
In the course of his remarks the secretary of foreign affairs declared that there is no chance of Great Britain agreeing in any circumstances to the proposal that United States authorities be given the right to search vessels for liquor within the 12-mile limit. This was in reply to the proposal that foreign vessels be allowed to bring liquor into United States ports under customs seals provided the dry zone be extended 12 miles.

In the meantime foreign vessels continue to come into port with liquor under seal and customs and prohibition officers are seizing this liquor and there is intimation that the United States may resort to the more drastic method of seizing the vessel and putting the captain under arrest.

British newspapers are loud in their condemnation of the action of the United States. These same papers so far as known have never condemned the action of smugglers operating on vessels flying the British flag anchored off our coast just outside the three-mile limit. These British newspapers interpret the action to be interference with British shipping. The fact is, the United States government is not concerned whether British ships are wet or dry but it is concerned with the enforcement of the mandates of the prohibition amendment within the jurisdiction of the United States, and in this attitude undoubtedly has the support of every loyal citizen of the country.-The American Issue,


