GALVESTON, March 27.—Fred W. Arend, 40 years old, shot and killed Miss Sadie Coleman, 40 years old, and then turned the gun upon himself with fatal results here late today. Arend died en route to the hospital and the woman died before the police reached the scene of the shooting.

SHOCKING CRIME CONFESSED BY TRIO IN OHIO

POMEROY, Ohio, March 27.—The story of one of the most amazing crimes ever committed in Ohio was unfolded tonight when three men confessed they murdered James McCumber, 65 years old, on the night of March 15 and threw his body into an abandoned cistern. The men who confessed are John Hendricks, Richard Rhodes, white, and John Bryant, a negro.

According to the three confessions, which are in the hands of the police, Bryant planned the killing and paid Rhodes and Hendricks \$30 to aid him.

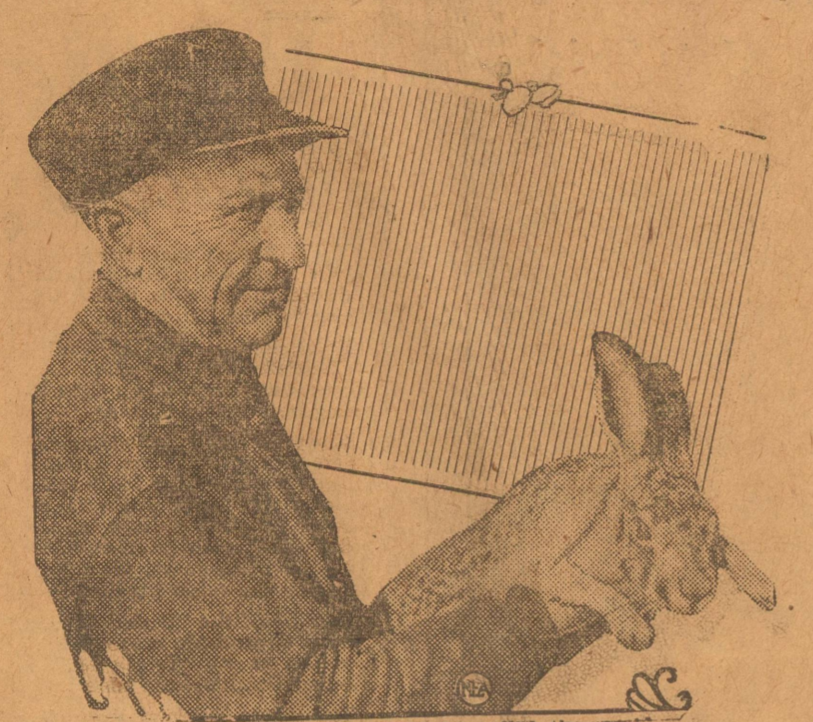
SINCLAIR BRINGS IN A GUSHER

ENID, Okla., March 27.—The Sinclair company's Hartley No. 27 on the famous Hartley lease, which several times has brought the Garfield county field into prominence, came in yesterday for an estimated flow of more than 25,000 barrels a day. This is the largest producer ever brought in the state of Oklahoma. The tankage was insufficient to handle the output of the well. Oil was running through a gash on a farm like a small creek. More than 100 men were working frantically to erect tankage and install pumps in an effort to move the oil to the storage tanks, but at a late hour the golden fluid was still running wild.

