TEXAS U. GIRLS IN 'BABY PARTY'

Male Students Tear Off Their Rompers in Cafe Orgy; Dean Of Women Resigns

AUSTIN, March 25.—Miss Lucy J. Newton, dean of women, today sent her resignation to the board of regents of the University of Texas, effective at the expiration of the present long session. Miss Newton has not announced her future plans.

AUSTIN, March 25.—President Sp'awn of the University of Texas, and Miss Lucy Newton, Dean of women, today are investigating a so-called "baby party" staged Saturday night at the Austin Country club with a finale in a downtown restaurant. The party is said to have been organized by a Greek letter fraternity and all the girls wore rompers.

The hall at the country club appears to have been "quite proper," but the romping in the cafe downtown is said to have been very rough, some of the girls being deluged with ice water and their clothes torn off them. One girl was garbed only in "wrist watch, slippers and stockings," a waiter in the cafe testified.

ORIENT'S SALE IS CONFIRMED

Seven-Years Receivership Is Ended by Court Order

KANSAS CITY, March 25.—With the sale of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient railroad to Clifford Histed of Kansas City confirmed, Histed today prepared to ask the interstate commerce commission for articles of incorporation and permission to capitalize the new corporation for \$7,500,000. Federal Judge John C. Pollock confirmed the sale and approved the reorganization plan, overruling English and American note-holders who sought to have the sale set aside.

Histed bought the road for \$8,000,000 a year ago. The court ruling ended a seven-year receivership and 15 years of litigation.

LATE FLASHES

RETAIN 30 RANGERS

AUSTIN, March 25.—Following the signing today of the supplemental appropriations bill giving \$22,500 additional to the state ranger force, Adjutant General Mark McGee announced that it would enable him to keep the force at 30 men, instead of only 25 men, as was feared.

The appropriation is for the next two years. McGee said the rangers would be kept on the border for duty.

ROSENWALD GIVES MILLION

CHICAGO, March 25.—A gift of \$1,000,000 by Julius Rosenwald, chairman of the board of directors of Sears, Roebuck & Co., today started the University of Chicago drive for an endowment fund of \$17,500,000.

INDICTS LIFE FRIEND

OKLAHOMA CITY, March 25.—Changing his attitude of last night when he refused to answer questions tending to implicate his fellow senator, Senator Earl Brown of Marietta today gave startling testimony at the hearing of the senate investigating committee. Brown testified that his life-long friend, Senator U. T. Rexroat of Ardmore, told him he could secure a position as an attorney for a public utilities company and a \$500 retainer fee as soon as he voted favorably on the revocable permit bill.

\$3,000,000 SCHOOL FUND

AUSTIN, March 25.—A bill appropriating \$3,000,000 for the rural schools of Texas was signed today by the governor. Other bills signed provide an appropriation of \$100,000 for the maintenance of the state prison system; reappropriate \$32,000 for pink boll worm control; appropriate the unexpended balance of an original appropriation of \$1,350,000 for the expansion of the University of Texas campus.

WOULD BURN VICTIM

BALLINGER, March 25.—Three masked men entered the store of W. J. Weisner of Rowena, a small town eight miles west of Ballinger, bound and gagged Mr. Weisner, robbed his cash register and then set fire to the building, leaving Weisner bound on the floor. Flames attracted attention and men broke into the store, rescuing Weisner and keeping the fire in check until the fire department from Ballinger arrived. Another attempt to burn the store had been made 10 days ago.

Jazzy Matricide Gets Nauseating Nut Notes

SAN FRANCISCO, March 25.—A basket of flowers, a "mash" note, and a book of poems were received today by Dorothy Ellingson, 16-year-old murderess. A note, from a man, which accompanied the flowers, read: "I hope to see you soon. I think of you constantly. I know God will take care of you just as He does these flowers." The book of poetry came from a woman and contained a note saying: "I am giving you this book because your mother appeared to me and asked me to do it. Your mother understands the past. I am in constant communication with her."

