gusher.

2 OTHERS EXPECTED IN

Special To The Times.
CRYSTAL FALLS, March 17.—That the Sloan No. 1 well of the Guaranty Oil & Gas company will be a 3,000-barrel producer, when completed, is the opinion of officials connected with this company. This well was drilled in several months ago, at which time the pay sand was only slightly touched, due to the fact that no pipe line connections could be made. A battery of 500-barrel storage tanks, however, were erected on the lease. With the recent development and activity in the Crystal Falls district, pipe line facilities are now being provided. Visitors yesterday were given the pleasure of seeing a Crystal Falls produced going over the top when the tools were run in the Guaranty No. 1, the oil going one hundred feet over the crown block. Two more large producers are expected in daily in this vicinity, they being the Graham No. 1 and the Ball No. 2 of the Roxana company. It is expected they will equal the big Stokes No. 1, which came in a week ago for 500 barrels and is now reported doing 1,500 barrels on the average.