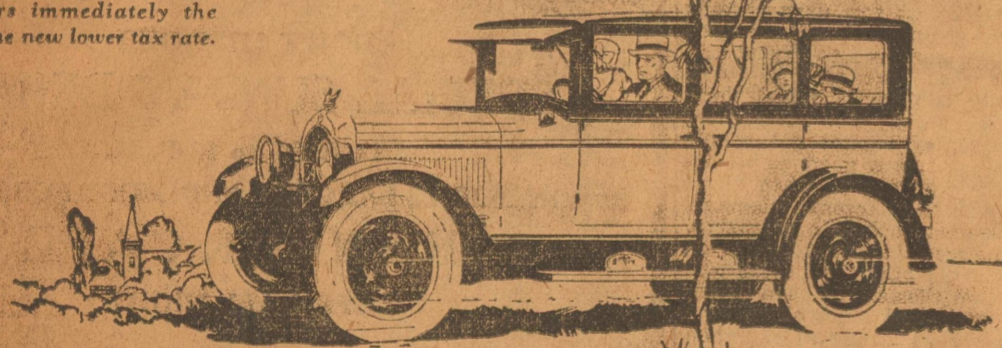

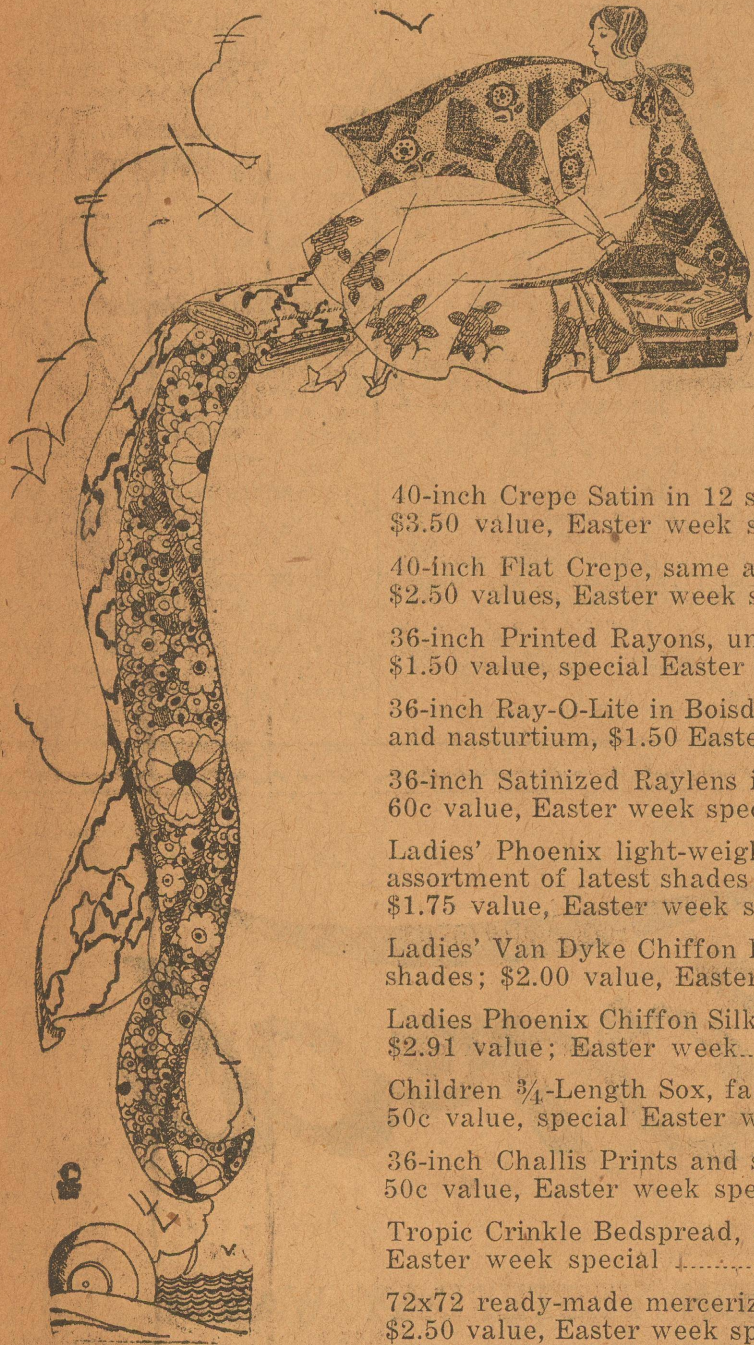

Massachusettes Finds Law 300 Years Old On Trees

WASHINGTON, March 27.—Just 300 years ago March 29, the first forestry order ever promulgated on the North American continent was issued, says a statement today from the American Tree Association.

The Association is marking 1926 the Semi-Centennial of the first forestry activity by our government, as at present organized, by publishing for free distribution 300,000 Forestry Primers "in an endeavor to reach the public opinion of tomorrow." American Forest Week is April 18.

"This Order" said Charles Lathrop, Paek of the American Tree Association today "shows our forefathers were forest wise, Charles W. Saunders, without the consent, approbation & liking of the Governour, & Council."

House of the state of Washington and Julius H. Tuttle the librarian of the Massachusetts Historical Society made the investigation and President Coolidge has just been informed of their finding by Mrs. Saunders.