MARTIN ATTACKS WIDOW'S SILENCE

Prosecution Denounces Keeping Collier's Girl Quiet

WICHITA FALLS, March 25.—Denunciation of the defense for attacking the reputation of Mrs. Hattie Robertson and Mary Frances Collier Robertson featured the address of Bernard Martin, state prosecutor, today to the jury which will decide the fate of Frank Collier, former mayor of Wichita Falls, for slaying his son-in-law, Elzie Robertson.

Martin opened today for the state, to be followed by three other counsel alternating for the defense and prosecution. The arguments were scheduled to close late this afternoon, when the case will be given to the jury.

Martin based his attack upon the failure of the defense to call Mary Frances, daughter of Collier and wife of the slain youth, to the witness stand.

BANDIT PRINCE SELECTS JURY

Mail Robber's Clan Gather At Killer's Trial

HARTFORD, Conn., March 25.—Gerald Chapman had a slight advantage in the personnel of the jury at the beginning of the second day of his trial for the murder of James Skelly, New Britain, Conn., policeman. The day started with five jurors in the box, every one of them having the "o. k." of the "prince of bandits."

As each talisman is called Chapman scrutinizes him carefully. "He will do," he tells his lawyers, or "that fellow is a convict," or "that bird hasn't any heart."

The second 100 talismans were in court today. Reports that former underworld associates of Chapman had been seen in Hartford caused a tightening of the plans to guard against rescue of the prisoner or his escape.

CONVICTS ON WAY TO PRISON KILL GUARD

CHICKASHA, Okla., March 25.—J. A. Sewell, deputy sheriff of Tulsa county, was found murdered several miles south of Chickasha this morning, and two prisoners he was taking to the penitentiary are believed to have escaped in the automobile he was driving.

Sewell left Pauls Valley with the two prisoners yesterday and was intending to stop in Chickasha last night. The automobile had been driven away from where the body was found this morning with a tire missing from one of the wheels.

Cisco Youths Given Penitentiary Terms

Two Cisco boys, Buford Tarver and Earl Free, pleaded guilty, Tarver of burglary and Free to highway robbery, in the Eighty-eighth district court Tuesday afternoon. The former was sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary and given a suspension of sentence and the latter drew a five-year sentence in the penitentiary. Free was charged with holding up and robbing a negro woman on the streets of Cisco. He had formerly served a term in the penitentiary.

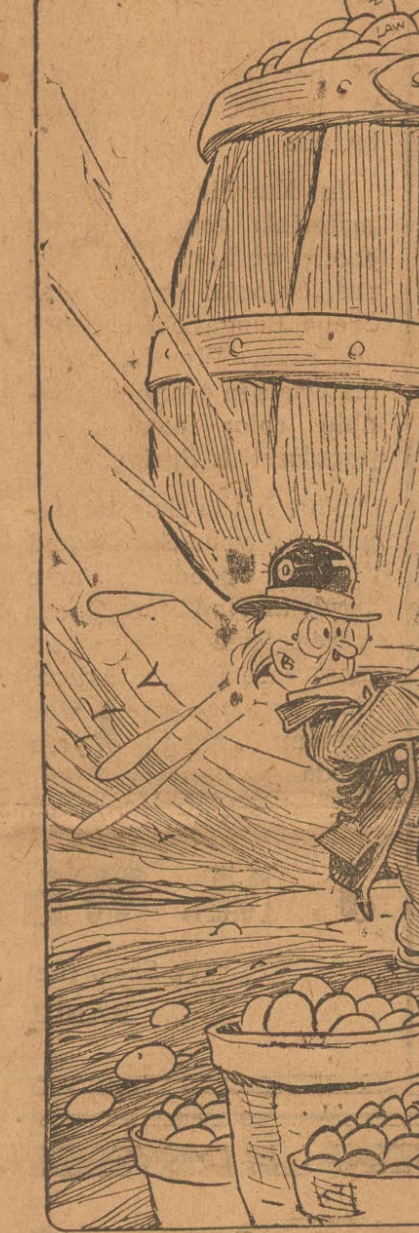

Eastland County Track Athletes Enter Into Hard Training for Interscholastic Meet, April 2, 3, and 4

High school track athletes in Eastland county are training hard for the county interscholastic league meet, to be held in Eastland, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, April 2, 3 and 4. Athletics will not occupy all the time of the meet, in fact will not figure at all in Thursday's program, but will hold the center of interest Friday and Saturday afternoons.

