By United Press, PARIS, Nov. 10.—Raymond Poin-care, former president and premier of France, declared here today on the eve of the seventh anniversary of the armistice that German nationalists still have a spirit of revenge which warrants extraordinary precautions in the interest of universal peace. The man reviled by German monarch and who se French troops to occupy the Ruhr, told the United Press in an exclusive interview that Germany still is able to throw an army into the field, but despite this France has manifested her pacific intentions by participating in the security pact conference. Recalling orgies of war times and speaking in high terms of the Amercans, Poincare then launched into a



"Germany finally accepted the Dawes plan, but this had hardly gone into effect when powerful groups in industry and politics declared its terms too heavy and that it would soon be necessary to suspend its application. 


