Fort Worth Men Named as Defendants by Chicago Broker.

CHICAGO, Feb. 19 .- The preacipe in a \$300,000 suit for actual and exemplary damages was filed in circuit tourt today by Henry Vette against promoters of the Aalto Gasoline and Oil company of Texas. The action involves several prominent Texas men and grows out of investments in oil promotion, according to Ernest J. Batten, attorney for Mr. Vette.

Among the defendants, said to be organizers of the oil company, are W. M. Babcock of Fort Worth, who, according to an affidavit, is worth \$1,000,000; L. W. Baxter of Tulsa, Okla., Charles J. Benson, president of the National Bank of Commerce, Fort Worth, and M. A. Isaac of New York, Harry E. Leonold, a Chicago broker. Harry E. Leopold, a Chicago broker,

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19 .- A drastic measure against immigration during the next year was adopted today by the senate, which by a vote of 61 to 2 passed the Dillingham immigration restriction bill with amendments to increase its restrictive features. In the form adopted the bill, it is estimated, would limit the number of immigrants during the next twelve months to slightly over 355,000.

The bill was adopted as a substitute for the Johnson bill passed recently by the house. The latter would bar for a year all immigrants except relatives of aliens now in this country.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10 .- Passage of the pro-tata immigration bill by the Sen-ate today and apparent certainty of its ecceptance by the House means that the practice of allowing Mexicans to enter the United States for ostensibly farm labor is soon to end, congressional leaders said today. The Senate failed to put on provision specifically poviding that Mexicans may by admitted without a nead tax, literacy test or coming under the contract labor law. A delegation of Mexican employers from Southwest Texas attempted to have such a provision

inserted in the bill.

As the matter now stands, the admision of Mexicans will cease with the passage of the Knox resolution declaring state of peace with Germany, which is cheduled for early in the Harding adinistration. (The World Famous Spanish Author) Venizelos! What a marvelous life that grand old man has led! I have a friend in Paris whose passion for Greek literature led him some twenty ears ago to leave for Crete and join the Hellenes there who were fighting for independence from the Turks. He had no end of stories about the kind of a man Venizelos was in those days—a Venizelos juite unknown in Athens a local political leader in Crete who had closed his office and taken to the hills to fight the Turks. Two decades since then have been enough to make this obscure patriot the foremost citizen of Greece, one of the leadng diplomats of Europe, and the statesman who overcame the greatest obstacles during the war in keeping his country n line behind his own unshakable condidence in the victory of the Allies.

As I sat there watching Venizelos satng his breakfast like any ordinary mortal, I could not help reflecting that there just as much romance in life today as there ever was.
