China In Distress, Living Buddha's Rain Making Vase Is Lost

PEKIN, June 26.—The Living Buddha's magic rain vase is lost. The Living Buddha, he it known, has been touring the northern and central parts of China since his recent arrival from Tibet, and as part of the paraphernalia with which he bolsters up his status as spiritual head of all Buddhism he has carried with him a vase alleged to bring rain in large quantities. While in Peking, the Living Buddha placed this vase in the Pei Hai (North Lake of the winter palace) and, presumably as a result, rain fell. But more rain was wanted in other districts. Great was the consternation when it was found that in some way the vase had disappeared. Energetic steps are being taken to recover it, while the Chinese farmers grimly predict a dry summer in spite of good spring rains.

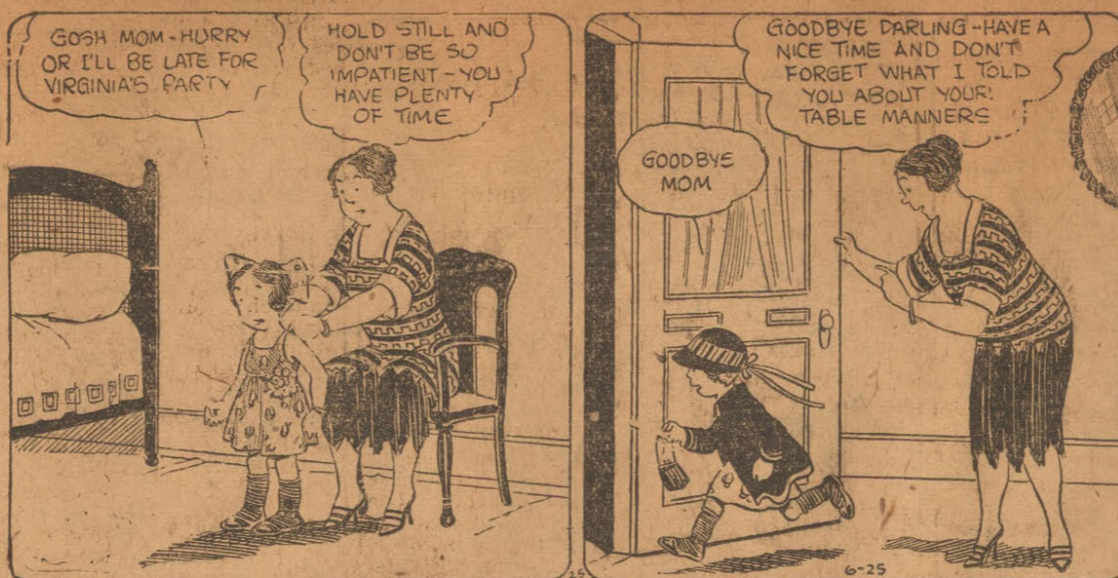
Advantage has been taken to the situation by General Chang Tsung-chang, now viceroy of Shantung province, to gain popularity. He first prayed for rain and next caused 120 guns to be fired on a hillside just outside Tsinanfu. No rain resulted but the people were greatly pleased at this evidence of solicitude for their welfare.

To clinch his advantage, General Chang has sent for the famous rain-making iron tablet from Hantan-hsien. This tablet, a most sacred relic, was brought to Peking last summer after long drought and immediately after its arrival rain fell in such quantities as to render many thousands of persons homeless and to kill nearly 15,000 outright in the floods. More caution is to be exercised in praying before it this year, it is understood.

SAN ANTONIO—Electric transmission lines of the San Antonio Public Service company and the Texas Power & Light company are to be connected in the vicinity of San Marcos thus adding to the already extensive interconnected electric service of Texas. Surveys are now being made.

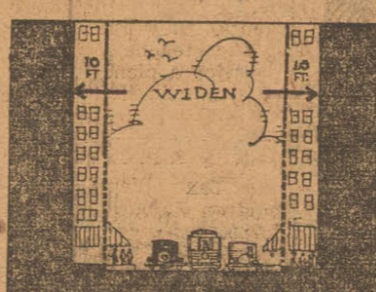

WALTER P. CHRYSLER'S TRAFFIC TALKS

The city of yesterday was laid out when horse-drawn vehicles and low buildings were the rule. This is an age of motor cars and sky-scrapers. And in this new age the same streets that were used yesterday are being taxed to the limit by all types of motor vehicular traffic.



