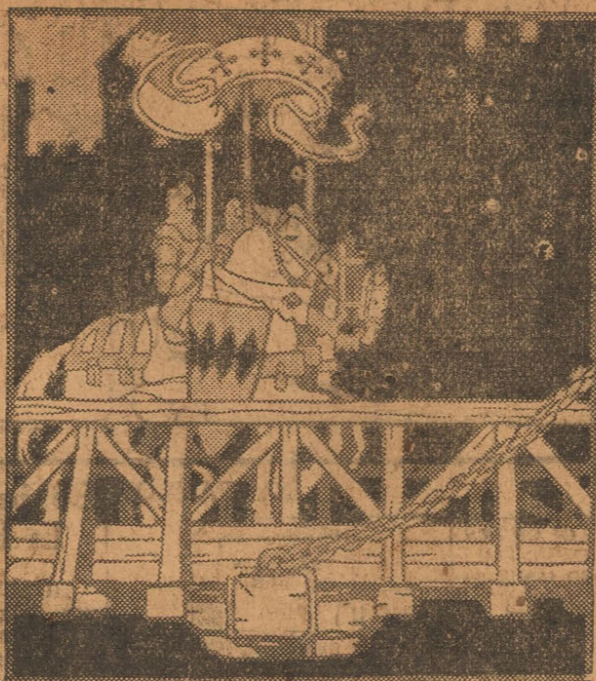

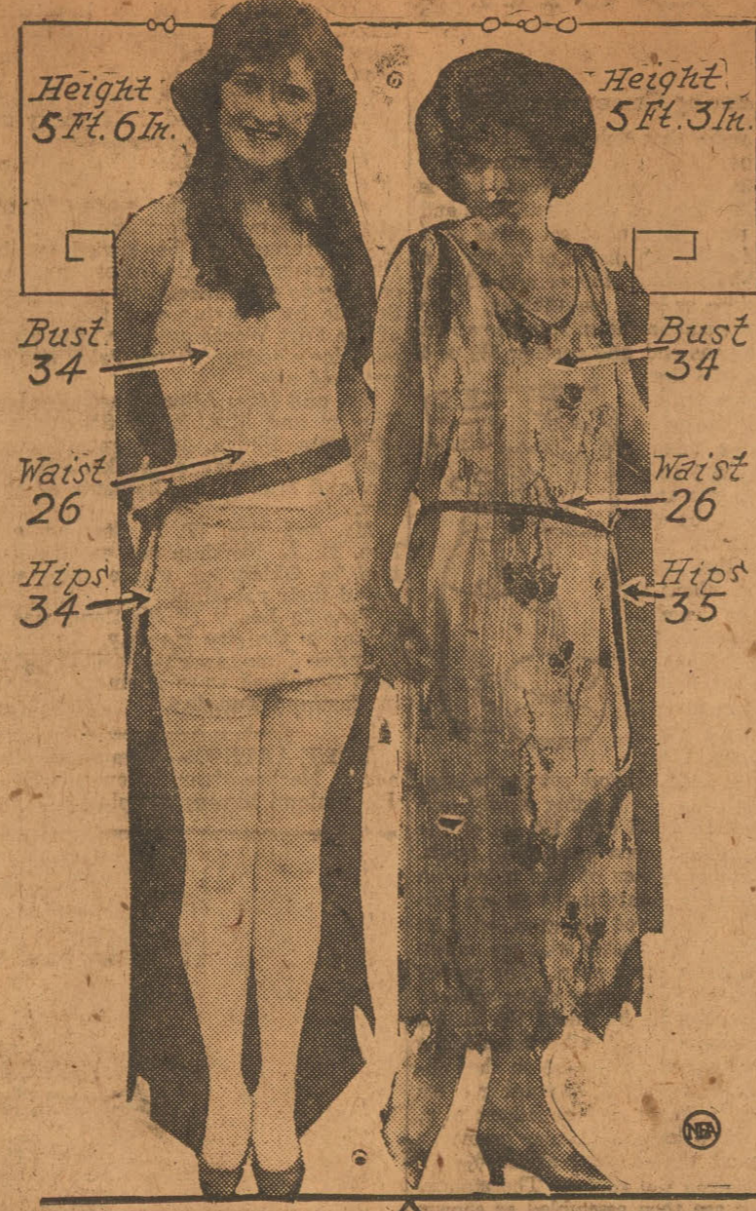

TEXAS NOT LIKELY TO FEEL EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS

DALLAS, July 8.—Dallas and the surrounding territory is not likely to ever be disturbed by earthquakes, according to Dr. Ellis W. Shuler, Southern Methodist University scientist, and a recognized authority on the subject.

Dr. Shuler explained that the western part of the United States is subject to seismic disturbances because of the "youthfulness" of the mountain range, and the fact that the earth's crust is still settling down. In this section, he says, there are no mountains and the base is well established and not subject to spasmodic shifting of the surface.

Dallasites began growing perturbed over the California quakes since the last quake and university professors were quizzed considerably on the possibility of disturbances in this country.
