By United Press. CINCINNATI, Ohio, Jan. 19.--One man was killed and more than 30 persons were injured when a freak twister swept through sections of the Miami Valley today. The storm first struck at Cummingsville where many buildings were demolished and then leaped to Newtown, Hamilton and

Washington Courthouse leaving a trail of wreckage and halting traffic.

The damage was placed at \$500,-000. Richard Cruger, Dayton, Ohio, salesman, was killed at Washington Courthouse when the wind swept pile of bricks from atop of a building on his automobile.

Twenty injured had been received at hospitals here shortly afternoon and rescue crews and relief workers led by city and Red Cross officials were attempting to penetrate the debris in an effort to establish if there are more dead.






