



Bill Unconstitutional.

There has been handed to me by Hon. Joe Burkett, who is a recent appointee of Governor Ferguson, a copy of a telegram dated Eastland, Texas, Feb. 18, 1925, which telegram was handed to the press by Mr. Burkett before delivering the same to me. This telegram is in the nature of an extended resolution adopted by a mass meeting of Eastland county citizens, wherein they express their disapproval of my action in opposing the Ferguson amnesty bill in the committee room and urging and requesting me, as their representative, to support the bill.

The above mentioned to me by unanimous vote, asked the distinguished attorney general of Texas to render an opinion on the amnesty bill and advise the house whether or not the same was constitutional. The opinion was rendered and it is apparent to the unbiased lawyer that Mr. Moody exhausted the subject from every angle and reached the conclusion that the bill was unconstitutional and advised the house that it was beyond their constitutional power to pass the bill.
