GOAT RAISING MOUSTRY GETS

Making Big Strides in Eastland County and Likely to Become Very Important.

Goat raising will be an industry to be reckoned with in Eastland county in another year when the county's productive resources are figured out. Goat milk and wool which make goat raising profitable, according to those who have interested themselves in the business, is calculated, if the in-dustry flourishes, to bring more money to county banks.

Among Ranger men who now have Among Ranger men who now have several or more goats in their herds are Gene Reynolds, R. T. Earnest and J. B. Ames. All of these men have become interested in the goat industry lately. The first two men are said to be chiefly interested in the milk production, while Ames will develop his herd for wool productive purposes.

Has 50 Registered Goats. Ames now has 50 registered head of goats on a ranch, a short distance south of Ranger. With purchases of additional head and from breeding, he says he will have 200 head by next spring. If his experiences is successful, he intends to increase his herd to 3,000 head within the next

two years.
"There are some big ranches that can be used for herding," Ames said.
"I'll get herders and turn my goats loose on the grass and brush."

Ames said his experience with goats so far does not lend strength to the common belief that goats need.

to the common belief that goats need an "enormous" acreage of grass to feed on. "I turned 11 head into a half of acre 10 days ago," he said. "There was one tree in it and not much brush. 

Prince Of Wales Likes Colors For His Sport Clothes

By CLARENCE DU BOSE (United Press Staff Correspondent.) LONDON (By mail to United Press.)—The fondness of the Prince of Wales for a touch of color to his clothes is brightening the entire scheme of masculine styles here—and therefore, to a considerable extent throughout the world.

When the heir to the throne was injured recently during a steeplechase race he was wearing a scarlet polo jersey under his pink riding coat. This combination is typical of his love of color. It had never been done before on an English racecourse-but now scarlet jerseys unler pink riding coats are quite the

thing for riding a steeplechase.

The prince is also responsible for naugurating the idea of a white vest, instead of black, with dinner coats—characteristic of his general impulse for lighter rather than darker effects

However, the white vest with dinner jacket is the only instance in which the prince has strayed away from the conventional so far as for-mal or semi-formal garb is concern-ed. That is, unless you count turned-back cuffs on a morning coat. He does insist upon that. But otherwise he wears his formal togs in the way the fashion-plates prescribe. It is in sport things—golf, riding, hunting and general knock-about stuff—that the prince makes the fashion

plates himself, at least in the way of splashing on a bit of color.
For instance, after he has finished riding and has changed from hunting coat to tweeds he likes to re-tain the scarlet jersey, which he had made fashionable for steeplechasing. Sweaters with fancy friezes around the borders, and knitted woolen gloves, with diamond patterns, either black and white or gay colors, are

er black and white or gay colors, are other fashions he has recently started for outdoor sports.

The prince is exceedingly partial to spiffy tweed lounge suits, cut with swing and dash, and he gets his color into this outfit by a gorgeoushued handkerchief; generously displayed from the outer breast pocket.

The one thing the prince sometimes wears that hasn't had widespread imitation is the Jodhpur. This is a

imitation is the Jodhpur. This is a riding garment worn in India by na-tive princes. It fits with glove-like tightness from the ankle to the bnee, and above the knee it balloons like Turkish trousers. Most men find it entirely impossible to get into the things—that is, the lower part of them. Even the prince, with unlimit-ed assistance at his command, must experience considerable difficulty, for he only wears jodhpurs rarely, and apparently will continue to have the style all to himself.





ROWS are one of the greatest pests and the most destruc-tive bird which afflict the tarmer. After thirty years spent in the field fighting crows, hawks and owls, it is my judgement, based on my experience that the crow has no redeeming features.

I have often been asked the question, "Would you say that the crow is beneficial in any way to the farmer?" My answer is that the crow's range of diet is known to include six hundred and fifty-six different things. His bill of fare includes 51 species of birds and very naturally it comprises a few bugs and worms. But when the crow eats a nest of young quail or a nest of mocking birds. he has shut off the destruction of thousands of insects where he would have destroyed a few.




