FLIER GOES FAST BUT NOT FAST ENOUGH

LAMB THEATRE ELECTRIC FANS CARRIED AWAY

Eight Pried From Wall by Burglars Who Leave Finger Prints Behind.

Eight 14-inch fans, valued at about \$250, were stolen from the side walls of the Lamb theatre early Sunday morning. The fans, which were screwed to the wall, were pried loose by means of a pinch bar, it is thought. The electric cords were cut. The whole job gave evidence of being a hurry up one.

Assistant Chief L. E. Davenport said today that he believed the fans were boxed and shipped out of the city. The thief who worked on the left side of the theatre was a left-handed man, he said, after looking at the finger prints on the walls. A much bigger man, and one who worked with his right hand, took the fans down on the right side of the theatre building.

Manager W. B. Palmer of the Lamb said today that he believed the thieves attended the last performance and hid inside until the playhouse was closed. They left by a back door which is kept locked by means of a long bar. This was left standing, although the door was closed when the robbery was discovered.

Discovery of the loss was made about 1:30 a. m., Sunday, when Fredy Jobe, motion picture operator, and Marlin Wickware, custodian of the house, returned to the playhouse after a short ride. The men had closed the house about 11:45 p. m. Wickware didn't miss the fans until he pressed the button that starts them off simultaneously. When he failed to hear the whirring sound of the fans, he investigated and saw they were gone.

Manager Palmer has offered a reward of \$50 for the arrest and conviction of the thieves and the return of the fans.

Breckenridge Lions Coming to Ranger To Feast and Play

Breckenridge Lions baseball team will come over to Ranger Thursday for a game with the Ranger Lions. This will be the second meeting, Ranger having lost to the Breckenridges at Breckenridge two weeks ago.

French Deputies Give Approval to Pacific Treaty

PARIS, July 9.—The chamber of deputies today unanimously approved the Washington treaty relating to the Pacific. The chamber passed a bill approving the treaty concluded Dec. 12, 1921, between France, Great Britain, Japan and the United States covering island possessions in the Pacific, and declarations on the same date relating to the Pacific mandate. In today's debate Deputy Archimbaud, a socialist radical, said the President of the United States had expressed sentiments "very unfortunate not to say unfriendly to France."

Archimbaud's reference to the Harding message to the senate on the Pacific treaty said that the message contained allusions far from favorable to the Versailles treaty.

ROTH'S BODY IS FOUND FLOATING IN THE BASKET

Ballooning Believed to Have Died From Exposure; Companion Drowned.

PORT STANLEY, Ont., July 9.—The body of Lieut. L. J. Roth, pilot of the ill-fated U. S. Navy balloon A-6698, was found in the basket of the balloon, 14 miles southwest of here today. The body was clad only in underwear when found in the basket. The body was identified by initials on the underwear.

Evidence that Roth died from exposure was seen as his head and shoulders were hanging over the side of the basket, which has been hunted for by airplanes, boats and search parties for three days. The basket was picked up by a fishing boat commanded by Capt. George Wilson. No trace was found of the body of Lieut. T. B. Null, his aide.

The basket was towed to port and the body placed in the city hall in charge of police.

Woman Dreams of Her Mother's Death Learns It Is True

DENTON, Texas, July 9.—Mrs. Boyd, wife of County Attorney B. W. Boyd, awoke this morning and told her husband that she had a dream during the night that her mother was dead. One hour later a telephone message conveyed the information from Palmer that Mrs. J. C. Wadley, her mother, had died suddenly at 7 o'clock this morning.

POLICE HAVE FAIRLY BUSY TIME SUNDAY

There was more work for the police Sunday night than Saturday night, the police blotter showed Monday morning. A fight between two men ended at the police station, where both men were booked on charges of fighting early Sunday evening. Officer Ingram and Assistant Chief L. E. Davenport found a young woman on Oak street under the influence of strong drink. At the station she gave her age as 27.

Early Monday morning Night Sergeant Hamilton and Officer Jim Daniels went to a local hotel to put a quietus on a disturbance. The officers brought three to the station. One was charged with fighting, another, a woman, with interfering with an officer, and the third with being drunk.