Question might well be raised whether it wouldn't be better to require that new buildings be constructed ten feet further back from the building line than originally. What would be the result? As old buildings were replaced the street would become twenty feet wider. Then, too, this plan would make the public more conscious of certain buildings and steps would be taken to replace them. New York has a building with 14,000 tenants. That building has 65 elevators which carry 100,000 people every day. Those people pack the streets below, which are of the same width as those of twenty-five years ago. The control of vehicular traffic

of our towns and cities is a problem of great importance. It is not only a police problem but it is also a problem affecting business interests. The number of motor vehicles in use in our cities has doubled every four years. It is unfortunate when a city thinks because it has no immediate traffic problem that it should neglect building for the future. Now is the time to build for tomorrow. It will not only add to the comfort and happiness of the town's inhabitants but it is good business as well.

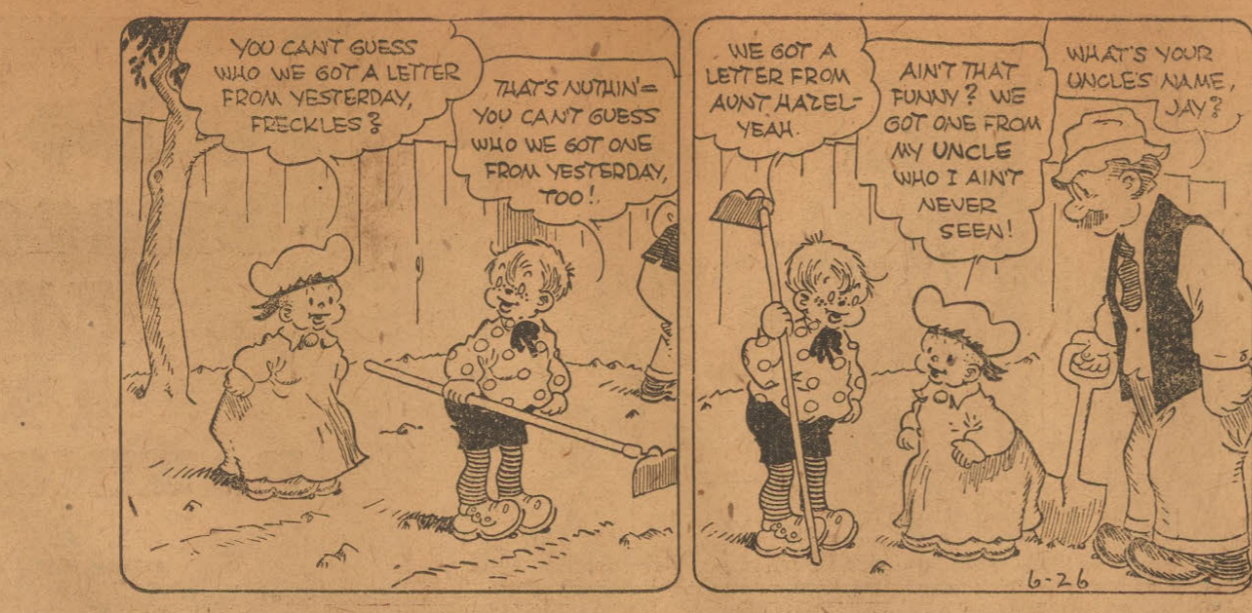

American Tobacco Company Continues Self-Pensioning Program for Employees

NEW YORK.—Helping employees to store up a reserve which gives them a seat in the sun in the sunset of life is the practical program evinced in the continuation of the allotment offer of preferred stock of the

American Tobacco company, just sent out for the eighth time by President Percival S. Hill to 14,443 employees of the company.

Almost at the minute William E. Knox, president of the American Bankers' association, was saying to his associates at Topeka, Kansas, that the thrift a worker shows in providing against dependency in old age was as important a basis for increase in salary as meritorious service, the head of the tobacco company was giving material response to the speaker's words.

The allotment plan does in effect what President Knox advocated, that is emphasize to the employee the importance of saving to have a competency in old age. But it does more;

it provides practical ways and means of saving.

Similar in some features to that used by the government in pensioning postal employees, it is now eight years old, and successful from the outset, has grown into one of the most practical self-pension systems sponsored by executives of a large organization.

It provides an easy method by which an employee can do the thing constantly in his mind, but which he seldom knows how to do, namely save for the future. In some respects, it works out more advantageously for the employee of the tobacco company than the postal employee. The great financial leverage of the company, and the experience of the executives, are brought into action for the benefit of the employee, providing for him a safe investment and the maximum return on it.

Following the keynote of organized thrift, sounded by President Coolidge, the head of the tobacco company counselled his employees to save, and in addition laid down the principle that it is the duty of a corporation to help them to save.

Sunshine For Rainy Day
"The trend of modern commercial enterprises that are well conducted," he said in his letter to employees, "is constantly toward greater and greater consideration on the part of officers of the companies of the interests and welfare of employees, and greater and greater consideration by

employees of all classes of the interest of their company.

