

"Results of the bacteriological analyses of water specimens submitted gave no evidence of the presence of organisms of the B. Coli group. The sources from which the samples were taken may therefore he considered as reasonably safe for drinking purposes at the time of the cellection of the specimens.

Periodical examinations of the municipal water supply is to be made from time to time and the results given to the public, so they may rest assured they are getting a good sanitary water supply, according to City Engineer Peacock, who gives the fellowing suggestions:

"Customers who receive their water on dead ends, or from pipes that are seldom used or drained, should take particular pains to see that the line is flushed every day, because stagnant water is more receptive to the development of obnoxious odors and harmful bacteria than is water that is continually circulating."

Several samples were made by the city engineer at the filtration plant Saurday and he reported that the eperator, Mr. Griffin, has the filter beds and the dosing machines in perfect working order.

Sample specimens of water sent to the state health board were taken from hydrant taps at four different places and each test showed the water to be safe, the report being as follows:







Easing the Burden of State Taxation OPENING OF

Banker Points Out Benefits of Community Property System in Some States.

RAVORABLE aspects of tax systems are now among the most I highly prized assets of our states, it is pointed out in the American Bankers Association Journal in connection with an article on how California, which has never had a state income tax, cuts state and Federal death taxes nearly in half by the "community property" system. L. H. Roseberry, Vice President Security Trust and Savings Bank, Los Angeles, author of the article, says that a recent amendment to the tax law enables future residents of the state to take advantage of it. Reference is made to a former article by Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Dewey, voicing the need for death tax reform and citing a hypothetical case involving California inheritance taxes which might have ben levied in 1920. Since that time the laws have been changed, Mr. Roseberry declares, so that the figures then given do not correctly represent the present situation. He says:

"Ever since its admission California has had the 'community property' system. Eight other states have a similar system. 'Community property' is property accumulated by married persons during their marriage, except that which is acquired by gift, bequest or inheritance. Approximate-ly 65 per cent of all property in the state is 'community property.' Such property in California enjoys the most taxes.

"To illustrate, the following example of a man survived by a wife and two minor children is computed, the estate consisting of 'community property' all left by will to the wife and children. One-half of such property would go under the law to the wife without any death taxes, and the other half only would be subject to both state inheritance and Federal estate property in California enjoys the most taxes.

Kellogg Company Dietist Gives Advice for School Children

(By Barbara Brooks, Eome Economics Department, Kellogg Company, Battle Creek, Michigan.) pany, Battle Creek, Michigan.)
The first of September is ushered in with the ringing of bells—school bells. Although the old brass bell with the clapper has been replaced by electricity, no doubt children run to school just as fast when urged on by the modern sound as their paremask, did when the harsher clang warned them that they might be late.

warned them that they might be late. School days mean that the freedom of summer is over—girls and boys must settle down to a routine in which almost every act is supervised
—except cating. All summer mother
has seen to it that vegetables have
been included in the noon menu—
and that they have gone into the
children to build strong bodies. Now the children either carry their lunch or purchase it at the school cafe-teria. In the latter case it is to hoped that there is a wise assort-ment from which to choose and some one to suggest appetizing and wholesome combinations.

If a hunch has to be carried, the

mother knows what goes into it, but she cannot be sure that it will be catch. Her aim should be to prepars the foods in such a way that they will appeal to the appetite, give variety and provide the materials necessary for the growing child.

Such attractive lunch boxes can be purchased today that the problem

be purchased today that the problem of packing has been simplified. The thermos bottle can hold hot or cold liquids depending on the time of the year. Lemonade, fruit juice, or milk, for warm days—the milk can be in the form of egg nogg for the underweight child; cocoa, soup, hot egg nogg or milk for the cooler weather. Vary the sandwiches by using different kinds of bread—whole wheat, bran, or steamed brown, as well as

bran, or steamed brown, as well as different fillings. Put small bran muffins in occasionally—children like the ones with dates especially well. An individual package of ready-to-ea cereal is enjoyed once in a while. Eggs may be served in several ways—hard cooked, stuffed, in sandwiches or salad. For dessert, fruit, raw or cooked; pudding such as corn starch, rice, baked custard, or gelatine; or cookies such as rolled out spices cookies with fruit.

You may find it helpful to make out the lunch box menus a week in advance. You need not hold absolutely to your plan, but thinking shend will avoid a lunch put together without thought. This is rarely enjoyed and proves a watte of time and food.