The music memory contest will be held at 7:30 p. m. Thursday. Contest in declamation, debate, essay and spelling will begin at 8:30 a. m. Friday and the arithmetic contest is scheduled for 11 o'clock Friday. The finals in girls' debate and finals in declamation will be held at 4 p. m. Friday. Finals in boys' debate are to be held at 7:30 p. m.

The tennis contests will begin at 8:30 o'clock Friday morning. Track and field events for junior boys, preliminary in final, are to be held at 2 o'clock Friday. Preliminary field and track contests for the senior boys will begin at 9 o'clock Saturday morning and the volleyball contest for girls is also scheduled for that hour.

COMEDIAN'S MOTHER TO REMAIN IN U. S.

WASHINGTON, March 25.—Mrs. Lena Chaplin, aged and infirm mother of the famous comedian, Charlie Chaplin, will not be deported when extension of her leave to remain in the United States expires, it was learned today. The decision of the department of labor on her petition for another stay will not be made until next week. Mrs. Chaplin was admitted in 1919 for treatment, but was ineligible for naturalization because of her infirmity and hence had to be classed as an "undesirable."

Mother Slayer Now Verges On Insanity

SAN FRANCISCO, March 25.—Fearing that Dorothy Ellingson, 16-year-old matricide, may attempt suicide in a spell of hysterical passion, a double guard of police women was placed about her today. The one-time hardened lass whose lack of sophistication marked her as a girl without a heart, has crumbled under the steady drone of "murder—murder—murder," as selection of the jury to determine her fate continues. "Dorothy is nearing a breakdown," Jail Matron Jessie Kennedy said today. "She slept fitfully last night and sobbed during her waking hours. She is a very nervous girl and there is no telling what she may do. The possibility that she may lapse into raging insanity is being considered and a careful guard has been established to prevent her harming herself."

Hunted Killer Thought Hiding In Eastland County

Eastland county officers have been asked to be on the watchout for the Mexican, who Tuesday shot and killed Sheriff W. W. Satterwhite and Deputy Sheriff Reeves of Howard county at a Mexican camp four miles south of Merkel, Texas, where the officers had gone to arrest him on a charge of murder growing out of the killing by a Mexican of a man in Big Spring a few days before.

This morning the sheriff's department was "tipped off" that a Mexican, believed to be the one being sought by the West Texas officers, was in hiding at a Mexican camp about one and one-half miles northwest of Eastland. Sheriff Edwards and Deputy E. E. Wood and V. F. Foster, accompanied by Calvin Brown and Nat Tate, went out to the Mexican camp and made a search for the killer. A Mexican found hiding in a ravine was arrested, but it was proved later that he was not the man wanted and was released by the officers.

Planes Search for Mexican Killer of Sheriff and Deputy

CHICAGO, March 25.—William D. Shepherd's attempts to be released from jail on bond, already the greatest fight of his kind in the history of the criminal court here, entered its fourth day today. If the state's attorneys, whose argument will be heard today, do not talk too long, the man who is accused of murdering his millionaire ward, Billie McClintock, will know by night whether he will have his freedom pending trial.

Thomas Marshall, able assistant prosecutor who opened the state's argument, is to conclude his speech today and will be followed by George Gorman, another assistant prosecutor. Then Crewe himself will close the state's argument.

William Scott Stewart, attorney for Shepherd, consumed most of yesterday's session with a brilliant argument, attacking the state's case and claiming his client should be allowed freedom on bond because the proof of Shepherd's guilt is not evident and the presumption of guilt is not great.

'MA' REFUSES REQUISITION

Incidentally Is Massachusetts' Executive Criticized

AUSTIN, March 25.—A second letter of refusal by Governor Miriam A. Ferguson to honor the requisition of Governor Alvin Fuller of Massachusetts for the return of Albert Russell of Wichita Falls to face wife desertion charges was in the mail today. Governor Ferguson's letter was sent, in reply to one from the Massachusetts executive, clarifying the stand of the Texas officials.

