Alleged Violators of Liquor Law in Somervell County Will Be Brought to Trial.

By United Press. WACO, Texas, Sept. 15.-Frank B. Tirey, special prosecutor appoint ed by Governor Neff to conduct an investigation before the Somervell grand jury into alleged violations of the state prohibition law, returned to Waco this afternoon after being clos-

eted with the grand jury for 10 days. Tirey said that the grand jury, which adjourned Saturday, had returned 92 felony indictments, 81 of them for alleged violations of the state liquor law and two of them against Sheriff W. W. Davis of Somervell county and former County Attorney C. L. Roark, both being charged with accepting bribes.

The cases against Sheriff Davis and the former county attorney, according to Tirey, were transferred y District Judge Irwin Ward to ohnson county on his own motion. They will be tried in Cleburne someimle in November.

By Associated Press. MEXICO CITY, Sept. 15-Hunting for buried treasure, and a revival of legends of hidden wealth, is noted throughout Mexico. The death of Francisco Villa in an ambuscade at Parral, with the resultant disappearance of the fear of that dread outlaw's vengeance if any of his supposed hidden hoards were discovered, is one of the causes of the revival.

From Acapulco comes a story of the discovery by an unnamed German of 15,000,000 pesos worth of gold and silver bars popularly re-ported to have been hidden by the Mexican revolutionary General Vibullion, it is said, from treasure cente Guerrero. He captured this trains hurrying from the Guerrero mines to Acapulco when it became plain that Spain's days of domination in Mexico were numbered.

An expedition has left San Pedro de las Colonias, Coahuila, in search of several million pesos worth of bullion, jewels, money and other valuable objects reported to have been buried in 1914 by Villa somewhere along the Parras road.

Ancient documents are being republished to prove the existence of a treasure said to total 20,000,000 pesos in gold and silver, hidden in a cave on the banks of the Rio Hondo, between Mexico City and Toluca. This hoard is reported to have been accumulated by the revolutionary leader Antonio Balizan in raids conducted between 1912 and 1815 against Spanish bullion trains carrying metal from the mines of Sultepec and Temascaltepec. It has been sought before, and again is being hunted with renewed vigor.




