PARIS. Dec. 29.—Gabriele D'Annun-Finme and the capitulation of the city by the legionaires is imminent, according to a dispatch from Milan today. D'Annuzio ceded his authority to the municipal council which had entered into negotiations with the Rome government fo a truce on their own accord.

LONDON, Dec. 29.—Four hundred men have been killed and thousands of thers have been wounded in the fight ing at Fiume, according to a dispatch received from Rome today. The fighting has been more severe than at first reported, the dispatch declares.

MILAN, Italy, Dec. 29.—Fighting was suspended at Fiume last night, according to word received from that city this morning. It was announced that hos tilities had ceased until Gabriele D'Annunzio's formal recognition of the Rapallo treaty is received.

# Policy of People to Determine Site U. T. Medical Dept.

Committee on Investigation Recommends More Buildings For State Institution.

By Associated Press

AUSTIN, Dec. 29.—Determination of the advisability of moving the medical branch of the University of Texas from Galveston has been postponed. The com mittee appointed to investigate this ques the governor said, "The question of moving the medical branch or leaving it where it is, would best await the determination of the people as to the future policy of the main institution."

The report urged that funds be pro vided to equip the main university varificient buildings, and stated, "Ne sarily the medical branch may not peet funds to provide an adequate p and efficient organization until the versity has found funds sufficient for i needs and settled the serious question permanent location by the acquisition land deemed reasonably sufficient for buildings and activities. Since the d termination of this important question might materially change the merits of the issue of location of the medical branch, the wiser judgment would suggest that the permanent future home of the branch would best not be sought to be determined until the greater problem of the permanent site of the university

The proposal to relocate the main unit versity, alluded to in the report, recalls a plan, advanced several times, under which the university would be moved to a tract of several hundred acres of land it owns in the suburbs of Austin.

The committee recommended that equipping the medical branch of the un versity the teaching hospital should be a state institution. "With regard to the alleged shortage of clinical material in Galveston," the committee stated in the report, "The question is one upon which clusion without further investigation.

### **ONLY NINETEEN TEXAS** BANKS HAVE FAILED SINCE NINETEEN-TEN

By Associated Press

AUSTIN, Dec. 29.—Only nineteen state banks have closed their doors in Texas since the first of 1910 without being able to further protect their depositors who were not securing interest according to figures obtained from the state commissioner of banking and insur ance, who based them upon records of the state guaranty fund. Two of the nine feen banks closed this year.

Under the state guaranty fund act. each state bank in Texas is assessed to make up losses by non-interest depositors in falling banks. The fund has been lrawn upon only seventeen times, and two assessments are pending, the commissioner said.

During the existence of the fund \$821,-562.22 has been drawn from it to meet liabilities, and \$470,385 of this amount was returned when complete liquidation or resources of delinquent banks was finished. The remaining balance is being constantly cut down by income from the same source.

The guaranty fund at present stands at \$2,365,807, while approximately \$250,000,000 of deposits in state banks are classed as non-secured and non-interest bearing, and thus protected by the guaranty fund. Should an upprecedented failure of state banks deplete the guaranty fund, the law provides that remaining banks may be assessed until all non-interest deposits are refunded.