Two men were brought to the police station for investigation, but were afterwards released after satisfying the officers that they were going straight.

AUDIT OF GROSS RECEIPTS COLLECTIONS BEING MADE

AUSTIN, July 9.—Auditors from the state comptroller's department are being despatched over the state to investigate the reports of tax collectors and oil companies regarding reports of gross receipts during the past quarter, according to F. H. Pierson, chief of the oil division of the comptroller's department in an announcement today.

Ten auditors are to be put into the field to investigate the various reports. Examinations will be made of reports on all of the 17 various gross receipts taxes for which quarterly summaries are made to the state department.

A recent survey of receipts showed a decided increase in taxes.

NEW YORK, July 9.—Seated among her household goods piled up high in orderly rows on the sidewalk of the house from which she had been ejected, Miss Sarah E. Lodewick, formerly a tenant at 232 Madison avenue, found the world had soft spots in its heart and that the day might be darker than it appeared. She feasted on roast beef, hot bread, poached eggs and steaming coffee, served under the direction of a dignified butler from the nearby home of J. P. Morgan, the financier.

Miss Lodewick is awaiting the time when some of her boarders will pay up and enable her to move her furniture back into the house from which it was just removed and resume her business. She hopes and expects they will pay up soon. Meanwhile she has a bright smile on tap for the passers by.

"New York people are kind," words seldom heard these days, was Miss Lodewick's comment as she graciously accepted Morgan's offer from his dignified butler. "People have hearts, you know, even if they try to look as though they have not."

Miss Lodewick is not destitute, she explained, only temporarily embarrassed. She is not unhappy and is endeavoring to be as comfortable as possible. It would not be much of a deprivation if obliged to sleep out of doors during the hot weather, but Miss Lodewick is allowed to sleep in the house from which she was evicted.

What is the next step in the program? Miss Lodewick is not quite sure, but she is pinning her faith to the boarders who are in arrears and says that everything will be "quite all right" when they pay their several accounts.

SPECIAL HIGHWAY ELECTION MAY BE HELD JULY 28, EVEN WITHOUT LEGAL INDORSEMENT

AUSTIN, July 9.—A movement was under way today to arrange for the holding of a special election on July 28 to vote on a constitutional amendment relative to state highways.

Acting Governor Davidson withheld the issuance of a proclamation calling off the election at the request of Judge J. D. Towne, heading a committee from the University of Texas and the State Highway association.

The election was held, in an opinion by the state legal department, invalidated by failure to make proper advance publication.

PRESIDENT AND PARTY SAILING ALASKAN WATERS

Visit Wrangell Today and Will Then Proceed to Juneau.

ON BOARD S. S. HENDERSON, Off Alaskan Coast, June 9.—The navy transport Henderson, carrying President Harding and his party, steamed northward along the Alaskan coast today after making the first acquaintance with Alaskan waters yesterday.

The steamship was off Wrangell early today. Members of the party were to go ashore there for a brief visit. The next stop will be at Juneau.

STATE SUES FOR MONEY PLACED IN EASTLAND COUNTY DEPOSITORY

In a suit styled the State of Texas vs. Eastland County et al., suit has been brought by the state in the Ninety-first district court against the several securities on the bond of the defunct Security State Bank & Trust company of Eastland for the sum of \$40,000 alleged in part to have been state funds placed in the bank as one of its depositories. J. L. Chapman, commissioner of insurance and banking, is named in his official capacity as a defendant for the reason that the state's claim was classed as an interest-bearing deposit which did not permit it to share in the guaranty fund. Judgment is asked against all defendants except Eastland county for the debt and plaintiff asks that Eastland county be required to assert any claim or demand she may have against the depository bondsmen.

Defendants named in the suit who were on the bond of the Security State Bank & Trust company are: R. R. Hodges of Taylor county; C. T. Barringer and J. S. Mullin of Carter county, Oklahoma; Joe Burkett and Allen Dabney of Eastland; M. H. Smith and Edwin Hobby of Dallas county, and the estate of R. L. Hunt, deceased.

