SANTA BARBARA WRECKED BY EARTHQUAKE

SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA ROCKED BY EARTH TREMORS TODAY WITH HEAVY LOSS LIFE AND PROPERTY

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29.—Sixty-five dead had been counted at 10 a. m. in Santa Barbara's earthquake disaster, according to word reaching Southern Pacific offices today.

Fire had broken out in several sections of the city and was spreading rapidly. Water mains have been wrecked and firemen are badly hampered. The Southern Pacific has concentrated all available tank cars, filled them with water and is rushing them to the stricken city.

EARTHQUAKE IS CENTERED ABOUT SANTA BARBARA

Los Angeles Suffers No Damage, But People Frightened; Large Area Covered.

LOS ANGELES, June 29.—Severe earth tremors were felt here at 6:44 o'clock this morning. The earthquake lasted for about 30 seconds and reports indicated it was felt over a wide area. Buildings in the city appeared to rock and timbers were heard to crack. Lights hanging from ceilings swayed like pendulums.

Large Buildings Demolished In Santa Barbara and Chief Business Streets Piled With Wreckage. Los Angeles and Other Places Feel the Shock.

SANTA BARBARA, June 29.—At least eight persons were killed and about 300 injured and property damage totaling more than \$2,000,000 caused by the earthquake which laid this city in ruins today. Two bodies have been recovered and at least six others are missing.

LOS ANGELES, June 29.—At least 60 persons lost their lives, hundreds were injured and enormous property damage was caused by a series of earth tremors which rocked Santa Barbara and surrounding territory, according to radio reports.

LOS ANGELES, June 29.—The city and surrounding territory were isolated. Special trains carried Red Cross and other relief from Los Angeles.

YEGGMEN WRECK RANGER STEAM LAUNDRY SAFE

Noise of Explosion Scares Them Away Without Any Loot; Police Have Clew.

An unsuccessful attempt to loot the safe of the Ranger Steam laundry occurred Sunday morning about 4 o'clock. The laundry, located at Cherry and North Austin streets, is situated in a more or less isolated spot with no other business firms near by.

The force of the explosion blew the heavy iron door of the safe completely off its hinges, one piece hitting the ceiling with such force as to knock a large hole in it. The inner compartment of the safe was badly jammed and the inner door stuck so that it was impossible to open it without using another small charge of explosive or by prying it off with tools.

Entrance to the laundry was made through a rear door, according to Mr. Chaney, owner of the laundry. The yeggmens left the job unfinished, it was thought, because they became afraid when the explosion wrecked the safe and rocked the building.

Captain David Bone wired his office here: "In collision with fishing schooner today. Thick fog. Survivors on board. Tuscania proceeding to port undamaged."

CRUDE OIL DUE TO GO HIGHER IN FEW DAYS

High-Gravity Oklahoma Pools Fall Short of Expectations; Little Oil Stored.

DALLAS, June 29.—A special dispatch to the Dallas News and Journal from Tulsa, Okla., says that the future of two high-gravity oil pools that have been touted very highly is hanging in the balance.

It is barely possible that both pools have been overestimated and if so then the Oklahoma crude situation has been greatly bolstered. As it is, the bearish attitude of the Prairie Oil & Gas company officials toward the crude oil market is not endorsed by many standard and independent concerns.

The Wilcox sand area at Garber, was opened by the Sinclair Oil & Gas company with its No. 25 Belveal, in 24-22-4w, hitting the pay at 4,377 feet and exploring it to 4,011 feet. The second well to hit the deep sand is Sinclair's No. 1 Burns in 30-22-4w, but it was only full of water at 4,440 feet.

The development makes many high-priced acreage deals look questionable at this time.

Seeking Deep Pay.
The Twin State Oil company is trying to drill in the second well in the deep pay at Alcorn-Thomas, in Key county. Its No. 2 Siler, in 22-25-2w, has the cap rock above the Wilcox at 3,989 feet and is trying to break through.

Noble, Garfield, Logan, Kingfisher and Dewey counties are due for a new leasing campaign now, thanks to the revival of Billings by the 5-145-foot K. D. well near Perry, the Garber activity and other near-by showings.

In the Osage the chief development is the withdrawals from storage that are attracting attention.

The last week 153,924 barrels were taken out of storage, leaving 11,295,946 barrels. Only two companies—the Mid-Kansas Oil & Gas company and the Carter Oil company—ran any oil to storage.

Montana People Apprehensive of More Earth Tremors

BUTTE, Mont., June 29.—People in Montana today were still apprehensive over the earthquake shock which rocked most of the state Saturday night and continued with diminishing intensity Sunday and Sunday night.

