

WORRY WORSE DISEASE THAN MEASLES OR MUMPS

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Feb. 26 .- The in of worry is an important factor in the spread of the crime wave now sweep ng the country, according to Rev. Daniel F. Rittenhouse, pastor of the First Bap tist church here, discussing "The Great American Disease.

"Worry is a dissipation and is farther reaching than the liquor traffic," said Rev. Dr. Rittenhouse.

"Worry is regarded as the greatest contributing cause in breaking down our intellectual and moral life. Worry is a contagion which has afflicted all man-kind. It flourishes in the King's palace





Falling Prices Enable Retail Merchants to Sell Lower Than Catalogues.

They sent their catalogues everywhere. They sold everything from a candle to a coffin, and they undersold him

These catalogues are impos ing affairs, illustrated (sometimes in col ors), and costing as much as most novels to manufacture. Their bulk makes necessary the long period between pres time and distribution. When the cur rent issues went to press, prices had only begun to slump. The slump had pro ceeded quite a bit when they were issued Then prices slumped some more, and corrections in the catalogues were neces sary. 
