### CHLORINE PROVES USEFUL IN CURING VARIOUS COUGHS

WASHINGTON. - The 'use of chlorine for respitory diseases is sweeping over the country and will soon prove to be a "real boon to husoon prove to be a "real boon to hu-manity," Brig. Gen. Fries, chief of the chemical warfare service of the army declared today. Reports to the war department, Fries said, showed that cures and improvements were noted in from 65 to 80 per cent of the respitory cases in which chlorine was used. Fries said chlorine will give a complete cure from whooping cough, if taken early enough. Of the 1,206 cases treated with chlorine the 1,206 cases treated with chlorine here, 447 showed improvement, 391 were cured, 138 failed to respond to treatment, and 230 cases were unheard from.


Feeling on the island often runs high between the two races, and Americans, it is alleged, have been thrown into jail for such offenses displaying an American flag.

Such reports are discounted by the state department here, however, which maintains that American residents on the Isle of Pines are as welf off as those in Hanava.

When Borah insists on another treaty giving better protection of American rights, the state department's advocates on the senate floor will point to the adequacy of the present treaty. Article III. pro-

vides that-Citizens of the United States residing or holding property in the island "shall suffer no diminution of the rights and privileges which they have acquired" and may "remain there or remove therefrom, retaining in either event all their rights of property.'

The Naval Angle. Three other factors enter into the ispute over the treaty ratification. Besides the legal aspect of the case there is a Philippine angle and a naval angle. Military defense of the Panama canal depends upon holding the island, with its magnicifent har-bors, as a naval base, according to some naval authorities. Others say that the status of American sovereignty over the Isle of Pines and the Philippines is the same, as both were acquired in the same clause of the Spanish-American treaty, and that disposition of the former will set a precedent for "giving away" the lat-