"One way for a company to show a proper consideration of the welfare of its employees is undoubtedly to encourage employees to save in a reasonable and systematic way.

"We desire to do everything possible to give opportunity and encouragement for provision by each of our employees against the proverbial 'rainy day', and if, fortunately, there come no rainy days, then for the inevitable 'sunset day' of his life."

How Plan Works
The ways and means of the plan provide that: An employee invests in the preferred stock of the company on the installment plan, according to his earning capacity. The allotment is graded according to wages and salary from \$1,000 to \$10,000 two to twenty shares being allotted respectively.

The American Tobacco company goes into the market, and buys its preferred stock at whatever price it is able to secure it. It usually takes better than \$106 a share to acquire the stock.

This stock is then sold to the employee at what, in the end, amounts to \$89.97 a share paid for in installments deducted from the employee's salary monthly.

The price is arrived at in the following manner: An initial allotment price made to the employee is \$103. This is less than what the company pays for it. But in addition to this reduction, the purchaser, over the period of two years in which he pays for the stock, is credited with seven quarterly dividends of \$1.50 each, and two yearly allowances by the company of \$4 each, making \$8. Against this reduction is charged 5 per cent interest on the unpaid balance, aggregating \$5.47. This amount to a reduction of \$13.03 on the stock, bringing the cost to him at the end of two years to \$89.97.

It is interesting to note that for the three following years after the payment of this stock, upon presentation of an employee's certificate to the treasurer of the company, an additional \$4 per year is allowed the employee. Of this fact the company makes no mention in its statement of stock cost as an employee must under the plan pay for this stock in two years. Really though, the actual cost to the employee is \$12 less than that claimed by the company, always provided he holds the stock for three years more. An additional inducement to encourage saving.

Fortified Incomes
The practical working out of this investment is well illustrated by two classes of employees. Take a man earning a thousand dollars who buys two shares. If the company continues the offer consecutively, and an employee avails himself of it con-

secutively, for twenty allotments, he will in the end have laid aside 40 shares of preferred stock. The income from this stock will have amounted to \$2,772. The total value of this stock at par and the income thereon will amount to \$6,772.

On the other hand, if the \$2,772 income is reinvested in preferred stock, and the income from such additional investment has, likewise, been reinvested—that is, by a sort of compound interest program—the employee, after 20 allotments will have acquired 40 shares in addition to his original purchase of 40 shares, giving him a total of 80 shares owned, from which he will receive an annual income at \$6 a share or \$480 per year.

In the case of the employee earning \$10,000 or more 20 shares can be secured from the allotment. If the same procedure is followed as described for the thousand-dollar employee, this employee will have an income from the stock amounting to \$27,720 and the total value of the stock and the income thereon will amount to \$67,720.

If the \$27,720 has been reinvested in preferred stock and the income from such reinvestment has likewise been reinvested, the employee, after 20 allotments, would possess 420 shares in addition to his original 400 shares, making a total of 820 shares, from which he would receive an annual income of approximately \$5,000 for protection in his declining years.

This thoroughly practical method of financing old age is proving popular with many of the employees of the American Tobacco company. Of course, it places nothing obligatory on the employee. Whether he takes advantage of it or not neither enhances nor depreciates his standing with the company.

The point is that it gives a practical method of saving for a great many people who do not know how to save. It is hard enough to save money at all, and it is still harder to know how to save it in a way that makes it safe. Many savings of employees are lost in one way or another. Employees who are thrifty and frugal enough to make certain sacrifices to save money, are often victimized by their own ignorance of what to do with their savings.

The American Tobacco company plan not only makes it easy to save but gives a man, an employee, a rock-ribbed program from the standpoint of security, enhanced by the fact that he is given an advantageous purchase at the beginning.

