

RAIN INFUSES NEW LIFE INTO SPRING GROWTH

Starts Grass and Brings Out Hesitating Trees; Heavy Blow Sunday Morning.

Rain fell in Eastland county Sunday night. In some parts of the county the precipitation was quite heavy, but in many places it did not exceed a half inch and much more is needed. It was enough, however, to start the grass and bring out the trees that had been hesitating and more is hoped for.

While rain has fallen over a large part of Texas during the last week, much more is needed before the drouth will be broken, according to a report of the United States department of agriculture. Grain crops are in poor condition and some of the fall-sown acreage has been abandoned, but the acreage will be re-planted in cotton and grain sorghums.

A somewhat heavier fall of rain was reported Sunday night at Rising Star, Cisco, Breckenridge and parts of the county south of Eastland.

High Winds Level Many Oil Rigs In Eastland County

High winds blew over Eastland county early Sunday morning, wrecking many oil well derricks, leveling some trees and toppling over a number of small shacks and water cisterns. No great damage was done.

Cloudy weather Saturday night with occasional spatters of rain aroused hope of a general downpour, but the wind blew the clouds away for a few hours. The wind began rising as early as 10 o'clock Saturday night, but did not assume the proportions of a gale until about 1 o'clock Sunday morning. Soon after that lights went out in Ranger and Eastland, due to wire trouble, and were out about an hour, during which time the wind howled, many houses trembled and a large number of persons were aroused from slumber, preferring to remain up ready for an emergency should one arise. 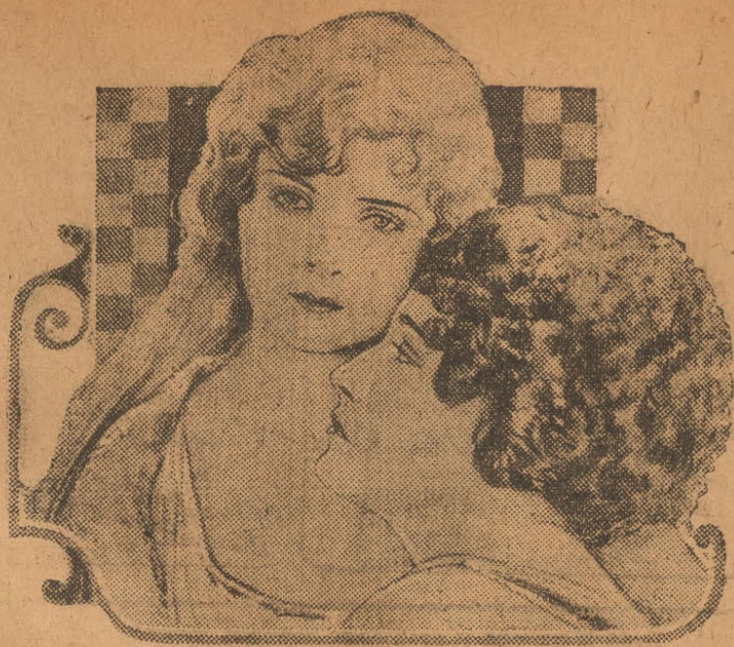

Camping Sites For Auto Travelers At West Texas Meeting

MINERAL WELLS, April 13.—The city of Mineral Wells, the host town of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention, is especially favorably located in the matter of accessibility to motor traffic. It has three branches of the Bankhead highway, also the FF highway and a number of other improved roads leading to it. These will accommodate the thousands that will come by automobile all over the west. In addition to the highways, special train service will be given and there will be nothing lacking in facilities to reach the convention city.

The request is made that parties expecting to camp during their stay in Mineral Wells reserve tents and cots at an early date and full information can be secured by writing the chairman of the camp site committee, care Chamber of Commerce, Mineral Wells.

The camp site committee has arranged for four large camping sites and a number of smaller ones. Each camp site is being laid off in a systematic manner with streets traversing grounds north and south and east and west. Camp lots are numbered and located so that each camping party has access to street without interfering with other campers. When a camp lot number has been issued party holding same will be protected and can rest assured no one else will camp on said lot.

Water, light, sanitary facilities, fuel for cooking purposes and community kitchens sufficient to meet requirements of each camp will be provided. Natural gas will be furnished where possible, otherwise wood for cooking purposes will be furnished. Cook stove will be furnished with kitchen. No cooking utensils will be furnished.

Rates—Camp lots can be rented at 50 cents per day per car, with

free access to community kitchen tents, all rentals must be paid in advance for full time of convention. Army sleeping tents will be \$3 to \$5 per day, according to size. These tents will accommodate from six to 10 people. Army cots will rent for 25 cents per day. Parties expecting to camp while here should reserve tents and cots as early as possible.

BRADY TO IMPROVE WATERWORKS SYSTEM

BRADY, April 13.—Construction has begun upon Brady's \$100,000 program of waterworks improvement and extension, for which bonds were voted two months ago. The extension of the plant includes the laying of standard sized mains to all sections of the business and resident districts, the placing of 52 fire plugs so that no residence or building will be more than 500 feet from a hydrant, and the installing of an 800-gallon per minute fire pump, more than doubling the present pumping capacity in emergency cases.

