SUPREME COURT RULES WITNESS MUST TESTIFY

AUSTIN, April 1.—District courts of Texas have authority to compel Texas citizens to give oral testimony before a notary if he is material witness in cases pending in other states, the supreme court has just held.

This decision was in habeas corpus proceedings instituted by Thomas Taylor of Dallas county who was sentenced to jail for contempt of court when he refused to give testimony to be used in a case pending in the circuit court of Cook county, Ill., when ordered by a district court at Dallas to do so.

Chief Justice Nelson Phillips, who wrote the supreme court opinion, said: "The power of a proper court to honor the request of a court in an independent jurisdiction expressed by letters of registry for use of its process in aid of obtaining the deposition of witness whose testimony is material in a case pending in the latter, while, perhaps not frequently called into exercise, is inherent and does not depend upon statutes. It exists to prevent a failure of justice. It is related to the administration of justice in its best sense."

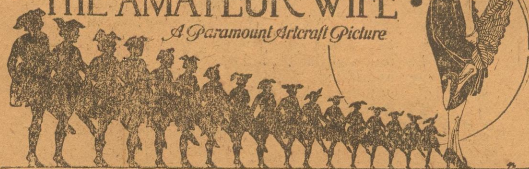

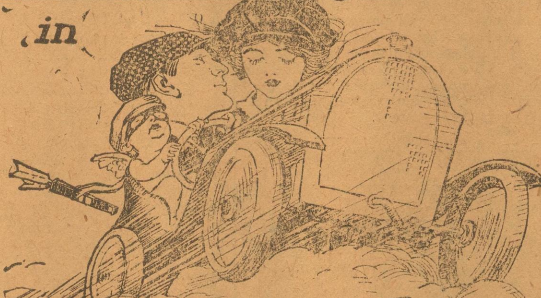

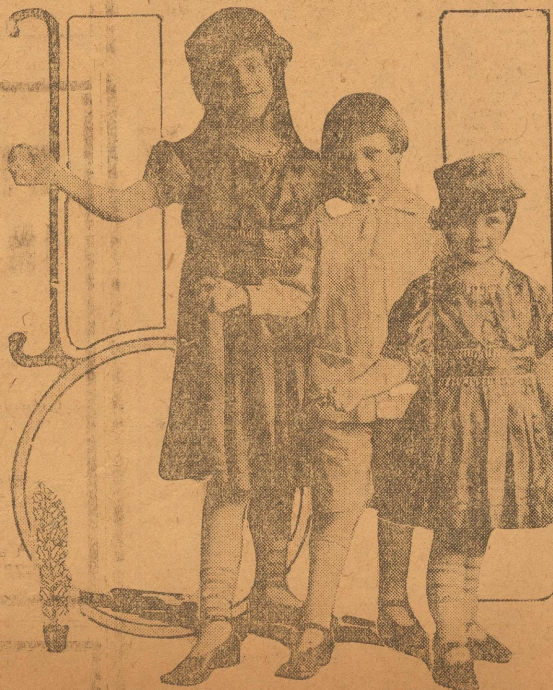

Shamrock Park Is Recommended by Ranger C-C

Shamrock Park, as a civic asset and financial project, was presented by R. D. Clancy at Wednesday's meeting of the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce and received the endorsement of that body in a resolution which reads: "That the Chamber of Commerce believes that a recreational park and bathing pool is needed at Ranger and recommends the Shamrock park project to the serious consideration of the people of the city."

Mr. Clancy outlined briefly his plans for an extension of Shamrock service, to the park in Ranger Heights, with installation of an attractive bathing beach, fresh water supply from wells on the Rock lease, filtration plant and pavilion.

In seconding the motion made by P. Learned for an endorsement of the plan, Mayor M. H. Hagaman suggested that the chamber "lend its full moral support to the park." M. H. Smith pointed out that the park would be an investment from other standpoints than that of financial return. Crystal Baths, Ranger's first example of Shamrock service, was referred to by directors as an "oasis in the city, conducted on as satisfactory a basis as our banks, for service."