First Arrest in Ranger by Power Of Curfew Law

A 10-year-old boy was brought to the police station last night about 10:40 o'clock and he had the curfew law, passed two months ago, explained to him. He was found on Cherry street by Assistant Chief Davenport and Officers Daniels and Ingram, who were making an arrest at the time on Cherry street.

The boy was sent to his home with a warning that he must be off the street by 9 o'clock each night.

AMERICAN IN CHINA CHARGED WITH SMUGGLING

SHANGHAI, July 9.—A warrant was issued today for the arrest of Lawrence Kearney, an American, charged with being the head of a gang engaged in the wholesale smuggling of arms into China from Japan and other sources.

PASSION FOR UNREAL REASON FOR PAINTING FACE, WRITER SAYS

Is the world, and particularly the United States, on the brink of destruction because the modern girl smokes, drinks, sweats and has no modesty, reverence or religion?

Has the new woman put a jinx on the world since the old one went away?

Alexander Black of New York City, author of several books on the American girl, does not think so. His mature judgment appears in an article in the Century Magazine for August. WILLIAM R. DAY, ONCE SECRETARY OF STATE, DIES

Served 19 Years and Until Recently as Associate Justice of U. S. Supreme Court.

MACKINAC ISLAND, Mich., July 9.—William R. Day, former associate justice of the United States supreme court, died at his cottage here this morning. With him were his son, William L. Day, and the latter's wife. The funeral will be at Canton, Ohio, next Thursday.

Judge Day was a notable figure in the national government for more than a quarter of a century, both in executive and judicial capacity. He resigned from the supreme court in November, 1922, to become umpire of the commission on war claims, from which he resigned May 15 of this year after it had developed that the activities and requirements of the supreme court where he worked for 19 years had impaired his health.

Judge Day was born in Ravena, Ohio, April 17, 1849, being a son of Judge Luther Day of the supreme court of Ohio. He graduated from the University of Michigan in 1870, was admitted to the Ohio bar in 1872 and began the practice of law in Canton. He was appointed assistant secretary of state by President McKinley in April, 1897, and was made secretary of state in April, 1898, from which position he resigned to accept chairmanship of the commission which negotiated the treaty of peace with Spain at the close of the Spanish-American war. President McKinley appointed him United States circuit judge for the sixth judicial district in February, 1899, and President Roosevelt appointed him an associate justice of the United States supreme court in February, 1903.

Sheriff of Titus County Ousted and Successor Named

MOUNT PLEASANT, Texas, July 9.—W. L. Kelly has been appointed sheriff of Titus county by District Judge Wilkinson, following action of the jury yesterday in returning a verdict of guilty against John Reeves, sheriff, on charges of bribery, misconduct and malfeasance in office. Notice of appeal had not been filed early today.

MRS. BUZZI SENTENCED TO DIE IN ELECTRIC CHAIR

NEW YORK, July 9.—Mrs. Anna Buzzi today was sentenced to die in the electric chair during the week of Aug. 6, for the murder of a contractor named Schneider, with whom she had lived for eight years.

"Goliath of Wets" Leader of Noisy Frogs, Says Dry

DES MOINES, July 9.—Governor Al Smith was called the "Goliath of the Wets" in the address of R. A. Walker of Chicago, at the International Christian Endeavor convention here today.

"The wets are the Philistines of the present day," said Mr. Walker. "They have won a temporary victory and they have selected as their big blustering champion, the governor of New York who is heralded as their great leader, just as was Goliath, the defiant champion of the Philistines. He is challenging the dries to battle. The modern Philistines apparently have things going their way and many of the dries are relatively in the same position as King Saul's forces, fearful of results.

"Have we dries so soon forgotten that the 'battle is the Lord's'? Are we standing in fear of the results when we have God and truth on our side? Who is there among the wets that can stand against truth?"

"Let 'Goliath' Smith beware. Somewhere in the ranks of the dries there is a David with mighty faith and a trusty sling. In the sling will be placed the stony votes that will hit the Goliath between the eyes—whether that Goliath at the next election be Al Smith or some other champion of the wets. Whoever the Goliath of the modern Philistines may be, he will be politically dead after election—possibly after the presidential primaries. "The wets are like frogs, they make a lot of noise but their noise means nothing. "Let the mighty Christian Endeavor host continue in their prayers and on election day use the sling and stone of their votes to kill the ambition of the wets to control of this nation."

