Law Is Contested

By HERBERT LITTLE.
WASHINGTON.—The problem of federal or state control of education s involved in the suit contesting constitutionality of the new Oregon law abolishing private and parochial schools, which has just been placed before the United States supreme

court for decision.

The law, adopted by an election in 1922 under the initiative, following a campaign waged by the Ku Klux Klan and other organizations, reminer all Organizations, respectives all Organizations. quires all Oregon children of school age to attend public schools. It is to go into effect in September, 1926.

will afffect directly about 12, 000 children now enrolled in private and parochial schools in that state. A decision on the case is expected within a few weeks, as the state must make plans to accommodate the extra pupils if the law is approved.

The contest against the validity of the law was brought by the Hill Military academy and the Society of The Holy Names of Jesus and Mary, private schools of Oregon. Lawyers representing the Seventh-Day Adventists and the Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal church submitted briefs supporting the apubmitted briefs supporting the opposition to the law.

The first round of the fight was won by the opponents of the law. The two schools first named obtained an injunction in Oregon federal court, restraining Walter M. Pierce governor of the state, Attorney General Isaac H. Van Winkle, and Stanley Myers, district attorney of Multnoman county, from attempting to put the law into effect. This in-junction was granted on the following grounds:

That the law was unconstitutional in that it deprived the plaintiff private schools of their proper ty without due process of law, de-nied them the equal protection of the laws and impaired the obligations of their contracts.

2. That their business and property rights were destroyed by the The state fought the injunction from the start and appealed to the

United States supreme court. Inasmuch as the law was the first attempt to abolish private schools and parochial schools, great importance is attached to the decision by lawyers and legislators.

CONGRESS IS KILLING TIME

One-Fourth of Body's Time Is Wasted, Solon Says.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., March 31.—
At least a quarter of the time of every session of congress is sacrificed to time-killing legislative processes, for which the reason long ago disappeared, Robert Luce, republican, representative from Massachusetts declared in a lecture and the setts declared in a lecture setts. setts, declared in a lecture under the Godkin foundation at Harvard uni-

And yet, though admitting this waste, Representative Luce disagreed with Vice President Charles G. Dawes contention that unlimited debate

Somewhere along the journey of every bill through congress, Luce contends, there should be at least one way-station, where absolutely unfettered discussion could be had.

"Many man who have served in the senate have found that this has not in the end privented any decision persistently wanted by the people, but, on the other hand, has stood in

but, on the other hand, has stood in

the way of much action that the country has come to conclude would have been unwise," Luce said.

Included among what he termed "archaic" legislative habits which needlessly consume time, Luce listed.

1. Oral reading of bills in full, "A relic of early days in the English Parliament, when so many members could not read the bills," re said. Quorum calls. Estimated by

Luce to consume from one month to six weeks of every term, from 300 to 400 calls a session averaging about half an hour each.

3. Pretense of reading the jour-

nal, to which nobody listens, adds a few minutes each day to the total

Toleration of irrelevant debate, using to no good end a great many hours each session.
5. Protracted discussion of points

of order. "These and other habits no longer endured in the best regulated leg-islative assemblies of the world sacrifice needlessly at least a quarter of the time in every session," he said.

Referring to excutive sessions of congress, Luce defended them and their attendant exclusion of the public and representatives of the press on the grounds they hold members






