Discusses Issues. "Extraneous issues in Texas are constantly blindfolding us to the real problems of state government," Mr. Davidson explained. "I say the real problems of state government—it should be stated the problems of state management—for after all the question of proper finance in Texas and the convertion of the deficiencies

and the correction of the deficiencies under which this state is operating are merely a matter of management. I know whereof I speak, because not only have I had 35 years of success-ful business experience, but I have had opportunity to study the governmental business during my terms of state legislator, state senator, and

lieutenant governor."

Once Texas rids itself of clique and bloc factionalism in its political and bloc factionalism in its political progress, Mr. Davidson declared, then "we can get down to the real business of solving this penitentiary problem and correcting the enormous wastage of our taxes all to the reduction of our tax rate and the saving of not less than ten million dollars biencially."

CAUSES DEATHS

Nearly 100 Persons Reported Killed in Amalfi District on Gulf of Salerno.

By United Press.

AMALFI, Italy, March 27.—At east 91 persons were killed, and the lives of many persons, including number of Americans, imperilled when a series of landslides devastat ed several villages on the Gulf of Salerno yesterday, it was officially innounced today.

While Amalfi itself suffered little damage, Vettica and Conca Marina, on the sunny coast, suffered severe-ly. More than 50 persons were kill-ed at the former place and scarcely a house was left undamaged.

The roads leading up to the mountain side were blocked with great boulders of rock and broken trees, nearly all the way to the Petrucian hotel, where many tourists, panic-stricken, but safe, were found. Re fugees, many of them carrying bundles hastily snatched from their devastated homes, began to stray into Amalfi early today and told pitiful tales of death and destruction. lief was hastened to the stricken area at once, with dectors and medical supplies. The bishop of Amalfi placed his seminary at the disposal of the rescue workers and many of the injured were taken there. cue work was being pushed vigor-

ously today. Many fishing boats were sunk when the landslide reached the sea. Premier Mussolini sent his under secretary, Seidi, from Rome today to ascertain just what aid was necessary.





PAVING WORK PROMISED TO BEGIN AT ONCE

Elm Street Block in Front of Postoffice Is to Be Improved.

"Weather permitting, work will start on Elm and Pine streets one week from Monday," Raymond Teal, street commissioner, told a Times representative today. That will be April 7. The 100 block of Elm street, commonly known as the "postoffice block," will be graded, graveled and curbings put in. The 400 block of Fine street which already has curbing in, will be graveled from the end of the pavement to South Hodges street.

Street Commissioner Teal made this statement today after being informed that the Ranger Chamber of Commerce had raised in cash and material more than two-thirds of the total cost of the improvement of the postoffice block

material more than two-thirds of the total cost of the improvement of the postoffice block.

The Pine street improvement has been aclayed because of inclement weather, he said. L. A. Vandervoort and W. J. Colegrove, engineers, employed by the city at present, will supervise the street improvements.

The cost of the postoffice block improvement will be \$638 and is divided as follows: Sixteen yards of concrete gravel, \$32; 250 lineal feet of curb and gutter, \$200; 280 cubic yards of good gravel, \$322; six days labor and two teams grading and spreading at \$14 a day, \$84. These estimates were prepared by former City Engineer H. E. Seward.

The Wagner Supply company has agreed to furnish all of the gravel, which amounts to \$354. The Reynolds Cattle company of New Albany, represented by C. E. Maddocks of Ranger and G. F.
