"I impeach Judge Landis," Welty declared, and entered into the formal procedure to secure an impeach-

ment trial for the judge.

Confirmation of the report that the Humble company is offering \$2 a barrel for crude oil in the North Central (Texas field was obtained this morning. No other company, so far as it could be learned, has met the price.

Unlike other large companies the Humble has no posted price but goes on the market and barters for its The continuance of this price by the Humble for long was questioned by some oil company executives who subscribe to the view that crude oil in the Mid-Continent field has not yet reached its lowest price level. The price will sink to \$1 a barrel before a general rebound comes, they believe.

"It required twenty years to boost the price of crude to \$3.50 a barrel," one man said. "It may never again reach that price. The upward pull for better prices is likely to be difficult and certainly will require time."

ATLANTA, Ga., Feb. 14.-More children are born in Georgia to mothers in their twenty-third year than at any other time, the percentage being 6.12, according to certain relative statistics compiled by the state board of health. It is shown by these figures that 22.54 per cent of births are by mothers between twenty and twenty-three years old. The figures were compiled among 10.418 white families in which hirths occurred in the month of June, July and August, 1920.

These families average 3.5 children each, including all births during and prior to the months named. The youngest mother on record was twelve years old.
