ALCOHOL AS FUEL. For a number of years the department of agriculture has been experimenting on methods to utilize denatured alcohol for power, and the statement has been made that if the power units in a gallon of alcohol can be developed, sufficient alcohol could be manufactured from the garbage of half a dozen cities to turn every wheel in the United States.

Recently a group of leading British motor men have asked for the annulment or modification of an ancient law that will permit them to market a vegetable gasoline for autos and engines.

In Germany fuel alcohol is derived from potatoes. In South America a small per cent of gasoline is added, and in many countries about 38 per cent of ether, 1 per cent of ammonia and 1 per cent of arsenious acid is added, making a very satisfactory fuel. In Havana autos are operated by the use of common navy rum, distilled from blackstrap molasses. In the United States ordinary fuel gasoline is about 50 per cent kerosene.

The British committee, having the question in charge is wrestling with the problem of producing a mixture that will be non-poisonous, that cannot be refined out at a practical cost, that can be easily detected but deterrent both in taste and smell, to the end that methylated alcohol "parties" will not appear in police court as frequently as at present.

In any event there is no apparent danger of a shortage of liquid fuel for generations to come, and every indication is that engines will be constructed to give greater power at a lower cost.

Thirteen large corporations and industries show an increase of 65 per cent in number of men employed as compared with 1914. This does not necessarily mean that there are that many more people employed in the nation than in 1914, but it does illustrate to some extent the consolidation as well as the expansion. The pay roll of these 13 companies show an increase of about 200 per cent as compared with 1914, indicating a general average increase of 135 per cent. It is probably true that there are nearly as many idle men today as in 1914, but it must be remembered that a couple of hundred thousand college graduates have entered the employment field during the past 10 years.

May, chairman of the civic and sanitary committee of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, for the proper observance of state clean-up week, April 5 to 11. Citizens of Ranger have been asked to cooperate in every way possible, and the Ranger Boy Scouts, who are seeking ways and means to pay for the uniforms they have ordered and for which many of them were fitted during their recent visit to the Fort Worth fat stock show, are ready to lend a hand in the work of cleaning yards and alleys.

Directions for cleaning up a town and rules for home sanitation have been issued by the state board of health and copies may be obtained upon application at the Ranger Chamber of Commerce. To obtain results, it is set forth, first call a civic rally to arouse interest and enthusiasm in the clean-up idea. An impromptu committee, consisting of a few public spirited men and women who can be relied upon to make the rally a success, must form the nucleus of the movement, it is stated. This committee naturally will become the charter members of the clean-up club.

Pictures of some city beautiful or health films shown at the local motion picture house prior to the rally are suggested as a good way of arousing interest. A clean-up proclamation by the mayor is another step in the program. The ministers can do splendid work by discussing the moral side of the question from the pulpit; physicians may be invited to give lectures on sanitation, food, problems of parks and playgrounds. Business men may help by advertising the campaign in their places of business; the teachers can give effective

aid by presenting the necessity for cleaning up the city to the school children.

The clean-up campaign must begin in the homes by cleaning them from attic to cellar, making war against cobwebs, dust, insects, rodents and other disease-breeding factors, says the board of health bulletin. Soap and water, with elbow grease for floors and wood-work is a better antidote against disease-producing organisms than fumigants or disinfectants. Invite the sunshine into the homes through every possible opening.

Instructions are given not to cover filth with lime, but rather remove the filth and sprinkle lime on the surface. Inspect the roof gutters, cisterns and flower pots for standing water or mosquito breeding. See that the family water supply is safe by a survey of well or cistern to see if it is covered and protected against dust, insects and surface drainage. Discourage the dangerous fly by keeping the garbage in closely covered pails. Use 16-mesh screens for doors and windows. Manure from barns, if any, should be stored daily in covered oxcars and the ground sprinkled with powdered borax.

Get busy with mowers and rakes, continues the instructions, until the yard resembles an emerald velvet rug. With very little labor and cost the home can be made more beautiful, healthful, cheerful and habitable. Cooperate with town or city officials in keeping the streets clean. Use sanitary garbage receptacles for papers and fruit skins. Refuse collected should be placed in convenient places and carried by wagons to the dump, there to be buried or burned.

There are large problems also that should have attention. Committees on food should inspect groceries, fruit and drink stands, dairies and all places where food is prepared to see that no foodstuffs are exposed to flies. The ventilation of school-rooms, theatres and all public places should be looked after. The purity of the water supply and the proper method of sewage disposal should be assured. If city ordinances are not

sufficient they should be brought up to date. All measures should be taken necessary to meet the peculiar problems of every community.

ask you to assess the extreme penalty."

The defense made very little argument for complete acquittal, pleading chiefly for a verdict of manslaughter and a suspended sentence.

Denounces Character Attack.

Branding the evidence against Mrs. Robertson as "false and damnable attempts to assassinate a good woman's character," asserting his belief that there was no improper relations before marriage, between Mary Frances Collier and Buster Robertson, and scoring the defense for failing to put the daughter on the stand, Bernard Martin, veteran prosecutor employed as special counsel for the state, urged the jury to find Frank Collier guilty of murder.

Declares Mrs. Collier Guilty.

Two jurors broke down and cried in their box Wednesday morning under the scathing denunciation of Bernard Martin, special state prosecutor, levelled at Mr. and Mrs. Frank Collier.

The incident, noted by the packed courtroom, came as a dramatic climax to the assertion by the state's argument that the crime was the most "heartless and cold-blooded affair" of which he had ever heard, and added that "Mrs. Frank Collier is every bit as guilty as her husband and is nothing less than a co-conspirer with him in the assassination of their daughter, and to whom they objected because he was not, they thought, their daughter's social equal."