Russell came to Texas in 1922 with his wife's full and free consent after she had gone to Massachusetts to make her home, the governor's letter said.

The Texas executive also called attention to the recent refusal of the Massachusetts executive to accede to a requisition from West Virginia for a negro who sought haven in Massachusetts and found it.

Breckenridge Lions Meet Second Defeat

The Eastland Lions won their second game of basketball from the Breckenridge team when they defeated them at the American Legion Athletic club in Eastland last night by a score of 17 to 24. The first game was played at Breckenridge. The visitors played a pretty good trick on the home boys when they ran in extra men on them during their latter part of the game. In the last quarter it was discovered that they were playing seven men.

The Eastland club had prepared a special program and a banquet in honor of the visiting Lions, numbering about 40, consisting of several short talks and a number of musical and instrumental selections. Members of the Breckenridge party, who responded when called upon for speeches, were Lions Adams, Grogans, Sandifer and Gill. President N. N. Rosenquest of the Eastland club presided and the program was in charge of Bobbie Bates.

200 AUTOS OUT AFTER FUGITIVE

Howard County Officers Meet Death at Mexican Camp

Third Officer Shot Succumbs To Murderer's Bullet

ABILENE, March 25.—Airlanes were brought into the search today for an unidentified Mexican responsible for the fatal shooting of two officers in a Mexican road camp near here yesterday. An all-night search by national guardsmen and possees of citizens led by bloodhounds failed to show a trace of the slayer, according to advices today.

W. W. Satterwhite of Big Spring, Howard county sheriff, and George Reeves, constable at Merkel, met their death when they entered the road camp, looking for a Mexican suspected of slaying a countryman in a brawl at Big Spring Saturday night. Reeves was fired on and injured, and Satterwhite was instantly killed as he entered his car to seek assistance for the wounded man. The slayer then returned to the wounded constable and fired a bullet through his head, according to a farmer who witnessed the shooting.

Officers in connection with the belief that the slayer of the officers was the fugitive from Big Spring. The pursuit is slow, due to the rough country, and capture of the slayer may require several days, officers said.

Says He Didn't Kill Wife; Just Assisted Her In Taking Life

CLEVELAND, March 25.—Frank Liska was still contending today that he didn't kill his wife but merely assisted her in killing herself. He admitted setting fire to the hen house in the back yard in which the scorched body of Mrs. Catherine Liska, 37, was found by firemen. "She tied the kimono around her neck and begged me to pull it tighter and kill her," Liska said in his statement. "At first I refused, but she kept on begging so at last I consented," he said.

City Manager Avers Eastland Has Ample Water for Two Years

Reports that the City of Eastland intends to limit the amount of water that may be used by consumers because of the continued dry weather in this section, is entirely without foundation, according to City Manager Jim Cheatham, who states that such an eventuality had never even been discussed by the city commissioners.

Officials of the Lake Eastland corporation, who are furnishing the city water under contract, state that engineers only a few days ago advised them there was sufficient water in Lake Eastland to supply the demands being made upon it for fully two more years without any rain at all. The city also has the Ringling lake and Lake Tully, both of which still have abundance of water in them.

Salesman Sues Swift For \$35,000 Damages

ABILENE, March 25.—J. H. Spencer, a traveling salesman, has filed in the district court here a suit for \$35,000 against Swift & Co. for alleged slander, claiming to have suffered shame and humiliation and damage to his business and financial interests by being discharged from the company's employ without justification or excuse.

The petition says the defendant's manager, traveling auditor and employee at Wichita Falls charged the plaintiff with holding out funds and then published the report to various persons, notwithstanding he had worked enthusiastically for the defendant's interests and had faithfully and regularly reported in full to the defendant the result of his labors.

AIRCRAFT VS. BATTLESHIPS. As a result of jealousies between war and navy and postoffice departments, the commercial aircraft industry, of which so much was expected at the close of the world war, is almost at a standstill.