PEOPLE HAVE SOME RIGHTS SAYS REPORT

President Is Studying Recommendation of Commission On Anthracite.

WASHINGTON, July 9.—President Harding, in Alaska today, had before him the long-awaited recommendations of the commission on anthracite. The report is believed to have been sent to the President so that he might determine whether he would submit it to congress for enactment into law.

The report recommends that the President be given authority, in the event of a strike by the coal miners to take over and direct the production, distribution and marketing of the coal. Mine operators also would be required to make reports at stated intervals on the cost of production and distribution, the price of coal to the public and the profits to the operators.

The report says that anthracite production requires the activities of a relatively small number of people and that anthracite is necessary to the comfort and well being of millions of people and that when disagreements arise between the miners and the mine operators they must deal with each other in the light of the general welfare of the people.

SWINDLER MAKES USE OF INNOCENT YOUNG LAD

SAN ANTONIO, July 9.—Promised fifty per cent of the profits by an adult companion, a 15-year-old boy was arrested here on a charge of peddling glass diamonds for the genuine stones.

A passerby, to whom the lad offered to sell a "two-karat" glass diamond for \$75, notified Detective Sam Street. Street and the prospective customer met the boy again and the customer said he couldn't give but \$50 for the gem. "We'll give you more than that—in another way," Street told the lad. The latter was released when he told the judge he was an innocent accomplice.

HE IS FORCED TO GROUND WHEN JUST HALF WAY

Engine Goes "Dead" and Quick Landing Necessary; Plane Slightly Damaged.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., July 9.—Lieut. Russell Maughan, attempting a dawn to dark flight from New York to San Francisco, and who started from the Atlantic coast this morning just as the first streak of the approaching dawn appeared on the horizon, was forced down at 1:05 o'clock today at Avenue City, Mo., about 10 miles north of this place.

Lieutenant Maughan said that he had been having engine trouble and finally the engine had gone "dead," so that it was necessary that he seek a landing. He came down in a field at Avenue City and his plane was broken in alighting, so that he will be unable to continue his flight.

Lieutenant Maughan had completed nearly one-half of the journey, but was behind his schedule and would have found it difficult to arrive in San Francisco before dark. He is determined to accomplish the task, however, and said he proposed to make another try within a few days.

A large crowd had gathered at Rosecrans field to welcome the aviator and there was much disappointment when the news was received that the plane had been forced down.

MITCHELL FIELD, N. Y., July 9.—Lieut. Russell L. Maughan, piloting a Curtiss pursuit plane, today hopped off at 3:56 eastern standard time, on the first lap of his dawn to dark flight across the continent. He expected to reach San Francisco in 16 1/2 hours, covering a distance of 2,640 miles at an average speed of 160 miles an hour. Four stops were planned at Dayton, Ohio; St. Joseph, Mo.; Cheyenne, Wyo.; and Salduro, Utah, to refuel and rests of not exceeding 30 minutes.

The object of the flight, according to the commanding officer here, is to blaze a trail for transporting in one day a fleet of airplanes from coast to coast in the event of an attack by hostile forces upon the United States, and also to suggest the establishment of landing fields.

Maughan holds the air speed record of the world, 286 miles an hour and his plane is capable of making 172 miles an hour. The plane has a 400-horsepower engine.

DAYTON, Ohio, July 9.—Lieut. Maughan hopped off from McCook field at 9:35, eastern standard time, on the second lap of the dawn to dark flight. He was one hour and 38 minutes behind his schedule.

Mad Bull Attacks Passenger Train Both are Wrecked

TULSA, Okla., Jun 9.—A mad bull disputed the Katy right of way near Appalachia, Okla., with a west bound passenger train Sunday morning, and charging down the track, crashed into the engine at full speed. Both the bull and the train suffered injuries.

The bull was killed. The engine and baggage car were tumbled over into the ditch, but the engineer and fireman jumped in time to escape serious injury.