The approval of the city commission of Shamrock park, given without reservation at Tuesday's meeting, will be expressed in the form of a resolution presented at the next meeting of the council.

Professor Monroe B. Snyder Says Recent Aurora Is Fine Indication of Sun Phenomena

PHILADELPHIA, April 1.—The earth was passing through the outer confines of the corona or exterior envelope of the sun on the night of March 22 when the inhabitants of the northern portion of the United States witnessed the great aurora in the skies, says Professor Monroe B. Snyder, director of the Philadelphia observatory.

The astronomer declared in a statement to the Associated Press that the sun "hurlled the final atoms of an explosion, namely, electrified hydrogen and probably helium, straight to earth."

Professor Snyder's observations follow: "The recent aurora is a fine indication of the explosive atomic disintegration which takes place at the surface of the sun and is responsible for its prominences, spots and coronal. Our discovery of the magnitude and precise atomic order of the explosion of the chemical elements in the sun, and in the stars generally, leads to conceptions of the aurora and the accompanying magnetic and electric storms, which are beyond any doubt as to their validity."

"During the hours of Monday night last, the earth was, in a very true sense, and to the delight of us all, passing through the outer confines of the solar corona. The same universal force of radiation which disintegrates the atoms in stupendous localized Krakatoas, or Mont Pelees, on the sun, and produces the hydrogen of the coronal streamers, then also hurled the final atoms of that explosion, namely, electrified hydrogen, and probably helium, straight to the earth."

"Only within about a month of the equinox, vernal, or autumnal, is the earth in an orbital position to be thus successfully bombarded. The moving electric hydrogen is, of course, an electric current, and is therefore carried toward the poles of the earth and round them by the earth's magnetic forces. The fascinating colors of the aurora are due to the changing electric excitation of the hydrogen and other gases. The theory of Vegard, the Swedish physicist, which has explained the wonderful curtained auroras as due to hydrogen particles, of

positive electric charge, is now shown to be unquestionably true, in that it is but a logical result of the explosive eruption of the electric hydrogen from the sun.

"The well-known delay, or lag in time, between the solar eruption and the appearance of the magnetic storm, and accompanying aurora, on the earth, of about forty-five hours, is due to the time taken for the hydrogen atoms to travel from the sun to the earth. The rate of travel is about 575 miles per second, or somewhat in excess of the rate of the upward movement of the gases in some of the great solar prominences.

"The numerous and complex details of the auroral phenomena are found thus to receive, for the first time, reasonable explanation. Additional confirmation also prove that all the elemental atoms, so wonderfully explosive in the stars, are structural products of hydrogen."

SAMMIES STILL HOLD INTEREST THORPE LEASE

A statement appearing in Tuesday's issue of the Times to the effect that the Thorpe well at Gansite was formally owned by the Sammies Oil corporation and later sold to the Plateau Oil company, was an error. According to J. H. Owens, manager of the Sammies Oil corporation, his company never owned all the lease on which the Thorpe well is located, but still owns a one-fourth interest in the tract, which consists of more than a hundred acres, and owns forty acres undivided interest in an adjoining lease.

The Thorpe No. 1 is reported making 2,400 barrels. It is located in wildcat territory, from a standpoint of deep production.

D. C. McCullough, a guard, was recently elected captain of the 1921 team. Peyton plays forward and was largely responsible for several of the victories made by the Short-

horns. Both men are good football players. Other men who were awarded the decorations are Otis Miller of Stamford, M. G. Swenson of Stamford, Jack Vowell of El

Paso, T. A. Harris of Dallas, Charles Granger of Austin and Joe Moore of Austin.

True wisdom, then, would caution the use of folly discreetly, as tabasco sauce in an oyster cocktail. It would apply it as a savory sauce, delightful in moderation and rumous in excess.

