CORPORATION TAXES

The Iron and Trade Review, of Cleveland, recently completed a survey of coropration taxes paid to the government. It finds that of the \$850,000,000 corporation tax the six great manufacturing states of Ohio, Michigan, Massachusetts, Illinois, Pennsylvania, and New York carry 64.1 per cent. All of the other states pay only 35.9 per cent of the aggregate tax. Of the total corporation taxes the manufacturing interests contribute 49.6 per cent, transportation and public utilities 14 per cent, trade 14.04 per cent, finance 12.45 per cent, mining 4.14 per cent, agriculture 2.22 per cent, and all other corporation taxes 4.9 per cent.