These facts, admitted with more or less enthusiasm by all military and naval experts, have been dramatized by the outbursts of Brig. Gen. William Mitchell, assistant chief of the army air service, who places the blame for America's backwardness in the air squarely upon the disorganization resulting, he contends, from the division of governmental aviation among four departments.

He believes that aviation will not have its due until it is assigned to a separate department on terms of equality with the army and navy, and has testified with candor to his lack of faith in the ability of those now in control of these departments.

It is believed that so long as he lives he will carry on the fight he has started, until some sane, definite governmental program is adopted and men of the air put under the control of men who are at least their friends.

STANDARD SETS GAS PRICE. In a statement submitted to the senate embodying the results of an investigation of the oil industry, the federal trade commission asserts that the Standard Oil company was recognized by the oil and gasoline industry as the "leader in price movements, and independent companies are practically helpless. The commission makes reference to the government's dissolution decree, stating that there was evidence that the Standard companies operated less consistently as a group.

The more important members, including the Standard of New Jersey, the Standard of Indiana, the Standard of Kentucky, the commission contends are "fortifying themselves by acquiring control of independents and entering new branches of the industry as integrated and dominant units in the territories in which they operate."

The federal trade commission report has been in the hands of the department of justice which is said to be making an investigation based on information contained in the LaFollette report of two years ago, but there is little indication that any action will be taken in the near future.

According to the director of the bureau of highway economics the railroad pay for carrying mails has not increased in proportion to government receipts. He declares that compared with 1917 the postoffice has earned 74 per cent more and has only had to spend 18.5 per cent more for the transportation of the mails by rail. But the director does not explain to the taxpayer where this extra earning has found a resting place, because the annual "deficit" seems to be on the increase.

Salaries of members of the interstate commerce commission are \$12,000 a year, the term of office being for seven years. Appointments must alternate between political parties, no more than six republicans or six democrats out of the 11 members sitting in office at one time.

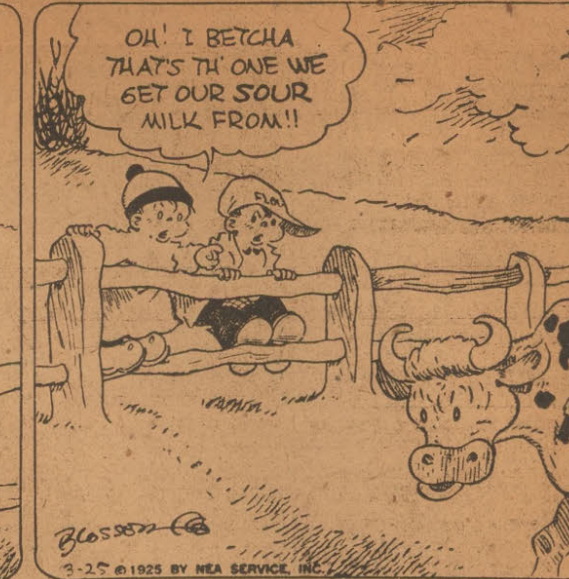
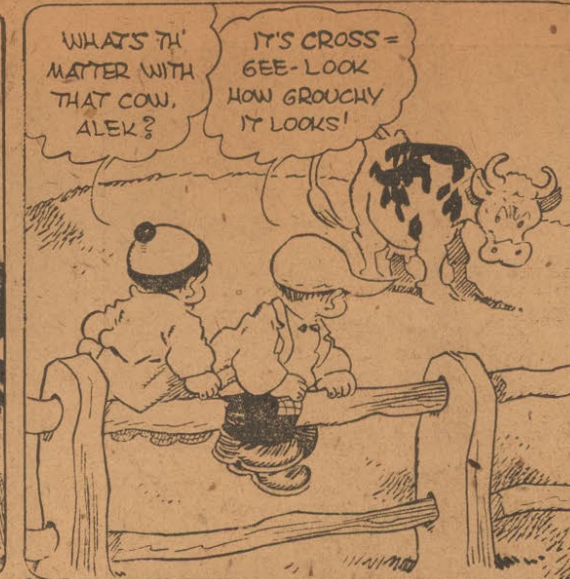