The decree with its odd spelling is being incorporated in the next edition of the Forestry Primer. The following order is found in the printed records of the Colony of New Plymouth, Vol. XII 1620-167-8, page 8, under the heading "Orders agreed on at several times for the general good of the Colony:

"It was decreed by the Court held on the 29 of March Anno. Do. 1726. That for the preventing of which inconveniences, as doe, and may befall the plantation by the want of timber. That no man of what condition so ever sell or transport any manner of works or frames, for houses, planks, boards, shipping, shalops, boats, canoes, or what so ever may tende to the destruction of timber aforesaid: show little so ever the quantity be: without the consent, approbation & liking of the Governour, & Council."

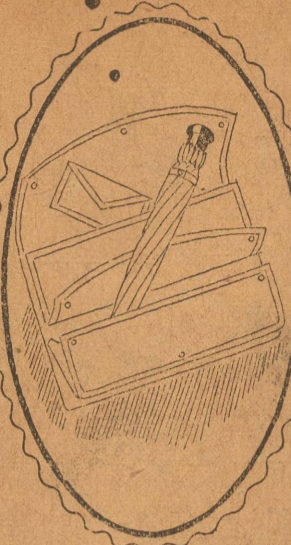
"For instance, I have seen exactly twelve kinds of weather in Texas in one day. I have seen it so dry here that when a rain did come it drowned all the frogs in that area."

Under the terms of the new federal law, the revenue stamps will not be required on deeds or conveyances of real estate, entry of goods at customs house, entry for withdrawal of goods from customs bonded warehouse, proxies for election of officers or business meetings of corporations, power of attorney. An oil lease is, of course, classified as a conveyance of real estate.

Johnson Murder Case Set For Trial Monday Morning

One hundred veniremen have been summoned for Monday for the trial of C. A. Johnson, charged with murder.

This is the second time the case has been set, a continuance being granted 10 days ago when material witnesses for the defendant were absent. Johnson is charged with the slaying of John Harris in Pioneer two months ago.

HERD OF DEER STOPS TRAIN IN MOFFAT ROAD

DENVER, March 27.—The "old days" when herds of buffalo often

impeded railroad transportation on the western plains were recalled here when State Game Commissioner Roland Parvin received a letter from one of his deputies telling of a herd of 600 deer stopping a train on the Moffat road.

According to the deputy the deer are coming down from the high altitudes, snow having covered up their feed.

Commissioner Parvin said he was receiving complaints daily from farmers about deer appropriating their hay stacks.

Sunshine Special Running Time West To Be Cut

DALLAS, March 27.—Two hours will be cut from the running time on the Sunshine Special between Dallas and Los Angeles, according to George D. Hunter, general passenger agent of the Texas & Pacific railway.

The new schedule will be put into effect on or about April 1, he said. This schedule will be put into effect in co-operation with the Southern Pacific railway and the running time between Dallas and California will be cut down by seven hours.

This new time will necessitate the Sunshine Special attaining a speed of 70 miles on a part of the lap between Dallas and El Paso making it one of the fastest trains in the United States, said Hunter.

In connection with this same announcement Hunter says that a through sleeper will operate through Dallas from St. Louis to Los Angeles.

This, according to Hunter, is in anticipation of the heaviest spring and summer tourist traffic ever experienced by the railroads.

CROWN PRINCE OF SWEDEN IS AN ATHLETE

STOCKHOLM.—By setting a royal example of all around athletic prowess, Sweden's crown prince, Gustavus Adolphus, has stimulated a greater Swedish interest and participation in sports than ever before. Though now 44 years old, the heir to the throne keeps himself in top-notch physical condition by regularly taking part in some form of physical exercise.

His favorite sport is ski running in which he has mastered the difficult right angle turn, called "the Lapp twist," invented by the nomads of the

north. He is also a good swimmer, skater, horseback rider, tennis player, long distance hiker and golfer.

Though in Sweden golf is a relatively new sport, the more important cities have their clubs and the crown prince is the head of the Stockholm club.

To general athletics in Sweden, a strong and lasting impetus was given by the 1912 Olympics in which the American track team was victorious. The Stockholm stadium, built for that occasion, was a permanent structure and during the past 10 years nearly four million persons have paid admissions to see athletic contests. Football has been the most popular, followed by track games and hockey. In the royal box the crown prince and his family are frequent spectators, in winter as well as summer.

The Swedish gold insignia, awarded to all around athletes who can pass certain tests, was won by the crown prince in 1915, after passing credibly

in swimming, jumping, running and discus throwing.
