

Arbitration Eliminated Wages Unchanged; Check Off Adopted

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12. — Secretary of Labor Davis an-nounced that a settlement of the anthracite coal miners strike had been perfected today at 11:10 o'clock at the White House. Mr. Davis said the terms of the settlement were: First—A five year wage con-

tract.

Second—No increase in wages. Third—A modified check off. A full statement of the agree-ment of the conference will be made public by the Department of Labor.

Secretary Davis an hour later ex-plained the terms giving two added important clauses. One is that changes in the wage scale may be made by mutual agreement at any time. The other is that arbitration is eliminated from any future nego-

Davis said these five points of the new contract have been accepted in prinicple and added there was some doubt in his mind as to the nature of the check-off feature. He un-derstands, however, that an arrange-ment for the collection of union dues has been accepted by both sdies. The Eastland county jail, where men are placed because it is believed they have broken the law, is the last place that one would look for a form of government. And yet the fourteen men who are incarcerated have a government of their own.

They have a judge, a sheriff and a treasurer. Whenever a new man is placed behind the bars, court con-venes and he is given a trial by his fellow prisoners. He is fined, the amount usually being equal to the sum of money that he has in his possension, though the fine is never in excess of \$5. If the amount is more than he is able to pay, he "works out" his fine. There are such distasteful tasks as mopping the floors and cleaning up generally to be per-formed and the newcomer performs these duties in lieu of paying the

cash. The whole proceedings is conducted with the utmost good nature by all concerned. Collect Fines

The fines are collected and turned over to the "treasurer" and each evening, the prisoners send out for various wares, the expense being de-frayed from the treasury. So, if a man remains in jail long enough, he will receive back all his fine and peraps more. No treasurer has ever misappropri-

ated any of the funds. No chance is taken of this happening as when the treasurer is restored to liberty, the other prisoners search him before he eaves.

Life Is Simple Life is rather simple in jail. Cards and dominoes provide amusement. Magazines and newspapers are in de-mand and the three Bibles that are

ovided are read frequently. In fact, one of the prisoners re-cently told a visiting newspaper man that if stationery was provided, he would be glad to write a series of