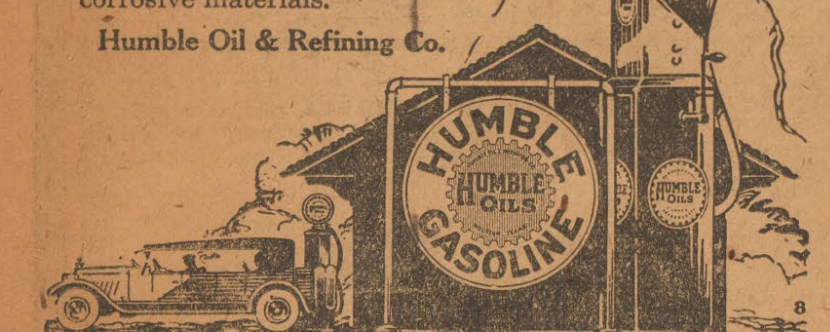

Menus for a Family

Breakfast—Stewed prunes, cereal, thin cream, scrambled eggs, crisp toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Cornmeal bunny, lettuce sandwiches, stuffed figs, milk, tea.

Dinner—Bean soup, stuffed pepper salad, brown bread, orange soufflé, milk, coffee.

The dessert in this dinner menu figures as a main dish in food value. The bean soup should be rubbed through a colander to remove the tough covering of the beans for children under ten years of age. This sort of hull is hard to digest and very irritating to delicate tummies.

Cornmeal Bunny

One and one-half cups hot cornmeal mush, 1/2 cup milk, 1 cup diced cheese, 2 hard cooked eggs, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 teaspoon salt, paprika, triangles hot buttered toast.

Add salt to mush after cooking. Chop eggs. Add eggs, cheese, milk, and butter to hot mush. Beat until cheese is melted and pour over the hot toast. Sprinkle with paprika and serve.

Stuffed Figs

One-half pound pulled figs, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1/2 lemon, chopped nuts and dates.

Wash figs carefully through several waters and steam until tender. About ten minutes before tender add sugar and juice of lemon. Let cool and cut off stem end. Open and stuff with chopped nuts and dates using enough orange juice to make moist. Serve with slightly sweetened whipped cream.

Children of four years of age should be served a fig stuffed only with chopped dates.

OKLAHOMANS NOW FACE PHOENIX MURDER TRIAL

PHOENIX, Ariz., March 25.—Will Lawrence, elder of two brothers from Muskogee, Okla., who are charged with murder as the result of the slaying of Policeman Haze Burch of this city on Feb. 5, went on trial for his life in supreme court today.

Policeman Burch was shot and killed when he attempted to arrest two men whom he found taking gasoline from a car in the heart of the city. He had handcuffs on one man when the other fired twice, inflicting wounds that caused death several hours later. Before his death Burch was shown pictures of the Lawrence brothers and declared they were the men who shot him.

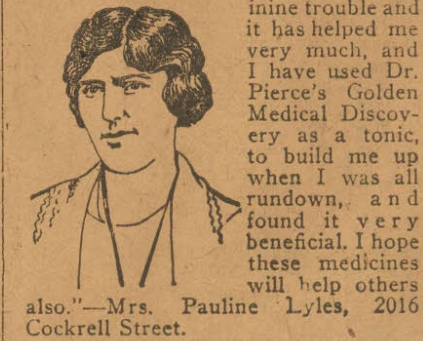

COLUMBIA, S. C., WINS NEAR EAST PRIZE AWARD

NEW YORK.—The city of Columbia, S. C., has won first prize in a national contest organized by the Near East Relief, as the locality enlisting the largest number of persons in the observance of Golden

Rule Sunday last December. The first prize consists of a trip to Palestine for some persons selected from the winning community. The 20 civic and religious organizations in Columbia which co-operated in the relief campaign will choose the individual to make the trip. Second prize was awarded to Sanford, Maine. Three hundred communities in 18 states participated in the contest.

