in any bank they might prefer." When the Peoples State Bank was organized in September, 1921, the charter was granted by State Com-missioner Hall. The officers at that time were: J. C. Stribling, presi-dent; C. E. May, vice president; John W. Thurman, cashier; J. J. Hair, Jr.; assistant cashier. The capital at the time was all outside capital, subscribed by Mr. Stribling, and put up by him in the Llano Nat-ional Bank, of which he was an of-ficer. Coming to Ranger, Mr. Strib-ling interested local men to join him in the bank and sold them small amounts of stock. Mr. Champion and Mr. Thompson came in several months after the bank was organized and Mr. Dillingham more than six and Mr. Dillingham more than six months later.

Original Capital Lost.

The Llano National Bank was a designated state depository and, with the consent of Bank Commissioner Hall, the entire stock of the Peoples State Bank of Ranger was deposited State Bank of Ranger was deposited in it. Within a few months the Llano National Bank failed, so that the en-tire capital stock of the Peoples State Bank, together with some money that had been placed in the Llano bank on deposit, had to be converted into cattle paper and other questionable maner that had been held by the paper that had been held by the Ilano National Bank and which has been the only doubtful paper ever held by the Peoples bank. No loheld by the Peoples bank. No lo-cal man and none of the present of-ficers of the Ranger State Bank was responsible for this condition, as the negotiations had been made while Mr. Stribling was president of the bank and with the approval of Bank Commissioner Hall. eral months as a special representa-tive of the state bank department, advising with officers of the bank and using his efforts to aid in the organization of the new bank. He went to Dallas today to undergo an operation, and may then return to Ranger to engage in business and make his home.
