ABILENE, March 25.—Airplanes were brought into the search today for an unidentified Mexican responsible for the fatal shooting of two officers in a Mexican road camp near here yesterday. An all-night search by national guardsmen and posses of citizens led by bloodhounds failed to show a trace of the slayer,

W. W. Reeves was fired on and injured, and Satterwhite was instantly killed as he entered his car to seek assistance for the wounded man. 