The prize winning campaign in Columbia enrolled more than 25,000 persons in a city of 37,500, or 66 per cent of the population. Other competitors scored from 20 to 64 per cent. The voluminous report submitted to the committee of award by the Columbia committee contained the autographed signature of every person enrolled.

MARTIN ATTACKS MARY'S SILENCE

(Continued from page one) ness stand. The state did not call her. "It was Collier," Martin told the jury, "who testified that his wife had told him Mary Frances had been seduced by Robertson before marriage." The prosecution questioned the failure of the defense to allow the girl to testify regarding the allegations.

WICHITA FALLS, March 25.—Along the lines laid out for the prosecution and defense to follow by Trial Judge P. A. Martin's charge to the jury trying Frank Collier for the killing of his young son-in-law, Elzie Robertson, State Attorney Ben Allred and Defense Attorney Fred Weeks late Thursday afternoon each finished their initial arguments before the jury, which, awaiting Judge Martin's charge, may find Collier "guilty of murder," and sentence him to death or to a term in the penitentiary of not less than five years, or reduce his crime to manslaughter and sentence him to prison for from two to five years, unless you should see fit to grant him a suspended sentence, about which you will use your own discretion."

Pleads Manslaughter. "I will show you that if ever in the history of crime there was a clear case of manslaughter as distinguished from murder, it is the case before the bar," declared Weeks.

"The case is one of cold blooded murder," Allred told the jury. "Gentlemen, Frank Collier's daughter was wronged," Weeks declared. "If he hadn't been as strong a man as he was he would never have restrained himself so long. So help me God I hope I dangle at the end of a rope before I ever permit the attack upon the good name of my daughter that was made upon that of Frank Collier's girl."

Defends Buster and Mother. "Buster Robertson was a good boy. Mrs. Robertson was a good woman. They were trying to do the right thing by Mary Frances," replied Allred.

Court was recessed until 9 o'clock Wednesday morning following the two speeches.

Judge Martin's charge to the jury was read before a hushed court room.

"I have a special charge I am reading to you at the institution of the defense," the Court added. In substance, he then directed the jury to take into consideration all the evidence that had been introduced as to the legality of the marriage of the defendant's daughter with the deceased, as to the character of the defendant, and the character of the Robertson home, as to the efforts of the defendant to break up the affair between the two and his reasons for such, and the fact that the Robertsons were coming to the Collier home to get the girl, and that the girl intended to go to the Robertson home.

When Judge Martin signified that he was ready to hear the arguments, Allred took the floor. In a quiet voice he told of the unusual nature of the case.

Scoffs Self-Defense. "This man can't come to you and say that he saw that dead boy reach for his gun," said Allred. "He can't say that he was afraid Buster Robertson would kill him and he shot him to save his own life, he can only tell you as that poor mother told you yesterday: 'He reached out his hand for me to take.' His questions were of Mary Frances. 'When I saw his gun I pleaded with him not to shoot, but he shot anyway, not once but twice, three times, and the fourth time when Buster was already prostrate on the ground with the blood pouring from their gaping holes."

"Cool, Premeditated Murder." "I have read in my history of cool premeditated murder, but never have I seen such murder committed by a man, with a lifetime reputation for sobriety and integrity back of him, on the person of a boy still in his teens, with a hand outstretched in friendship, and a spoke that spoke the words of pleading 'Mr. Collier, don't shoot me, I haven't done anything.'"

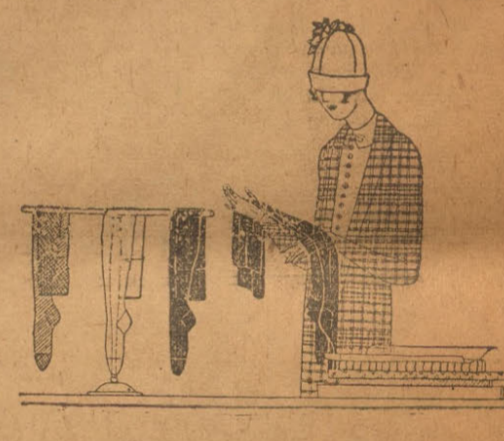
