The thoughtful motorist won't impede the movement of surface cars He will get out of the way when need be.

Give the pedestrian plenty of time to board a street car. The pedestrian still outnumbers the motorist and much good will result if the motorist will be more thoughtful about the men and women who walk rather than ride. Street cars are usually equipped with air brakes and can stop quickly. So if driving a car don't crowd a street car unless your ear is equipped with tour-wheel brakes and even then it is best not to take any chances.

BE CAREFUL IN PASSING Country roads are sometimes flanked by steep banks, ditches, holes and swamps which cannot be seen easily, especially if one is driving in a closed car. Play safe and keep to the roadway. In going off you may never know what you are getting into




