REDUCE COTTON ACREAGE, PLEA **MADE FARMRES**

Commissioner of Agriculture Terrell Declares This Is Farmers Best Weapon

By United Press.

AUSTIN, Feb. 2.—The situation is most favorable for the farmer by reason of last season's cetton crop, State Commissioner of Agriculture George B. Terrell said today in is-suing an appeal to farmers not to lose that advantage by increasing the acreage of the 1928 crop.

Acreage, he pointed out, is one of the most important factors bearing

upon cotton prices.
In the absence of any farmers' organization strong enough to fix a profitable price and keep a surplus off the market, Terrell urges acreage reduction as the farmers best weapon.

"It has been proven repeatedly," he said, "that a smal! crop brings more actual money than a large crop." He cited the 12,789,000 bale crop of 1927 selling for \$80,000,000 more than he 18,000,000 bale crop of 1926

Hundreds of thousands of acres of cotton have died of root rot in the past few years, Terrell said, and this land should have a rest from cotton as the best means of curtailing that

plant disease.
"Texas," he said, "has nearly enough feed to last this year and sufficient early feed crops should be planted to finish up the crop, and an abundance should be planted for next year's supply. If we will make all farms self supporting we are not likely to raise too much cetton, and it would be a good policy to put more lands into pasture for livestock and let some lands rest and recuperate."

Final solution of the problem marketing the cotton crop profitably the commissioner suggested, is of ganization of a cotton finance con poration in the South strong enoug

poration in the South strong enough to hold any temporary surplus until demand justifies a profitable price. He outlined an organization of growers, business men and bankers that could furnish \$5,500,000 capital in Texas. Price of cotton declined recently, he argued, because of talk of increased acreage. The price will not advance until the acreage is determined, he added.

Million A Day Is Going Into Reserve Bank

DALLAS, Feb. 2.—Approximately \$1,000,000 a day in currency and silver is now being received at Dallas federal reserve bank from its 537 member banks in this district, according to J. L.

Hermann, assistant cashier. This amount will continue to come until about June 1, but after that time the sum will gradually decrease, Hermann said.

"The money is sent in from the member banks for the credit of their reserve accounts and it is unusually large at this time of year because of the movement of crops and the banks have more cash than is actually needed," he explained.

'From August to November the Federal Reserve Bank ships a large amount of currency to the smaller banks," he said.