A shift in the main fault under the Rocky mountains in the big belt mountain district probably was the cause of the trouble, in the opinion of President Clapp of the University of Montana, a noted geologist. He said this region long was known to have "faults," or great cracks in the earth.

Much damage and destruction to property and buildings at Three Forks, White Sulphur Springs, Manhattan and other points was reported, but the outstanding sufferers were the railroads.

None Is Killed.
Strangely enough, in all this huge state, with landslides and tunnels collapsing, buildings tumbling down and fires, not one person was killed, so far as could be learned.

Telephone connections were established by Sunday noon with Three Forks, Mont., the hardest hit in the series of earthquakes. There, as elsewhere in the state, every building was rocked on its foundations. Almost every building was damaged.

The tremor clipped the wires from Three Forks to the outside world. It left the little city in darkness. Then the disturbance sent pianos careening wildly across rooms. Dishes were thrown about. Cabinets were tipped over. In less than 30 seconds every resident of the town was in the open and none approached the entrance of a single building until after dawn. Inhabitants spent the night on vacant lots. All available tents were drafted into service.

Persons feared the next shock might send the buildings toppling on their heads.

In the various affected centers the sensations of the shocks were identical. Floors seemed to be going up and down. Walls creaked. Pictures on the walls did crazy flips and flops. Persons alone were sure they were getting dizzy and about to faint.

In larger buildings the movement was stronger on the upper stories. Every big building in the state was probably emptied of its human contents within the space of a minute.

People on street cars, through some unaccountable phenomenon, did not feel the tremors. Automobiles shimmed wildly and their occupants reported the same sensation was felt as in buildings.

Motorists in several instances ran off highways, but miraculous good fortune prevented a single death.

Several States Affected.
Apparently the shocks began at 6:23 o'clock Saturday and lasted intermittently until well after 10 o'clock. The quake was felt from Seattle east to the South Dakota line; from Spokane, south to Thermopolis and Casper, Wyo. It left its trade-mark in Northern Idaho, and telephone company officials at Jackson declared that the recurrence of the avalanche across the Gros Ventre valley near there evidently was a part of the general disturbance.

In spite of the delay caused to trains and the wide area covered by the quake, thousands of vacationists in and near Yellowstone park are safe, Horace M. Albright, park superintendent, declares. He reported no material damage had been done in the park. Old Faithful geyser continued to spout serenely and at regular intervals.

The populace of Helena rushed from office buildings and their homes when the shocks came. The Veterans' hospital at Fort Harrison, near by, groaned and cracked, giving the patients a scare.

The brick school building at Three Forks, which apparently bore the brunt of the upheaval, collapsed; a church which was badly damaged and patients in a hospital were dragged from their beds and taken to a place of safety. Some minor injuries were sustained in the rush.

Bridges in and around Three Forks, on the Yellowstone trail, and those over the Jefferson river are declared to have been sprung out of line and are dangerous to traffic. Three Forks is said to have sustained a \$200,000 loss in property.

Willow Creek a town of 300, near Three Forks, caught on fire, according to a report from local sources. This report declares that Three Forks lost one of its bank buildings.

Avalanche Destructive.
The report of the recurrence of the Wyoming landslide was received at Jackson from a forest ranger named Dibble, who said he had had a race for life when a mass of the mountain about one and one-half miles in length, softened by the melting snows oozed down into the valley.

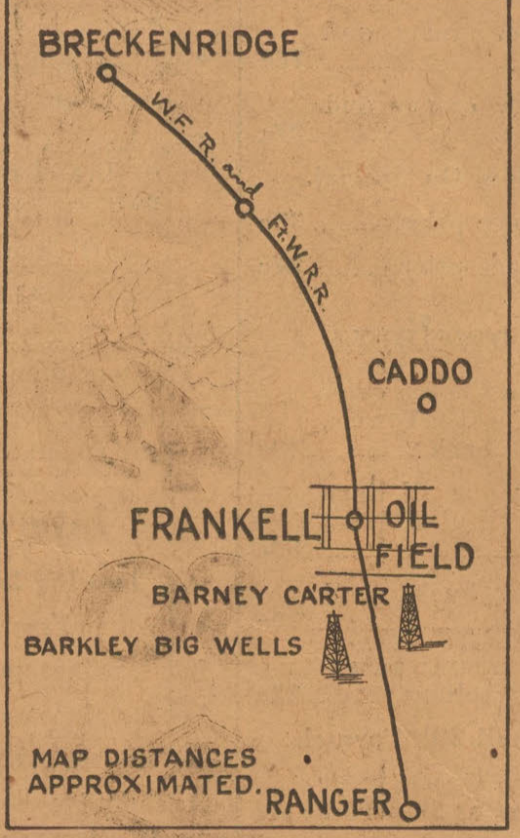
