Rain and sleet covered Eastland county yesterday with a coat of sleet HONG KONG, Jan. 17—The British steamer Hong Hwa, which sailed for Singapore three days ago put back into port here today with an amazing story of piracy on the high seas. All the passengers were paralyzed with fear and they and the ship's safe had been robbed, yet all on board were unharmed.

Officers on the Hong Hwa reported that for three days the vessel had been in possession of Chinese pirates. The latter had embarked with the rest of the passengers without exciting suspicion, and when the steamer was well at sea they had rushed the bridge and overpowered the captain and crew. Several volleys were fired during the attack on the bridge, but none was hurt. The British officers were for the most part unarmed and easily made prisoners.

U. S. BUREAU OF LABOR
REPORTS ITS FINDINGS.
MEASURES FOR REFORM OF
PRISONS AND PRISON LABOR WASHINGTON, Jan. 17—"Union labor is being paid more now than ever before and is working shorter

These are the findings of the Uni ted States bureau of labor statistics, which has just completed the compilation of the union scale of wages and hours of labor of 894,343 members of organized trades in 66 of the principal cities of the United States,

conjectively, the hourly union wage rate of 1924 was 8.3 per cent higher than 1923; 99.8 per cent higher than in 1917; 128 per cent higher than in 1913, and 141 per cent higher than in 1913, and 141 per cent higher than in 1907.

Hours of labor this year were 4-10 of 1 per cent less than in 1917; 6.1 per cent less than in 1913, and 8:5 per cent less than in 1913, and 8:5 per cent less than in 1907.