AUSTRIA OVERRUN BY WELL ORGANIZED BANDS OF ROBBER'S

White House Will Aid in Campaign to Save on Meat

WASHINGTON, March 31.—The White House will co-operate with the department of justice in its "Save Money on Meat" week campaign. The following letter was received today from Mrs. Wilson:

My dear Mr. Attorney General:

The White House will be glad to aid in every way possible your efforts to reduce the cost of living, and will gladly co-operate in the "Save Money on Meat" campaign.

The department of justice is privileged officially to announce that, in connection with the campaign to save money on meat by utilization of the less expensive cuts, meat dishes prepared by the following recipes will be served at the White House during "Save Money on Meat" week. These recipes provide for the use of the less costly cuts, particularly those from the forequarter.

MONDAY
Pot Roast With Vegetables.
3 or 4 pounds Chuck roast;
1 cup sliced carrots;
1 cup sliced onions;
1 cup celery cut in bits;
1 cup sliced turnips;
3 tablespoons fat (preferably from salt pork).

If the meat is not sold in a solid piece, skewer it or tie it into shape, wipe it with a damp cheesecloth, and roll in flour. Boil vegetables in salted water to barely cover until soft. Rub through a coarse strainer. Heat fat in a frying pan or Dutch oven. Put in the meat and brown on all sides. If the frying pan is used, transfer the meat, after it is brown, to a kettle, unless the pan is deep enough to hold the beef. Pour the vegetables and their liquid over the meat, together with any preferred seasoning. Cover tightly and let simmer slowly for four or five hours, turning twice. Thicken the gravy a little and pour over the meat.

TUESDAY
Veal Cutlets and Soup.
Cook a veal shank in boiling water until tender. Remove as much meat as possible from the bone. Cut the pieces to resemble chops.
Take this veal and season well. Roll in crumbs, egg and crumbs again and saute in butter or butter substitute. Garnish with parsley.
For the soup take the remaining portion of the shank, and put it into a kettle with 5 cups brown stock and a few peppercorns, salt, celery salt and any other seasoning desired. Add 1-2 cup each of diced potatoes, turnips and parsley. Cook for one-half hour.
This veal shank provides a soup and cutlets for a family of five.

WEDNESDAY
Chopped Beef au Casserole.
1 1-2 pounds clod of beef, ground;
1-2 cup tomato relish;
Tabasco sauce;
1 can beets.
Mix chopped beef with tomato relish. Add 1-4 teaspoon tabasco sauce (more if desired). Season well with salt. Put in glass casserole and bake two hours, basting frequently with a high quality of table sauce. A few strips of bacon across the top of any meat loaf adds to its richness and improves flavor. Serve garnished with 1 can beets, quartered. Serves five people.

THURSDAY
Ox Tail Soup.
1 cup ox tail cut into small pieces;
1-2 cup onions, cut fine;
1-2 cup finely cut carrots;
1 cup diced potatoes;
1-4 cup barley;
1 teaspoon white pepper;
1 tablespoon parsley or celery top;
1 tablespoon carmel;
1 tablespoon salt.
The ox tail should be chopped at each joint, making the pieces from one to two inches long; wash well in two or three waters, put on to boil with two quarts of cold water; add the barley and boil slowly for two hours; then add the onion, carrot, salt and pepper, boil for 30 minutes, add the potatoes and boil for 25 minutes; add a little paprika, thyme, parsley and the carmel. Serve all

FRIDAY.

Beef Brisket—Boiled and Browned.
If the piece has much bone, part may be removed for soup stock, or for gravy to be used when with the meat when warmed over. Cook the solid part of the meat until tender, with a little celery salt and garlic, added, turning it once during the cooking, which will take place from four to six hours, according to the amount of meat. Remove meat from liquor; place in shallow pan with skin side up, and score sevens; times across top. Have boiled potatoes (hot or cold) in readiness to drop into kettle to take up some of the fat; then place them around meat and brown all in a hot oven for about twenty minutes. Make a gravy with the remaining liquor and serve separately. The meat will slice as firmly as cheese, and will be tender and appetizing.