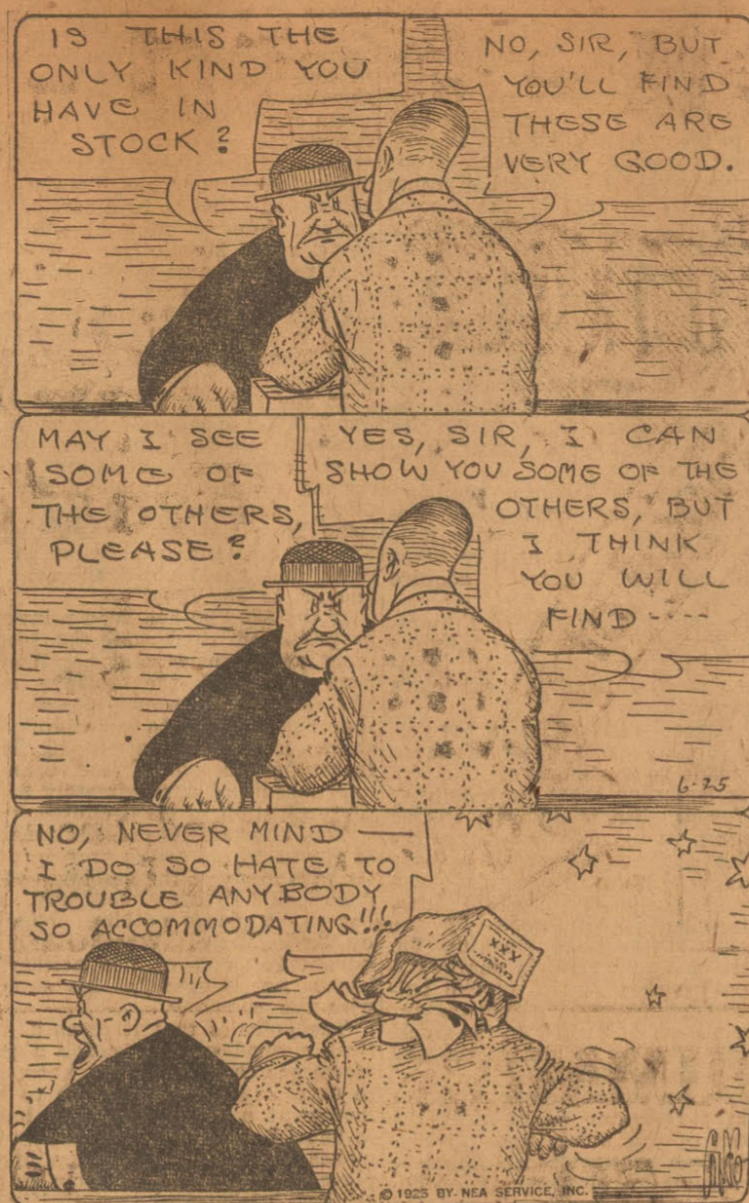

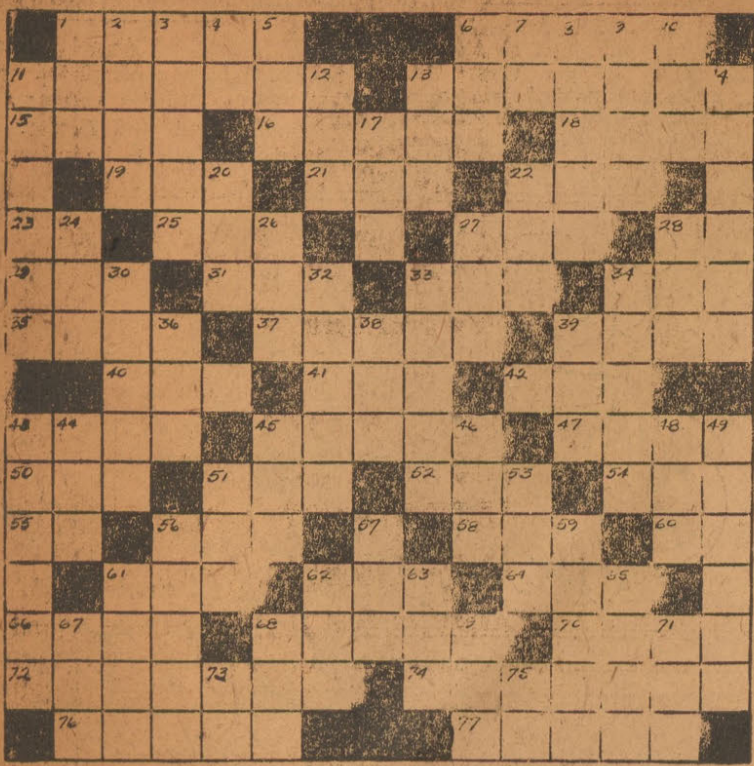

PUBLIC OPINION REALLY RULES UTILITY INDUSTRY

Public opinion is the real regulator of the public utility business, according to L. O. Ripley, of Wichita, Kan., president, Middle West division, National Electric Light association.

"No state commission nor regulatory body can give satisfactory relief, when needed, to that public utility which has not earned a favorable public opinion by an honest effort toward giving good service," Mr. Ripley said. "A tornado is not a circumstance to the damage coming from adverse public opinion."

Uniform and intelligent advertising is necessary to the successful

conduct of public service companies, he added, because the comprehension by the public of the electrical industry's problem is not keeping pace with the growth of the industry.
