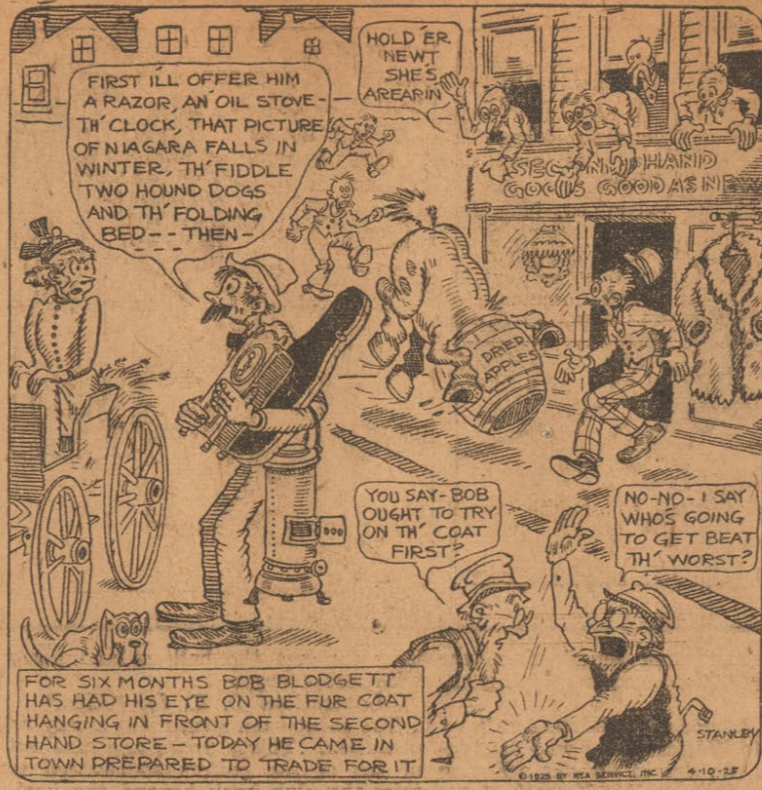

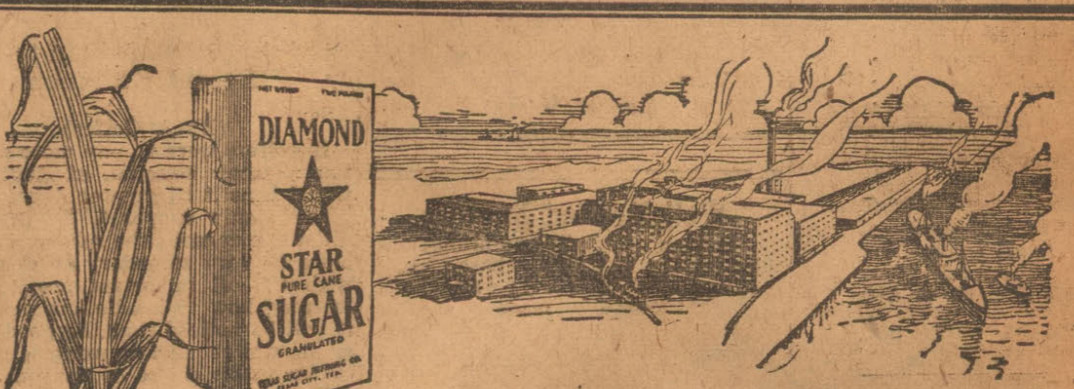

 Almonds, Brazil or other nuts can be stirred into the toffee just before it is poured into the pans.

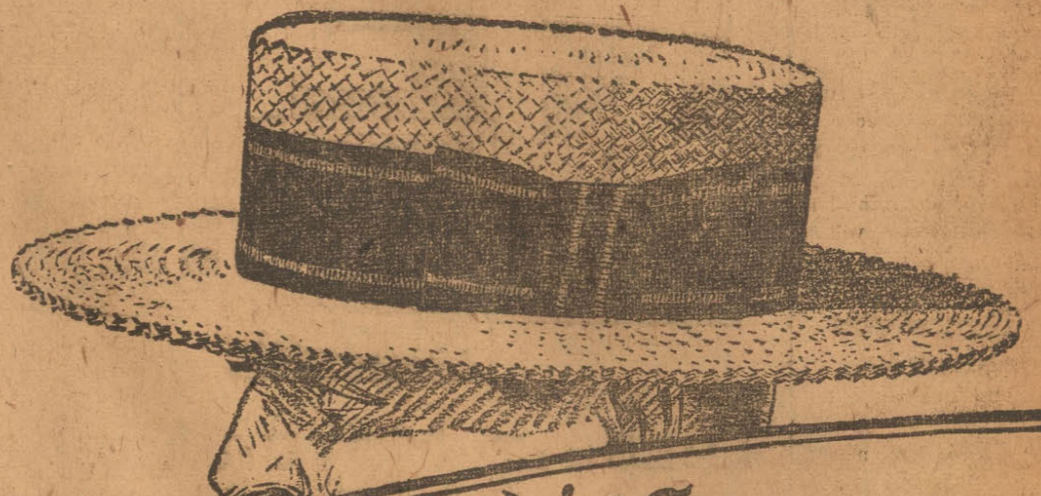

LEADING ARMENIAN KILLED IN AIRPLANE ACCIDENT

MOSCOW.—M. Miassnikoff, one of five prominent men killed a few days ago in an airplane accident near Tiflis, was one of the leading Armenians in Russia, being secretary of the Transcaucasian Communist party. He was a warm friend of Americans in the Caucasus and had done much to assist the work of the Near East relief, frequently visited the orphans under American care at Alexandropol, "city of children." He was on his way to an official conference in Moscow in a military airplane which caught fire and crashed from a height of 6,000 feet.
