





Two Deaths When Shots Fly in New York Beauty Shop

Former Red Cross Nurse Slays Widow Over Dissolution of Partnership.

NEW YORK, Jan. 1 .- Women partners attempted to part company in Brooklyn and the police record showed a murder and a suicide. A United States army revolver bore silent witness of the double tragedy. 