Brady's municipal water well has a tested capacity of 1,000 gallons per minute, while the present consumption is about one-fourth of that amount. It is the intention to give this surplus of water to the citizens by means of enlarged mains, extended service and lowered water rates.

LYNN COUNTY PLANNING HARD-SURFACED ROADS

TAHOKA, April 13.—Lynn county is making preparations to vote on a road bond issue to build a hard-surface road through the county running north and south and east and west. The exact amount of the bond issue has not yet been determined, but practically every person wants to vote as much as \$500,000 toward building the roads.

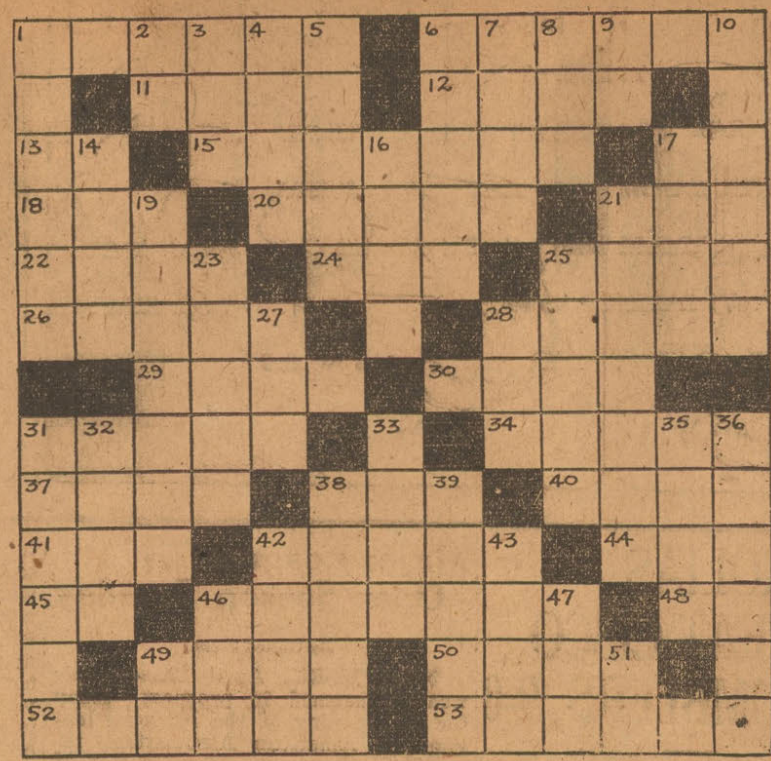
There will not be a single bridge, grade, or cut in the entire mileage planned, which will save a large sum of money compared with the average highway.

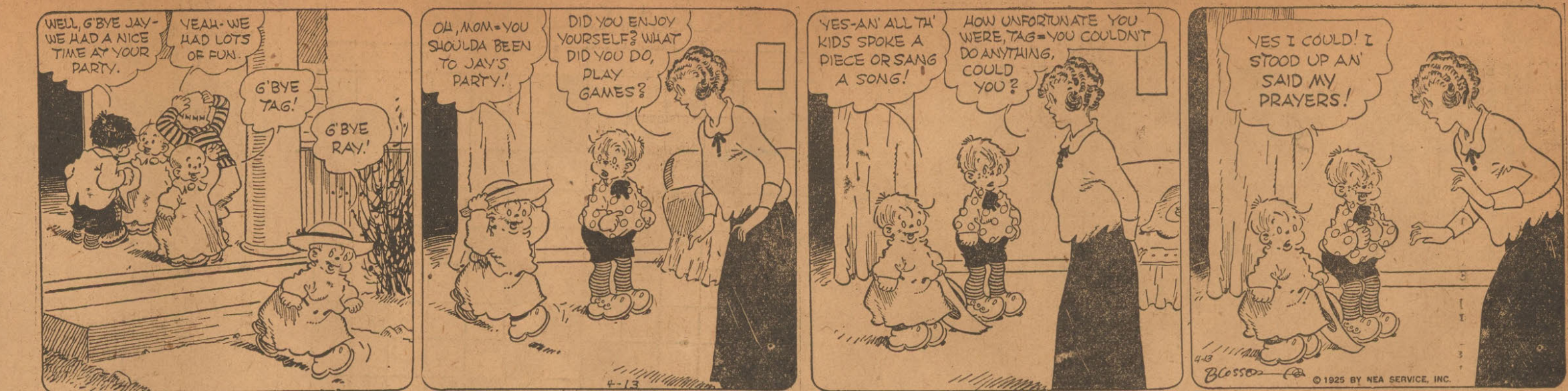

Coddled Eggs For Growing Children

What is the particular virtue of coddled eggs for children? Isn't a hard-boiled egg just as good for Betsy? The reason behind the coddled egg is this, says the United States department of agriculture:

Eggs contain protein of a particularly valuable kind for building the bodies of children as well as chickens. The chick gradually absorbs the almost pure protein of the egg white as he develops within the shell. Children, however, make the best use of egg protein when it is slightly cooked. Protein is very sensitive to heat. If cooked rapidly at high temperature it becomes