SATURDAY.

Escalloped Corn Beef.
2 cups cooked corn beef, cubed;
1 cup medium white sauce;
1 stalk celery, chopped fine;
2 slices onion, chopped.
Cook celery and onions in sauce. Put the corned beef in a shallow baking dish. Remove celery and onion from sauce. Add sauce to meat. Sprinkle with bread crumbs moistened with melted butter or butter substitute. Brown in hot oven.

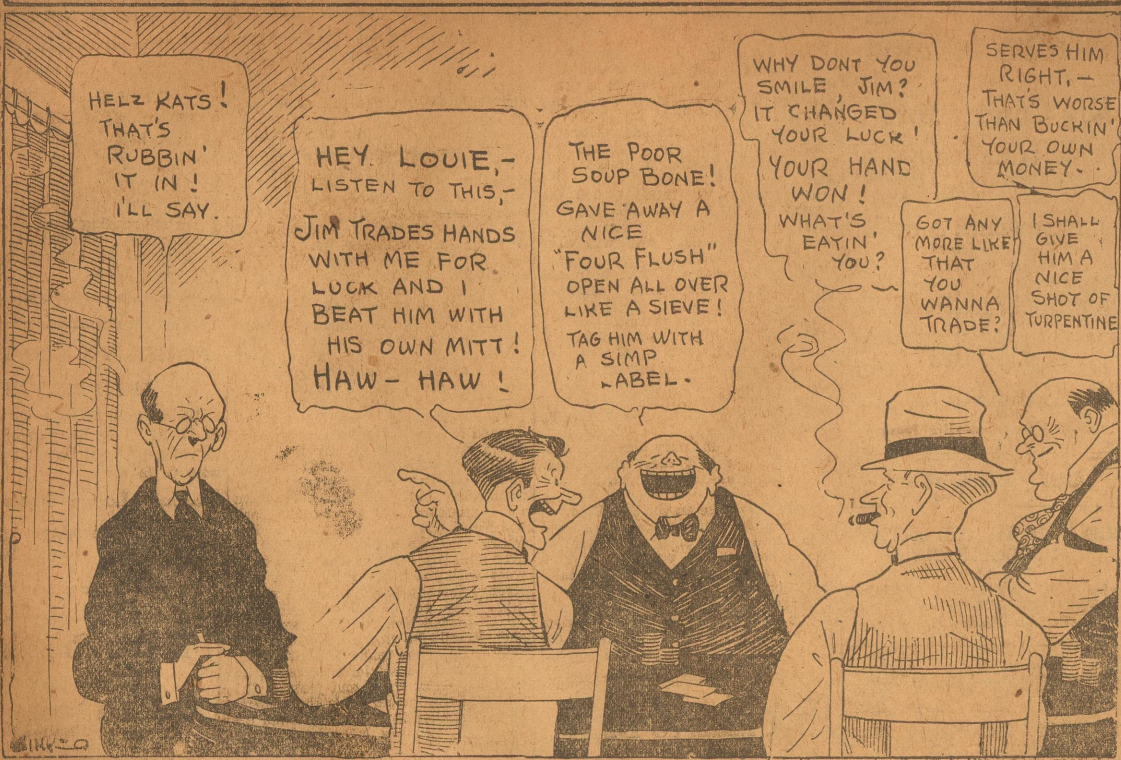

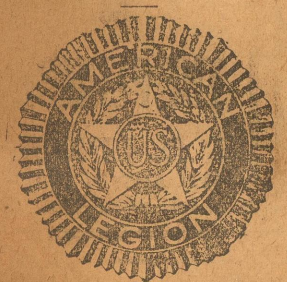