What was considered as the most eloquent appeal yet heard in the trial of Frank Collier was delivered yesterday by C. I. Francis, counsel for the defense, who followed Assistant Prosecutor Martin. Francis has been a long-time friend of the former mayor, who was his baseball hero. Collier had the reputation of being one of the leading diamond performers in his day in this part of the state.

Deriding the theory that Collier killed Robertson because the youth came from "No Man's Land" and was poor, Francis told the jury the mayor had been a poor boy and de-

livered fee to help support his mother.

"You know it isn't true of my friend that he planned the murder of Elzie Robertson," said Francis. Collier sobbed unrestrainedly during the argument. Francis argued the former mayor had taken the pistol from his wife for her safety, but was inflamed by her recital of his daughter's seduction. When he saw Elzie everything went black before him. Francis concluded with an appeal that Collier be found guilty of manslaughter and allowed to return to his family, broken and shattered though it may be, with a suspended sentence.

mortally wounded Deputy Sheriff Harry Riley of Taylor county.

MILITIA IN READINESS.
Militia companies in the district are in readiness to join in the man hunt with machine guns and mortar, should the latter be needed to "smoke the killer out" of some inaccessible hiding place in the wild section of West Texas, through which he is being chased.

Sheriff's deputies, police departments and hundreds of volunteer citizens are today systematically scouring the country for the much-wanted murderer, whom it is reported has with him another Mexican who is thoroughly familiar with the country through which Morales is attempting to make his escape—the latter being compelled to guide the fugitive at the point of the rifle taken from one of his dead victims.

Bloodhounds In Pursuit.
Bloodhounds have also been impressed into service in the search, which it is hoped will result in the capture of the fleeing killer before he can cross the Rio Grande into the wilds of Mexico. Officers' and citi-

zens' posses joining in the search now include armed men from Howard, Taylor, Eastland, Callahan, Coleman, Runnels, Colie, Nolan, Mitchell, Jones, Fisher and Scurry counties.

Sheriff H. T. Obar was in charge of the search, aided by Lige Jennings, assistant chief of police of Abilene. Officers continued to arrive throughout the night, Sheriff Biggs of Albany and deputies and a posse from Baird reaching the scene about 10 o'clock Tuesday night.

Wild Rumors Confuse.
Rumors that the fleeing Mexican was seen near Eastland, at Sweetwater and many other places have been found groundless, though serving to divert many of the man hunters from the direct pursuit of Morales and his involuntary guide; but as the various posses today draw nearer one another in their widespread combing of the country it is hoped by directing officers that before nightfall the fugitive will be apprehended, or at least cornered where his surrender or death from posse bullets will end the chase. At the same time, however, every precaution is being taken to prevent Morales slipping through the posses' lines and crossing the Rio Grande.

Sheriff Satterwhite, according to Mrs. G. W. Richie, came to her house, one mile east of Nubia, just before 12 o'clock. He asked if he could borrow her car to go for a doctor for Reeves, whom he had left in the pasture nearly a mile north of her home.

Fired Three Shots.
"I backed the car out of the garage for him," Mrs. Richie said. "I went into the house. I heard a noise but thought it was a blowout. I went to the door and saw the Mexican. He fired at least three shots. I ran for my husband, who was at work in the field."

G. W. Richie, owner of the farm on which the killing took place, stated that he came to the house when his wife came for him. Pete Morales and the Mexican who did the killing came by the house just as he got there.

"The Mexican that shot the two men tried to get me to go down and get my car and help him escape," Mr. Richie said. "It was about a quarter of a mile down the road. I told him that it looked like it was

wrecked and he had looked at it and seemed satisfied. He kept my wife and I and the other Mexican covered all the time with his rifle. He made me give him a drink of water, keeping the gun on us all the time."

Dying, Tries to Aid.
Satterwhite, according to Mrs. Richie, apparently never saw the Mexican, who was about 50 yards from and across the road north from the Richie home. He piloted the car down the road for nearly a quarter of a mile and while dying is believed to have turned it toward the fence to stop it.

The two Mexicans followed the car to where it stopped. When farmers went to the car they found that Satterwhite had been relieved of his gun and his body pushed down between the front and back seats.

Shot In Back.
Only one shot took effect, this entering the back of the front seat at an angle and striking Satterwhite half way between the waist and the armpit. It ranged upward and apparently struck his heart, it was said.

Murder of Reeves.
Only Mexicans lived to tell the story of the shooting of Reeves.

Jose Saminago, brother-in-law of Lopez Morales, who is accused of the killing, in broken English told his version of the story. He lives in Merkel but is grubbing on the Richie farm. About a dozen Mexicans are in the grubbing gang.

Sheriff Hunted Relief.
Lopez, the Mexican continued, went to work with the grubbing gang. About 11 o'clock Reeves and Satterwhite were seen coming through the bushes. The officers opened fire, Saminago said. Morales ran into the bushes, going north. Satterwhite picked up Reeves and carried him to a nearby tree. He then left, going across to the Richie farm house, nearly a mile south.

Samnago said that after Satterwhite had gone Morales returned and saw that Reeves was only wounded. He shot him through the head and then set out in pursuit of Satterwhite. He did not see Pete Morales at any time. Lopez Morales took Reeves' gun and it is with this he is believed to have shot Satterwhite. Mr. and Mrs. Richie stated that after the Mexicans left their house, following the shooting of Satterwhite, they headed north in the direction of the Mexican camp. Mrs. Richie stated that Pete Morales was forced to accompany his brother.