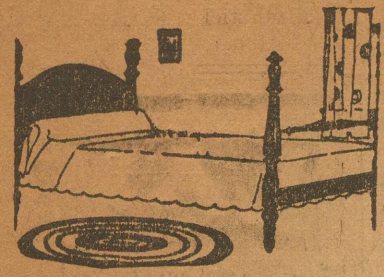
COMBATANTS AT SEALY TO BE TRIED AT AUSTIN

AUSTIN, July 9.—Trial of John Miller and Foster Bell, charged with murder and assault to murder, growing out of a street battle at Sealy last fall, is expected to begin tomorrow. Examination of jurymen began today.

The first trial of Miller resulted in a hung jury. Bell was given five years in prison on an assault to murder charge.

NUGENT PITCHES 25 INNINGS IN SEVEN DAYS

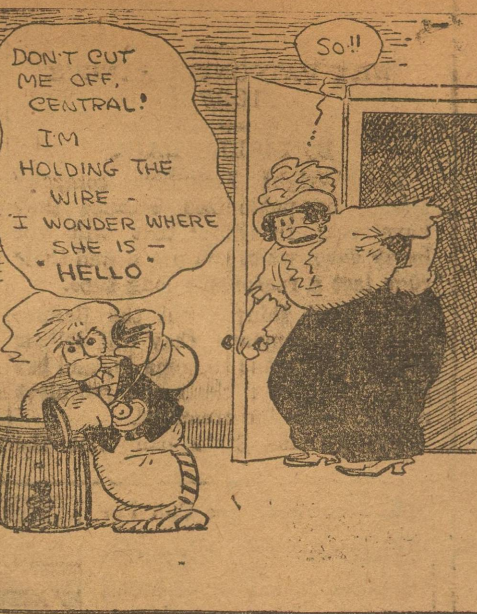
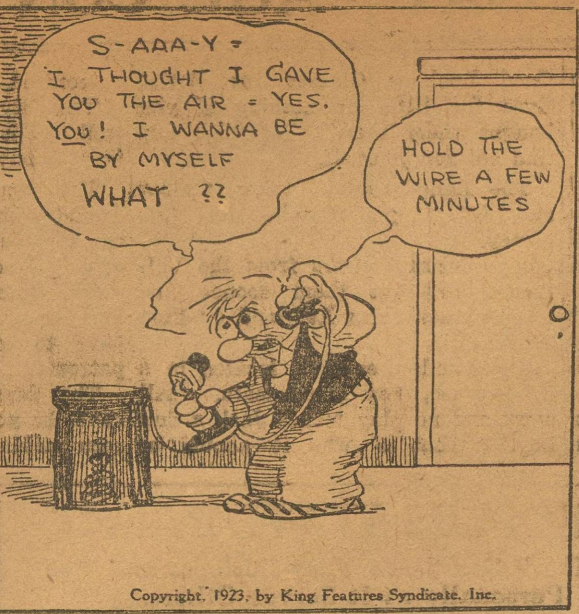

When a farmer takes his product to market and sells it for, say, a dollar a bushel, he is dependent upon the honesty of two measures—the dollar and the bushel.

The other day a crossroads storekeeper got sent to jail for manipulating a trick bushel basket with a false bottom that would slide up and down in a way that was grand, gloomy and mysterious. When using it to measure stuff he bought from a farmer, he'd secretly shove the bottom down until it held at least a bushel and a quarter, but he would only credit him with a bushel. The buying power of the farmer's product was thereby depreciated by about twenty per cent.

Finally the farmers thereabouts got wise to the fact that the only way they could get what was coming to them was to enforce a reliable standard of measurement. So they put a good stiff jail penalty on using a fake measure, laid for that storekeeper with the trick basket and sent him to prison.

Politicians in Europe have been manipulating the other measure—the money measure—in much the same way. Some of them in America want to tamper likewise with the dollar. Here is about the way it would work out. Suppose, when the farmer brought his product to market, the basket measure was honest enough and he got a dollar bill for each bushel. He'd take his dollars home and save them. Perhaps he planned to buy some land next his own for a thousand dollars, and figured that in a year or so he could make it.
