WASHINGTON, July 23 .- A request for authority to construct an extensive new railroad system in Texas and New Mexico was filed today with the interstate commerce commission. It is proposed to build a line of railway extending between Tucumcari, N. M., and Dimmitt, Texas, a distance of 303 miles; to acquire the existing 100 miles of railway between Seymour and Salesville, both in Texas, now operated by the Gulf, Texas & Western company, and to construct a new line between Perrin, Texas, and Fort Worth, a distance of 57 miles.





The next step is to procure a mail box at the posteffice. Direct the postmaster that all mail addressed to several non-existant firms shall be put in the box. Then send the card to the company manufacturing these commodities with six faked names addressed to the six non-existant business houses.

When the tooth paste and shaving scap arrive there will be one card with each sample requesting the names of six other tooth paste or shaving soap users. You repeat the first performance, only this time you can have three or four samples come to each non-existant business house. There, your work has been cut out for you, the endless chain has started.

It should be possible to put a man on the road selling the samples in a few weeks and it will probably be necessary to hire six or eight stenos to fake names and business houses and order supplies.
